Light to Moderate winds, fair
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More Defections From Liberal Party In England Likely

Lord Allendale is Resigning as Treasurer and Others Are Forming a Ginger Group—Co-operation With Labor is Resented—Humiliating for Lloyd George.

LONDON, June 30—Further defections from the Liberal party are now expected at any moment. Lord Allendale is resigning as treasurer of the party, and he is likely to be followed by Sir Murdoch MacDonald, while J. D. E. Rothschild, Leslie Hore Belisha, and Geoffrey Shakespeare, at one time Lloyd George's private secretary, are forming a ginger group within the party to supervise most strictly Lloyd George's co-operation with Labor.

While this is weakening Lloyd George's authority over the Liberals, it does not yet materially affect the political situation in the Commons, where he holds the balance of power and can still get enough Liberals to vote with him to ensure a majority for the government.

The position is personally humiliating for Lloyd George, however, because of Snowden's habit of seizing every opportunity to score points off the Liberals and treat them with contempt.

SATISFACTORY INTERVIEW WITH C. P. R. HEAD

Hon. W. H. Harrison in Conference at Montreal With E. W. Beatty Yesterday.

Montreal, Quebec, June 29—Every effort will be made in Saint John, N. B., to have eight new fireproof piers built in readiness for the opening of the winter season of the port on December first, according to Hon. W. H. Harrison, President of the Executive Council of New Brunswick, who was here today as personal representative of Premier C. D. Richards, to confer with E. W. Beatty, K. C., president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, in connection with the re-establishment of port facilities. A large part of the harbor accommodation of Saint John was destroyed by fire on June 22.

The interview with Mr. Beatty and other Canadian Pacific officials was most satisfactory and very encouraging. Hon. Mr. Harrison said. He and other officials from Saint John were pleased to find that Mr. Beatty "saw eye to eye" with them in their difficulties.

Present at the conference in addition to Mr. Beatty and Hon. Mr. Harrison were Grant Hall, vice-president, and J. M. R. Fairbairn, chief engineer, representing the railway, and H. C. Schofield, chairman; Alex. Grey, engineer-manager, and Frank T. Lewis, of the Saint John Harbor Commission.

Saint John had no intention of losing any of her shipping trade on account of the temporary handicap under which she was at present laboring, Mr. Harrison said. There would be sufficient piers and facilities to carry on reasonably well during the summer months, he added, and there were still five months before the important winter season commenced. It was considered quite possible to construct new, permanent steel and concrete berths before that time, provided action was taken in the immediate future.

FRENCH WAITER SUES FOR \$75,000 DUE IN TIPS

Paris, June 29—A man who was a waiter in one of the leading restaurants of Bordeaux for 10 years has just won the first round in his seemingly fantastic fight to obtain \$75,000 which, he asserts, is the amount he would normally have received in the form of tips.

His name is Escoubes, and he was a waiter at Bordeaux from 1918 to 1928. A year after he went to the restaurant his employers decided to abolish the tradition "pourboire" and to add 10 per cent to the bills of all clients for "service."

Escoubes did not conceal his disapproval of this new idea. It might he declared, make things easier for the foreign visitor, but undoubtedly tender to reduce the income of the waiter. Restaurant proprietors, he believes, are never so liberal in their payments as the satisfied diner sometimes is.

Escoubes estimated that he lost \$75,000 in tips in nine years, and the conseil des prud'hommes (a kind of arbitration tribunal) has now admitted that in principle his claim is just. Three experts have been appointed to decide exactly how much is due him. In order to do this they are to examine his employer's profits between 1919 and 1928.

NEW ISLANDS FOUND OFF THE COAST BRAZIL

Rio De Janeiro, June 30—Two new islands have been discovered off the Brazilian coast, according to a wireless report to the ministry of marine from the British Steamer Lalande. The islands were reported off the San Pedro rocks, north of Fernando Noronha, and were believed to have been the result of a change in the ocean floor after the earthquake felt recently in England and on the continent.

THE WEST HIT BY A PLAGUE OF GRASSHOPPERS

Swarms Working Way Through Central Nebraska

FIELDS ARE LAID BARE
Farmers Appealing To Governor Bryan For Aid

Lincoln, Nebraska, June 30—Great swarms of grasshoppers today worked their way through north Central Nebraska, ruining fair crops to such an extent that famine was predicted for the section.

Wheat, oats and alfalfa fields, even pastures, were reported left barren by the insects. Farmers appealed to Governor Charles Bryan for aid, so acute was the situation.

A BIG SAVING HAS BEEN MADE BY INDUSTRY

Washington, D. C., June 30—A total of \$250,000,000 has been saved American industry through simplification and standardization of various manufacturers in close co-operation with the commerce department, it was announced today.

More than 100,000 different associations and firms have accepted the simplified practice recommendations of the department, which were first proposed by President Hoover, as secretary of commerce.

"The most remarkable thing about this ready rise in number during the past ten years is the increasing interest in simplified practices as shown by consumers of the commodities simplified," Edwin W. Ely, chief of the simplified practice division said.

TWO MILLION BRITISHERS TAKE UP HIKING

London, June 30—Hikers in England now number more than 2,000,000 according to a recent estimate by J. E. Walsh, editor of the Hiker and Camper.

The steady increase in the number of hikers is seen by Walsh as a revolt against modern industrial conditions, the workers fleeing to the country during the week-end to escape the noise of the city.

The popularity of hiking, it is said, also has brought a better understanding between the villager and the city worker.

BLIND BRITON TEACHES 2,000 HOW TO SWIM

Mexborough, England, June 30—Blinded in a mine accident many years ago, Robert Gilling has taught 2000 men and boys to swim.

All the lessons have been given in his cottage drawing room. The pupils lie on a revolving stool, where they are taught the various strokes before visiting swimming pools.

Gilling is the only blind person in Great Britain to receive the honorable teacher's certificate of the Royal Life Saving Society for swimming and life saving.

Around the Globe Fliers Take Off For Edmonton

Disaster Was Averted by Inches as the Winnie Mae Brushed Against Tree Tops in Leaving Fairbanks, Alaska—May Finish World-Tour In Eight Days.

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, June 30—Wiley Post and Harold Gatty made a breath-taking departure in the monoplane Winnie Mae today, for Edmonton, Alberta, en route to New York on their record-breaking flight around the world.

Disaster was averted by inches when the Winnie Mae brushed against tree tops as it cleared the field on its second attempt. The smoothly functioning ship roared away at 3.20 a. m. (8.20 a. m., E.S.T.) into the far northern yellow night. With approximately 12,070 miles completed of the 16,000-mile journey and its end within an eight-day limit in sight, the fliers faced a 1,900-mile hop over northern plans to Edmonton, where they planned to refuel and snatch a few hours' sleep.

SUNDAY SERVICE FOR AUTOS ON P. E. I. FERRY

Charlottetown, P. E. I. June 30—Tourists to Prince Edward Island this season will find additional facilities have been provided by Canadian National in the way of a Sunday service across the Straits of Northumberland between Cape Tormentine and Borden P. E. I., whereby motor cars can be transported across the strait. On Sundays the car ferry leaves Cape Tormentine at 10.30 a. m. and 7.00 p. m., arriving at Borden at 11.30 and 7.55 p. m. respectively. Returning it leaves Borden at 9.15 a. m. and 5.15 p. m. arriving at Cape Tormentine 10.10 a. m. and 6.10 p. m. The regular Sunday train service from and to Prince Edward Island went into effect yesterday (Sunday). A large tourist travel to Prince Edward Island is expected this year by the Canadian National Railways hotel, the Canadian National, at Charlottetown, which was opened last month and the new car ferry which will go into operation the first part of July.

CONFISCATES ESTATE OF EX- PRESIDENT

Peiping, June 30—The estate of Yuan Shih-kai, first president of the Chinese republic, at Changteh, Honan province, has been confiscated by the Chinese government and will be turned over to the higher middle school of that city for educational purposes.

The estate includes fine buildings and orchard lands, which the school plans to rent to present tenants, obtaining revenue for education. Yuan Shih-kai, after becoming the first president of the republic, turned reactionary, and for a brief period made himself emperor.

GREEKS, JEWS IN BLOODY RIOT AT SALONIKI

Salonika, June 30—Violent communal between Greeks and Jews broke out again today.

The Jewish quarter was afire. Ten were killed and fifty wounded in fighting here.

The Jewish quarter was set ablaze at four points. One estimate said 200 houses were burned. The government is considering a proclamation of martial law to restore order. Feeling was running high.

GRAF ZEPPELIN OFF ON FLIGHT TO ICELAND

Friedrichshafen, Germany, June 30—The dirigible Graf Zeppelin left today on a flight to Iceland, with Dr. Hugo Eckener in command. The big airship of world's girdling fame novoged into the sky at 6.34 A. M. It carried 12 passengers on the cruise including Edward Smith, United States coastguard observer. Dr. Eckener said they would return Friday.

The route lay over Holland and England to Iceland and back via Norway.

POST AND GATTY ARRIVE SAFELY IN ALASKA

Nome, Alaska, June 29—Wiley Post and Harold Gatty, Around-the-World fliers, landed at Solomon, 36 miles from here, late today, after a non-stop flight from Khabarovsk, Siberia, a distance of around 2,500 miles. The landing was made at 2.45 p. m. (8.45 p. m. E. S. T.) today. They were not sighted over Nome.

The landing was 16 hours and 45 minutes after the takeoff from Khabarovsk, Eastern Siberia, a distance of about 2,500 miles. The fliers averaged about 150 miles an hour in their dash.

They continued their flight to Fairbanks at 5.30 p. m.
