## Peace Machinery of the World is Being Put to a Severe Test

While a Battle is Raging in Manchuria, League of Nations Council Delegates Gather in Paris in an Effort to End the Strife — Japs Advancing on the Nonni Front.

While a battle raged in Manchuria the League of Nations Council delegates gathered in Paris today for a critical test of the World's Peace machinery as a means of ending the Chinese-Japanese strife.

Japanese were reported advancing on the Nonni front toward Anganchi and Tsitsihar after three days of heavy fighting in which casualties were high.

### Will Fight to the Last

Gen. Ma Chan-Shan, Chinese commander will defend Tsitsihar to the last, he told Frederick Kuh, veteran British United Press correspondent, just before he assumed personal direction of the Chinese manoeuvres.

The Japanese government instructed its representative at the League to pledge withdrawal of troops when the basis of settlement in Japan's "five points" is enforced in Manchuria. Japan urged China to co-operate.

Henry Pu-Yi, former boy-emperor of China, located in Mukden, reported to re-establish Manchu dynasty.

Tokio considered suggestions to send more bombing planes to Manchuria.

## MOSES AZIZ GETS AN EXTRA SIX MONTHS

Ottawa, Nov. 15—Pleading guilty to jumping his bail of \$4,000, Moses Aziz, 44-year-old Syrian, was sentenced to an additional six months in Kingston penitentiary by Judge J. E. Daly here on Saturday. The term will be added to his two-year sentence for receiving stolen goods.

Last January, Aziz was found guilty of receiving about \$1,000 of jewelry stolen from an Ottawa store. He was sentenced to two years in penitentiary and allowed in liberty on four thousand dollars pending an appeal. When the appeal was scheduled to be heard in Toronto Aziz failed to appear and the appeal was dismissed. He was arrested at his home here October 22.

Aziz pleaded he had understood the appeal was to be heard on October 23, not October 13, and that as soon as he learned of his mistake he came to Ottawa to give himself up. Crown counsel pointed out that he left the province in violation of the bail bond, knowing he should not have done so.

## BUSINESS IS PICKING UP IN CANADA

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 15—Substantial recovery of revenue was indicated by figures for October, issued yesterday by the National Revenue Department, the drop from October of last year amounting to only \$589,424. A decline of \$2,882,029 in excise duties, however—one of \$919,329—wiped out the gain.

Revenue collected from all sources totalled \$18,547,520, as against \$19,136,945 for October, 1930.

Customs duties netted \$8,131,366, against \$10,630,256; while excise taxes rose from \$3,372,652 to \$6,254,682.

Excise duties declined from \$5,008,065 to \$4,088,735.

For the seven months of the current fiscal year revenues collected by the Department amounted \$125,531,789 as compared with \$145,178,388 for the same period last year. Both customs duties and excise duties registered a drop; but there was a gain of \$6,006,366 in excise taxes.

An increase of \$71,406 was noted in income tax collections, the amount gathered in being \$823,443,33, compared with \$754,037 for October, 1931.

The net income tax collections to date amount to \$50,546,512 as against \$66,134,342 for the seven months of last fiscal year, a drop of \$15,587,840.

## TRANSFERS IN PROV. POLICE IN PROVINCE

Provincial Police headquarters here has announced a number of transfers in the police throughout the province. The changes affect Moncton, Bathurst, Fredericton, and Edmundston detachments. The transfers are to take effect immediately and are to be completed not later than November 20th.

The changes are as follows:—

Senior Constable G. B. Lacey, of Moncton, will go to Campbellton, in the Bathurst district, and will be replaced at Moncton by Senior Constable N. Pettigrew, of Woodstock. D. D. Mayes, from Moncton to Blackville, in the Bathurst district; Constable W. K. Davis from Moncton to Woodstock, in the Fredericton district; Constable L. W. Copp from Shediac to Moncton in the Moncton district; Constable A. D. Pelletier, from Buctouche to Shediac, in the Moncton district; Constable E. Almain from Edmundston to Moncton; Constable L. E. Steeves from Doakdown to Moncton, and Constable J. H. Pettigrew from Campbellton to Moncton.

For the last two years, Senior Constable Lacey has been in command of the Moncton detachment. He will now have charge of the Campbellton detachment.

It is understood these changes have been under consideration for some time. They were among the general orders issued by the commissioner.

## WILL STUDY THE SALES TAX OF CANADA

Montreal, Nov. 15—United States Senators, Congressmen and officials, in a party about 75 strong and forming the largest delegation of its kind that has ever paid a visit to Canada, arrived here today in a special train from Washington. The party, guests of William Randolph Hearst, prominent newspaper proprietor, will visit Montreal, Ottawa and Quebec to obtain first hand information concerning the operation of sales tax legislation in the Dominion.

Col. Hanford MacNider, U. S. Minister at Ottawa, and Mrs. MacNider, accompanied the party and will remain with it during the Canadian visit. The guests were welcomed to the city by Mayor Camillien Houde.

Four United States Senators headed the visiting delegation, which also includes 49 Congressmen, one of them a woman. The Senators were: W. H. King, Utah; T. P. Gore, Oklahoma; W. R. Austin, Vermont, and E. Thomas, Oklahoma.

## MOVIE STARS LIVING APART

Hollywood, Nov. 16—The Beau Brummel of Hollywood, Lowell Sherman, and his wife, Helene Costello, film player and sister of Dolores, are living apart.

But whether there is a separation neither would say. Sherman denied any split in their romance and Miss Costello's only comment was that she had retained a lawyer, and was living with friends.

## WILL DEAL WITH THREAT TO WORLD PEACE

Leading Statesmen of the Great Powers Meet at Paris

MR. DAWES IS ON HAND

Journeyed From London To Render Advice and Assistance

Paris, Nov. 16—The Council of the League of Nations convened today for its final effort to prevent war in Manchuria, the most critical test the League has ever faced.

The meeting started at 4.07 p. m. Leading statesmen of the Great Powers deeply concerned over the threat to world peace, gathered in the "clock room" of the Foreign Office, where the Kellogg Treaty, outlawing war, was signed a few years ago.

Although the United States is not a member, Ambassador Charles G. Dawes came to Paris from London to stand by with advice or assistance.

## INQUEST TONIGHT INTO SHOOTING OF CECIL LAWSON

The inquest into the shooting of Cecil Lawson, South Devon youth, on Remembrance Day last week, while out hunting in the woods near Penniac, will be held this evening in the local police station, commencing at eight o'clock. Dr. O. E. Morehouse, of Upper Keswick, will act as coroner. Several witnesses will be called, including Arthur Saunders, nephew of the deceased, from whose rifle the shot was accidentally fired.

The accident occurred early on Wednesday morning, Lawson and Saunders were hunting in the woods near Penniac. Lawson, who was walking in advance of young Saunders, was struck in the back, when the gun in the hands of Saunders accidentally went off, when he was attempting to reload, after killing a porcupine. Lawson was brought out of the woods some little time later on an improvised stretcher and never lost consciousness until in the Victoria Public Hospital, where he was rushed in an attempt to save his life.

### Almost Got Him

Arthur Young, a resident of Lincoln almost lost his life last week, when he was partially overcome by the fumes of carbon monoxide gas, which had leaked up from the heater in his car. Mr. Young while driving his car, found that he was becoming nauseated, and the trees and other features of the landscape were whirling around and around. Just in time, he caught himself from sinking into a stupor, and crawled out of the machine. He crumpled on the ground beside the car, and it was some time before he regained consciousness. The narrow escape recalls similar occurrences, the majority with fatal results, which have occurred in various parts of the Dominion during the past several years. The fall of the year, when side windows are closed seems to be the most dangerous period for such.

### Honored War Heroes

The war veterans of Middle Southampton and vicinity united in a successful celebration of Remembrance Day on the evening of November 11. The meeting was held in the Baptist church and was well attended. A. W. Fleming, a war veteran, presided very acceptably and the honor roll was read by Victor Sharp. Dr. M. L. Jewett, M.L.A., was the speaker for the occasion and delivered an eloquent and interesting address.

## The Facist Party of Germany Won a Great Victory

The Result of the Hessian Elections Reveal a Smashing Triumph for the Party led by Adolph Hitler — Made Better Showing Than in 1930.

BERLIN, Nov. 16—The threat of Adolph Hitler's Fascist party against the government of Chancellor Heinrich Bruening became acute today with Complete returns from the Hessian elections revealing a smashing Fascist triumph.

The Hitlerites won an even more impressive victory than they had expected. They far surpassed their showing in the 1930 general elections when the Fascist party was increased from a small minority to a powerful opposition faction in the Reichstag.

In the Hessian ballot the Fascists more than doubled their highest previous total of votes, winning 27 seats in the diet. With their allies the Nationalists of Dr. Alfred Hugenberg, they will command a total of 28 seat out of 86.

## THE DEBATERS KEEP BRITISH OFFICIALS BUSY

London, Nov. 16—Hard worked officials of the Ministry of Labor, busy effecting the National Government's revised dole regulations, have been given additional work through the fact that hundreds of American college and high school debating teams this year are debating the question of unemployment insurance.

## CANARY SOLVES COURT ISSUE

Chicago, Nov. 16—A canary placed on the witness stand in Judge Edward B. Casey's court, warbled a song and thereby freed its former mistress of a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses.

Mrs. Dorothy McGarry, the defendant, was accused by Mrs. Susan Hiawatz of selling her a bird that would not sing.

"It was a female," she told the court. "I tried every known way to make the bird sing, but it wouldn't. Mrs. McGarry sold the canary to me as a male and they sing. Females don't."

Judge Casey called for the bird. Mrs. McGarry approached and pleaded for a song. Suddenly the bird began to sing.

"The bird wins and so do you," the Judge said to Mrs. McGarry.

## PAINTINGS ARE RECOVERED BY THE POLICE

Moscow, Nov. 16—The recovery of five famous paintings by old masters was announced today by Moscow police.

The paintings, valued at more than \$500,000, were stolen from the Moscow Museum of Fine Arts in April, 1927. The thieves had been arrested. The paintings included Rembrandt's Christ, and Titian's Ecce Homo.

## THE FILM FOLK MORONS NAGEL IS INDIGNANT

Hollywood, Calif., Nov. 16—Dr. John Frederick Dashiell, North Carolina professor of psychology, may be "up to an old political trick" when he writes that "the average movie is made by morons," Conrad Nagel, a prominent actor and vice-president of the Motion Picture Academy of Arts and Sciences, declared today.

Nagel, frequent spokesman for the film workers, was quick to express his disfavor of the professor's views.

"It probably is something akin to the old political trick of obscure persons who attack persons of national prominence in order to attract attention to themselves," the actor said.

He took exception to Dr. Dashiell's statement that "When I say the average movie is made by morons I am referring chiefly to actors and actresses. Producers and directors generally are wise boys with brains."

## THE PROUD ONES SLATED FOR THE ROCK PILES

Minneapolis, Nov. 14—The rock pile beckoned today to men who refused to work after the city provided jobs to relieve unemployment.

Mayor William Anderson was told one-fourth of those summoned to support families now receiving charity refused to report or didn't like the looks of the laboring projects and went home. The city offered 63¢ cents an hour.

He plans non-support charges to permit rock pile assignment in court.

## SPUD MARKET HOLDING FIRM

Hartland, N. B., Nov. 15—Yesterday's potato market was firm at present prices but there was a lack in demand. Market centres appear to be well supplied at the present and not anxious for more. Haulings and offerings by farmers are light, except in inferior grades going to the starch factory here. Prices range from 30 to 35 cents for Canada Grade 1 Green Mountains or Irish Cobblers. For starch purposes, 30 cents were paid for all grades, and 25 cents for culls.
