## WOMAN'S COLUMN

### STITCHING A FALL FEATURE.

Braiding and silk stitching are the distinctive forms of trimming featured on many of the French garments imported for the fall and winter season. Serge in very fine weave and pile fabrics are noticeably among the popular frocks. Silk stitching and braiding is more the effect of heavy cording probably than the soutache effect, the former proving much richer, some times giving the effect of embroidery. Often the two forms of trimming are combined, giving the effect of shadow embroidery, this proving extremely novel. A dressy afternoon coat is cleverly trimmed with heavy stitching. A trotteur frock of navy serge with high roll collar, is girdled with self material and this is richly decorated with maroon silk stitching. This attractive form of trimming has been introduced on all manner of garments including millinery, bags, coats, gowns and wraps, and invariably lends a rich and distinctive finishing note.

### TAILORED BLOUSES WORN.

Among the new blouses shown is a most alluring model called the "tunic." Of course, it is Russian in type and its important feature is an extension below the waist line, which gives the long, Russian tunic effect. This extension is either gathered or circular and falls from a trim belt to midway between the hips and knees. Worn over a separate skirt of harmonizing material the new Russian blouse gives the effect of a complete costume. The idea is a practical one, for any woman can furnish the simple, well cut skirt and purchase one of these smart blouses to complete a really stunning new frock.

In some of the smartest new waist models color is combined with white either in the fabric itself or by the use of different materials, such as sheer crepe and taffeta or crepe and wash satin.

### WHITE FRUIT CAKE.

Two cups sugar, one cup butter, one cup milk or cream, two and one-half cups flour, seven egg whites, two teaspoons baking powder, one pound sliced citron, one pound seeded raisins, one pound chopped almonds, one pound chopped figs. Cream butter and sugar together; add milk. Sift flour with baking powder; add slowly, beat thoroughly. Whip whites stiff mix in gently. When all is thoroughly mixed add one pound each of sliced citron, seeded raisins, blanched and and chopped almonds and chopped figs. Save out a little of the flour with which to flour the fruit, before putting into the batter. Bake in a deep cake pan, lined with buttered paper. When cool cover top and sides with white icing. Candied cherries or other fruits may be placed at intervals on top of cake while icing is still wet.

## MONTREAL BATTALIONS TO BE AMALGAMATED

Montreal, Sept. 9.—Two Montreal French Canadian regiments, the 150th and 189th, are to be brought up to strength by amalgamation with battalions now at Valcartier commanded by Col. Readman and Col. Girouard.

Where four were authorized, two battalions will now be made up and proceed overseas at an early date. The staff of the Readman and Girouard regiments will remain and enlist new recruits.

The latter units are not to be disbanded, but all four being below their strength, it is thought advisable to bring about amalgamation, from which two complete battalions will emerge.

### IN THE CARPATHIANS.

German Report Claims the Russians are Being Held Back.

Berlin, Sept. 9. (by wireless to Sayville).—Renewal of violent Russian attacks in the Carpathians is reported in the official Austrian statement of September 6. It is said that, except for some small advantages, the determined efforts of the Russians to advance were thwarted.

East of Zelochoff, in Galicia, forty miles east of Lemberg, the Russians attacked after heavy artillery preparation. They were repulsed by the Austrian artillery fire.

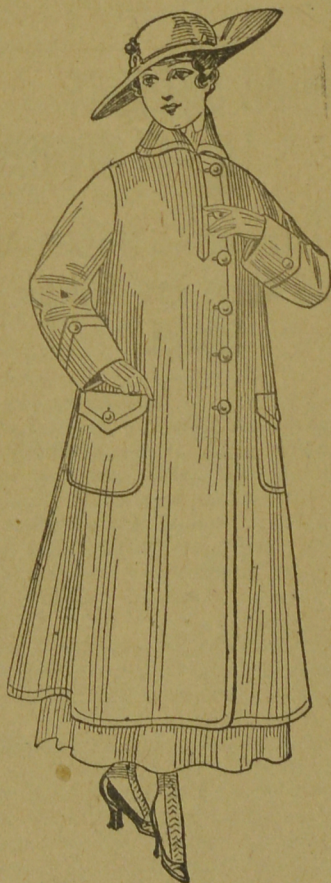

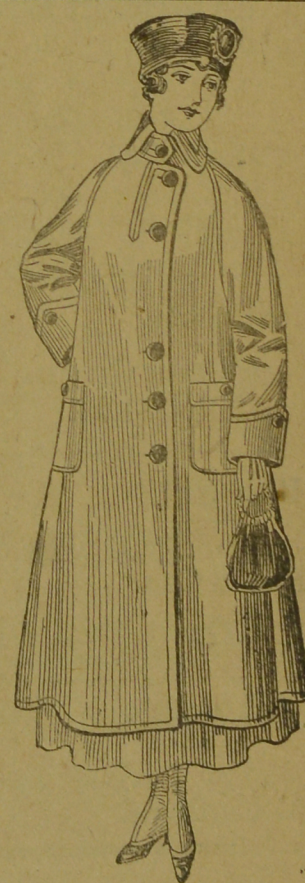
