### FUNERAL OF LATE THOMAS MORRISON AT MARYSVILLE

Cotton-Mill Ceased Operation While Procession Passed Through Town.

The funeral of the late Thomas Morrison, mayor of Marysville, took place at 2.30 o'clock this afternoon, from his late residence. At the Methodist church an impressive service was conducted by Rev. Thomas Hicks. The Town Council attended in a body as mourners. The pallbearers were George Eno, James Inch, Geo. Pryor, E. B. Staples, Geo. Galley and S. J. Hallett. The floral designs were beautiful and included a large pillow with the word "Father" from Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Crowley of Boston, a wreath from Court Alexander, I.O.F.; a wreath on stand from the Town Council. Interment was made at the Methodist Burying Ground. The flags in Marysville were flown at half mast and the Cotton Mill stopped operations while the funeral was passing through the town.

### COURT CONSIDERS IN SUIT AGAINST G.A. PERLEY, M.P.P.

The case of London vs Perley was concluded in the Chancery Court this morning. His Honor Judge White presiding. Mr. R. B. Smith of Oromocto, was called as a witness by the defence and gave evidence. Counsel then argued the case. Mr. R. B. Hanson for the defendant, Mr. George A. Perley, M.P.P., and Mr. P. J. Hughes for the plaintiff. Court considers the case is a suit brought by a former resident of Lincoln, now living in Springfield, Mass., against the defendant for the difference in the price of a farm paid him by the defendant and the price secured by the defendant by a subsequent sale. The plaintiff alleges that Mr. Perley as his agent, made misrepresentations to him through which the defendant sold the farm at a lower price than he could have secured for it.

### PARLIAMENT IN SECRET SESSION

London, April 25.—Arrangements for the secret session of parliament to be held this afternoon are complete. The House of Commons will meet under the ordinary rules at 2.45 o'clock and questions will be answered as usual, whereupon Premier Asquith will make a motion for a secret session.

This action may be debated, but as soon as it is carried everybody except the members of parliament and the sergeants-at-arms of the House will be ordered to leave.

Thereafter all entrances will be barred and guarded by the police.

### More Russians Arrive in France

Marseilles, France, April 25.—Another contingent of Russian troops arrived here this morning.

The first force of Russians arrived at Marseilles on Thursday of last week, and on Saturday passed through Lyons on the way northward, presumably on service with the French troops at the front.

The number in the expedition was not disclosed, though it was described as "a strong force."

The Russians were received with all military honors and debarked amid enthusiastic cheers.

General Minissier, the governor of Marseilles, accompanied by his staff, welcomed the commander of the Russian forces.

### DIED IN HOSPITAL.

Roy L. Green, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Green of Woodstock Road, Fredericton, passed away at three o'clock this morning at the Victoria Public Hospital at the age of twenty-three years. Death followed a lengthy illness which was due to an accident the deceased suffered on the Totobique River, where his leg was crushed by a rolling log. He is survived by his parents and four brothers and three sisters. The brothers are James and Harold of Napske, Wallace of Truro, N.S., and Herbert of Plaster Rock. The sisters are Mrs. Perley Giberson of Plaster Rock, Mrs. Wm. Whitlock of Boston, and Miss Mildred at home. The funeral will take place Wednesday afternoon leaving the house at 1.30. Rev. Dr. Smith will conduct the service. Interment will be made at the Rural cemetery.

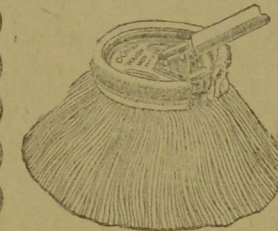

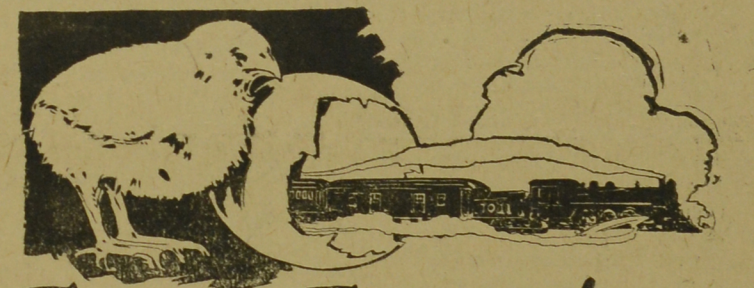

### LITTLE DAMAGE FROM ZEPPELIN RAID

London, April 25.—The official statement of the Zeppelin raid says:

"Last night's air raid over the Norfolk and Suffolk coasts appears to have been carried out by four or five Zeppelins, only two of which made a serious attempt to penetrate inland.

"About 70 bombs appear to have been dropped. One man is reported seriously injured. No further details of casualties are now available."
