## -Woman's Column-

### TAPIOCA AS A RICH DESSERT.

Most housewives use tapioca only  
for simple puddings, but there are  
many ways to use it in combination  
with fruit and other foods. Tapioca  
a la pistachio is made by breaking six  
macaroons into small pieces, putting  
them into a deep dish and soaking  
them in half a gill of sherry. Then  
scald one-half pint of milk, add two  
tablespoons of tapioca and cook it 15  
minutes. Then add one heaping tea-  
spoon of sugar and half a teaspoon of  
almond extract. Cool and mix in half  
a pint of whipped cream. Pour into a  
glass dish and garnish with chopped  
pistachio nuts and crushed macaroons.

For tapioca and prune delight take  
one pint of milk and cook it in a dou-  
ble boiler for fifteen minutes with four  
tablespoons of tapioca and a pinch of  
salt. Remove from the fire and add  
one tablespoon of butter, two of sugar  
and the yolks of two eggs. Pour into a  
buttered pan and bake half an hour  
in a moderate oven. Steam a cup of  
prunes until tender, rub through a  
sieve and spread over the top.

### FOR LUNCHEON.

Omelette with tomato sauce is a de-  
licious dish for luncheon. Beat the  
yolks of four eggs until foamy, then  
add two-thirds of a cup of milk with  
which has been mixed a teaspoon of  
flour, one-third of a teaspoon of baking  
powder and a pinch of salt. Beat well  
together, then fold in the stiffly beat-  
en whites and bake in a buttered pan  
in a hot oven.

For the sauce melt a tablespoon of  
butter in a saucepan and fry in it until  
brown a small, finely chopped onion.  
Add a little of any small vegetables  
and half a can of tomatoes rubbed  
through a sieve. Thicken with a table-  
spoon of flour moistened to a smooth  
paste with a little cold water. Season  
with salt and pepper and cook for five  
minutes, stirring constantly. Pour  
over the omelette as soon as it comes  
from the oven, and serve hot.

### Molasses Pound Cake.

Cream two-thirds of a cup of butter  
with three-fourths of a cup of brown  
sugar, and add two eggs, well beaten.  
Two-thirds of a cup of milk and the  
same amount of molasses. Mix half a  
teaspoon of soda with two heaping  
cups of flour, a teaspoon of cinnamon,

one-fourth teaspoon ground cloves, one  
fourth teaspoon ground mace and half  
a cup of seeded raisins dredged with  
flour. Bake in small buttered tins. Ice  
is desired.

### MOLASSES COOKIES AND CAKES.

It really is a shame to print any  
recipe requiring molasses when that  
article, once the cheapest sweetening,  
is now so high but then cheapness is  
not the only reason for putting mol-  
lasses in a cake.

#### Soft Molasses Cookies.

Put a cup of molasses in a mixing  
bowl and add a teaspoon of ginger, 2  
tablespoons of warm milk and one-  
third of a cup of softened butter. Dis-  
solve one-half teaspoon of baking soda  
in a tablespoon of hot water and add it,  
then add just enough flour to make a  
soft dough. Chill for several hours,  
then roll half an inch thick. Cut in  
rounds and bake in quick oven.

#### Molasses Layer Cake.

Cream a cup of brown sugar with  
half a cup of butter and add half a  
cup of molasses and two well beaten  
eggs. Dissolve a teaspoon of soda in  
a cup of sour milk and add to the mix-  
ture, flavor with a teaspoon of ground  
cinnamon and half teaspoon of ground  
cloves. Add two cups of flour and beat  
well. Bake in two layers and put to-  
gether with boiled icing.

#### Lemon Molasses Cake.

Pour a cup of molasses into a mixing  
bowl and add two tablespoons of melt-  
ed butter, a cup of boiling water in  
which a teaspoon of baking soda has  
been dissolved, a tablespoon of ground  
ginger and three cups of sifted flour.  
Bake in well greased layer cake pans  
and put together with lemon butter.

Lemon Butter—Beat together one  
egg, tablespoon of butter, one cup of  
sugar and the juice and grated rind of  
a lemon. Cook over hot water till  
thick.
