QUEBEC BRIDGE GOES DOWN; GREAT NATIONAL DISASTER

Idea of Bridging the St. Lawrence at

Quebec Originated as Far Back as 1853

QUEBEC, Sept. 11.—The idea of a railway bridge across the St. Lawrence at Quebec originated as far back as 1853, when a New York engineer named Serrell made surveys, plans and estimations at the request of the city council of Quebec for a suspension bridge at or near the present site. The estimate of the cost then was about \$3,000,000. Courage and capital were lacking to carry out the plan, and the railway system of Canada was built on the south instead of the north shore of the St. Lawrence, which was eventually bridged at Montreal instead of Quebec. The project lay dormant until 1882, when the late M. W. Raby, of Quebec, obtained a charter at Ottawa to build the Quebec bridge on a new cantilever plan just then coming into vogue. Associated with him in the project was Alexander Luders Light, a distinguished engineer, who interested in it Sir James Brunless, the celebrated Scotch engineer, who had just completed the cantilever bridge on the Firth of Forth at Edinburgh.

The First Attempt to Erect the Bridge

Nine Years Ago Resulted in Disaster

After much delay and many vicissitudes the company was finally reorganized by S. M. Parent, with Ulrich Barthe as secretary, a New York engineer as chief, and E. A. Hoare as local engineer. The first attempt at erecting the bridge ended disastrously in the collapse of the unfinished structure, and the Dominion government then decided to reconstruct it.

The Federal Railway Department appointed a commission to examine the fallen structure and to make a report thereon. The gentlemen comprising this body were Henry Holgate, Montreal; Prof. J. G. G. Kerry, of McGill University, and Dr. Galbraith, of Toronto University.

Their report was so instructive that a copy of it was asked for by practically every prominent seat of learning on the continent. Tenders were received from one company in Germany, one in England, two in the United States and from the St. Lawrence Bridge Company, the last being a union of two strong Canadian companies.

The contract was finally let to the St. Lawrence Bridge Co. for the superstructure on April 14, 1911, that for the substructure having been let to M. P. Davis on Jan. 10, 1910.

Bridge was to Have Been the Longest in the World and Many Railways Were to Use It

The bridge was built primarily to carry the National Transcontinental Railway between the Atlantic and the Pacific, but the following railways will also use it: The C. P. R., the Quebec Central, the Grand Trunk, the Intercolonial, the Quebec and Lake St. John, the Quebec and Saguenay, the Canadian Northern and the Delaware and Hudson.

The principal dimensions of the bridge are: Length from shore to shore, 3,239 feet, with anchor buttresses 1,800 feet; length of central span, 640 feet; height of central span above the river, 150 feet; number of railway tracks carried, two; street car tracks, two; roads, two.

The bridge has a channel span of 90 feet longer than the Forth bridge, which until now had the world's record in this respect. The steel used in the bridge weighed 180,000,000 pounds and cost \$17,000,000, the main pier masonry costing \$1,500,000.

RUSSIAN OFFICIAL REPORT.

PETROGRAD, Sept. 11.—There have been no important developments in the situation along the Russian frontier from Riga to Roumania, according to today's official statement, which says: "The situation on western front is unchanged."

IMPORTANT CONFERENCE ON WAR SITUATION

Joint Military Reserves of France and Britain Will be More Effectively Employed.

London, Sept. 9.—Satisfactory conclusions were reached at a series of conferences held this week between the French and British ministers of war and munitions, says a British official statement issued this afternoon, regarding the most effective employment of the joint military resources of France and Great Britain. The official statement says:

A series of conferences has been held this week in Paris between the French and British ministers of war and munitions.

David Lloyd George and Edwin Samuel Montagu, Minister of Munitions, were accompanied by representatives of the War Office and the ministry of munitions, and by the officers from the staff of General Sir Douglas Haig, the commander in chief of the British forces in France.

An interchange of views took place as to interchanges to be drawn from recent military operations. Measures were discussed for the most effective employment of the joint military resources of France and Great Britain, and satisfactory conclusions were arrived at.

Held His First Court.

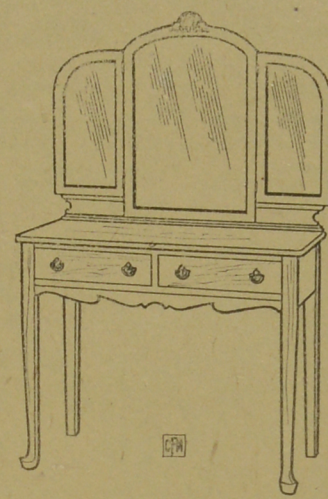

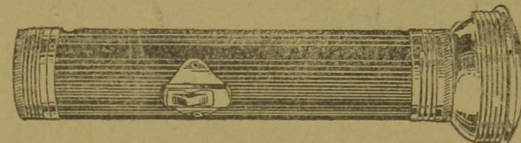
