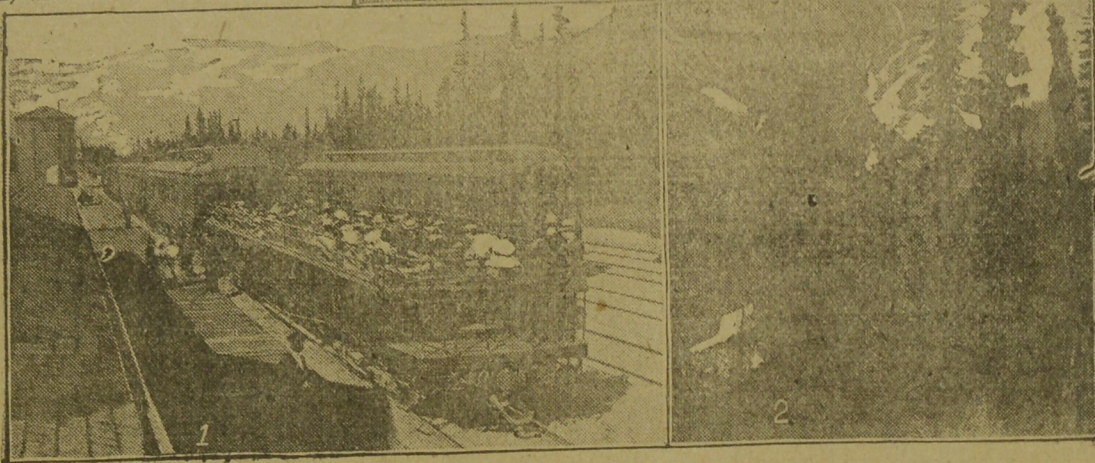


## SIGHT-SEEING IN THE ROCKIES

THE enormous height of the mountains through which the Canadian Pacific passes is such that passengers are apt to miss the majesty of the scenery unless they are able to look up and see these snow-clad peaks. Mount Sir Donald, for instance, is a mile higher than the railway track over which it towers. Those who sit on the platform of the observation car of course see everything, but the space here is limited. A great hit has therefore been made with the new type of sightseeing car which was placed on all through trains this summer on certain of the most picturesque districts in the Canadian Pacific Rockies, and on the local trains between Banff and Lake Louise.

THUG METHODS EMPLOYED  
IN CARLETON CAMPAIGN

Store Used by Opposition For Campaign Purposes Burglarized and Posters Torn Down From the Windows -- Desperate Tactics Adopted by the Grafters Brigade --- Government Candidates Sign Temperance Pledge --- Mr. H. M. Blair Spoke at Debec.

Woodstock, Sept. 10.—The Government workers and executive committee in the county are getting desperate. Last night a large store in the main street of the town, rented by the Opposition for campaign purposes, and in the windows of which many posters with campaign mottoes were pasted, was broken into the blinds and posters torn down. This was done, it is said, with the knowledge and approval of well known Government workers.

## The Truth Hurts.

The truth must hurt. The posters were printed in two colors, a red border with bold black letters, and the plain unvarnished facts set forth. The names of those who paid back money and the amounts found a place on one poster.

The way of the transgressor is hard and the men in Carleton county who

have abused the high trust reposed in them are paying the penalty. To have their errors placarded in public in the broad light of day, where the eyes of their friends and neighbors can rest upon the facts, is not pleasant, but they might have thought of the unpleasantness of posters and cartoons when they placarded the county with Carvell caricatures in the reciprocity campaign. This burglarious act will do much harm to the government candidates' cause.

## Will Hire Guard.

The posters will be replaced by the Opposition, and guards will be hired at night time to protect them, as well as the headquarters of the Opposition. The better element of the Conservative party had no hand in, and denounce the outrage of breaking into and entering the Opposition quarters.

## Re Joint Debates.

Another feature of the campaign is the usual challenge for a joint debate. Two Opposition speakers, Messrs. Veniot and Carter, have not hesitated at their meetings in Bath, Centreville and Debec, to tell the friends of B. Frank Smith, to inform him or any members of the Government, that they would welcome the opportunity to meet them in joint debate, but so far no word has reached the Opposition. William Balm, acting for Government forces, proposed to Organizer E. S. Carter on Saturday evening, that the candidates of both parties should have a joint debate on provincial issues on nomination day. The proposal will be placed before the Opposition candidates, neither of whom pretend to platform eloquence.

Smith is an old campaigner. Mayor Sutton is not a success upon the platform. If the Government committee is in earnest about having public issues discussed, the Opposition will meet members of the Government with two speakers on nomination day in Woodstock, or any other time or place.

## Temperance Pledge.

Donald Fraser, New Brunswick president of the Dominion Alliance, was in town Saturday and got the signatures of Messrs. Smith, McCain and Upham to the following pledge. Mr. Sutton promised to give it consideration:

- "1. Will you, if elected to the Legislature, support the present prohibitory law as it now stands upon the statute books?
- "2. Will you oppose any amendments intended or likely to weaken the act or render it ineffective, or hinder its becoming operative on May 1, 1917?
- "3. Will you use your influence and vote to secure the proper enforcement of the law?

## Two Fine Meetings.

Two Opposition meetings, one at Debec, the other at Lower Simonds, last evening occasioned great interest in those localities. The halls were crowded, as indeed are all the Opposition meetings, and the interest of those present was intense. At Debec the Opposition candidates and P. J. Veniot spoke until nearly 11 o'clock. They had a great reception. A feature of the meeting was the open request of a clergyman to the chairman, John Y. Flemming, that Mr. Veniot should give the facts of the patriotic potato purchase. After Mr. Veniot had done so, giving his authority for every statement, the clergyman expressed himself as thoroughly satisfied.

Before the meeting closed, a man in the audience called attention to the fact that H. M. Blair, formerly deputy minister of public works, was in the audience, and asked that he might be heard.

The chairman said that in a previous election campaign the Government had refused permission for the Opposition to ask questions, but the meetings of the Opposition were not conducted that way. If Mr. Blair wanted to speak or anyone else, they were at liberty to do so.

Mr. Blair, who has many friends and relatives in Debec, went to the platform and spoke briefly. He contrasted the charges against him as deputy minister with some of the charges brought against ministers themselves. He did not deny that he had accepted stock from the concrete construction company, but that was part of an arrangement whereby he was to leave the service of the province and become manager of a branch of their company. When he found that the proposition was a fake, he returned the stock, and

three years afterwards the Government ordered a secret investigation of the charge. Had the evidence been published as it was in the open investigations of the charges against ex-Premier Flemming, the people would have had the facts. But the Government dismissed him after the Teed verdict.

## How They Treated Ministers.

What did they do to Flemming after the verdict of this Royal Commission? They did not dismiss him, and today they are shaking hands and hobnobbing with him on the platform. "Baxter, too, returned \$500, but did the Government dismiss Baxter? B. Frank Smith says he returned some thousands of dollars. For what? Nobody knows for what. But the Government promotes B. Frank Smith and takes him into the cabinet. It seems to be almost a necessary qualification to be a member of the Government to have returned some public money."

## Juggled Accounts.

Blair sprang a surprise on the meeting by producing what he declares were the original alterations in the answers to questions made in the Legislature, in Baxter's handwriting. The Public Works Department, he said, compiled the answer's to Dugal's or Pelletier's inquiries from the records in the office, and he declared that these truthful answers were altered and sent back to the department to have new answers prepared. Blair says he kept the originals with alterations in Baxter's handwriting.

Landry's talk about surpluses was effectually shattered by Blair's production of copies of the requisitions from the Public Works Department made for payment of accounts in October in the years 1912, 1913 and 1914, and his statement as already published in his affidavit that these requisitions, covering many thousands of dollars, were sent back by the treasury board to hold over until after the close of the fiscal year. As Blair made point after point, he was liberally applauded. He spoke of his Conservative politics and his share in Conservative work in York county. He was after the men who had not given him fair play, and not in the interests of any party.

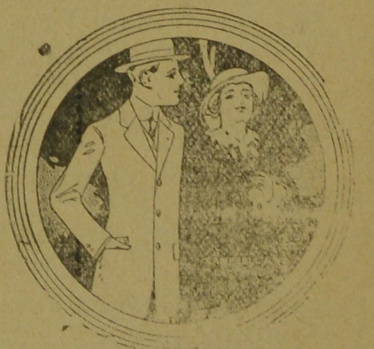

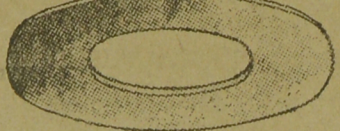
