C. P. R. INAUGURATES DAY LETTER SERVICE

Canada's Great Railway Corporation
 Keeping up With the Times

Montreal, Aug. 28.—Mr. J. McMillan, who has initiated many notable improvements since he became general manager of the C. P. R. telegraphers eighteen months ago, has decided to inaugurate today (August 28th), an important service entirely new to Canada, over the hundred and ten thousand miles of wire under his immediate control, namely, the day letter, which may now be sent between points in Canada on the Canadian system at a rate very much reduced, as compared with the usual commercial rush telegram.

Mr. McMillan is convinced that many of those who send telegrams would be quite satisfied if these arrived on the same day, whereas a proportion of the cost of the rush telegram is due to the cost of speedy delivery. The day letter of fifty words will be rated at one and a half times the cost of a regular rush message of ten words, and can still bring an answer the same day, which is as quick as many people desire.

There are sixteen hundred C. P. R. telegraph offices throughout Canada, at each of which the new service will be in force, so that this will be a Dominion wide service stretching from Louisburg, Nova Scotia, to Victoria, British Columbia.

Messages will be taken in either French or English, code words not being permissible.

NIGHT STEAMER FOR THE ST. JOHN ROUTE

Steamer Viking Secured—Will Begin Service on Friday Next.

The St. John Globe yesterday had the following:

"On Friday next another steamer, the Viking, will be put on the St. John river to ply between here and Fredericton. She will be one of the fastest boats on the river. She is built of oak, propeller driven, a hundred feet long with 25 foot beam, has compound surface condensing engines, and is able to make twelve and a half miles an hour. The Viking will be run as a night boat, leaving Indian town wharf at noon on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, arriving at Fredericton at 8 o'clock, returning on alternate days. When the tide is suitable she will come to the Market Slip for the purpose of taking on freight."

It is understood that Mr. J. W. Williams, who is operating the steamer Hampstead, is concerned in the new venture. The idea of having a night boat is that more time may be devoted to the collection of freight, particularly farm produce.

Paris, Aug. 29.—On the Verdun front last night French troops made progress near Thiaumont work, the War Office announced today. German attacks in the vicinity of Fleury and Vaux fort were repulsed.

POLITICAL ACTIVITY IN CARLETON COUNTY

Both Parties Are Actively Preparing For an Election—Conventions This Week.

Woodstock, Aug. 28.—There is considerable quiet preparation going on for the by-election campaign. Both parties will hold conventions this week and it is understood that the probable candidates are in the minds of the leaders and have given their consent.

Today it was semi-officially announced that W. S. Sutton, of Woodstock, would be B. Frank Smith's colleague. This eliminates Fred Squires, whose friends said he was sure of being chosen. There may be an interesting contest in convention, however, when the government party meets here Thursday. The opposition party is to meet in convention on Wednesday.

The difference between this by-election and that of January, 1915, is so apparent that many are remarking upon the contrast. At that time hundreds discouraged a contest; today every honest man welcomes the chance to protest against the misconduct and graft of the administration.

Hon. Messrs. Murray and Landry are announced to speak here Thursday. Hon. Mr. Baxter has not said he will support B. Frank Smith's candidature with his presence as yet. There are very many Conservatives who will vote against the worst government New Brunswick ever had.

The opposition has made it clear that Conservatives who want to join in giving New Brunswick better government will not lose their identity as Federal party men. There has been too much party politics in New Brunswick's affairs in the past and the opposition is opening the door for less party feeling and more public spirit.

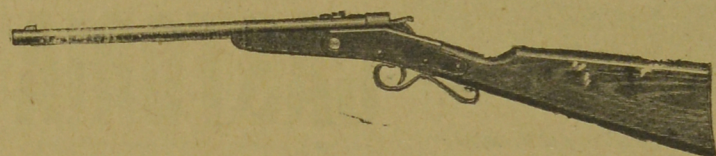

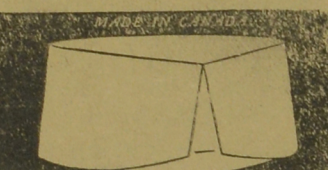
