HEAVY TRAFFIC FOR GOVERNMENT RAILWAYS

Ottawa, Sept. 25.—Particularly heavy traffic to and from the ports of the Maritime Provinces is anticipated as soon as the St. Lawrence river closes. Apart from the extensive movement of troops, there will be big shipments of wheat, munitions and general supplies. To make the necessary provision for this business, Hon. Frank Cochrane, Hon. J. D. Hazen and Mr. F. P. Gutelius were in conference on Saturday.

Arrangements for adequate rolling stock, ocean transport and siding and terminal accommodation were under consideration and details are being worked out.

LADY SHOT A MOOSE.

Wife of a Bridge Guard at Canaan River, N. T. R.

Mrs. Alfred Beckwith, wife of the guard on the Canaan River, N. T. R., bridge, shot and killed a large bull moose which had a handsome set of horns and dressed 500 lbs. The horns measured 53 inches and had twenty-two points and splendid boards, the points and boards being unusually even and well matched and of a rich brown color.

Mrs. Beckwith was walking along the track near the bridge about 7:15 in the morning and sighted two moose in the ditch beside the right of way. Hastily taking cover behind the crest of the railway embankment, she fired, killing the animal with the larger horns.

KILTIES SECURED THIRTY-ONE RECRUITS

The strength of the 236th Overseas Battalion is already nearing the 200 mark.

The opening meetings of the Kilties' recruiting campaign were held in the fifteen shiretowns of the province last night, and they proved the biggest attractions yet attempted to bring the people together, which was their purpose.

Last night's events furnished the spectacular incidents of the campaign and from now on it will be a more serious business, as the work of getting in the recruits must be pressed forward vigorously.

London, Sept. 26.—Twenty-nine persons were killed in last night's Zeppelin raid, it was announced officially today.

Kenneth Taylor, had been wounded severely in the leg in the recent action on the Somme front. After qualifying as a Lieutenant from the Queen's University contingent of the Officers' Training Corps, Lieut. Taylor was appointed to the 59th Battalion and was later appointed musketry instructor. Lieut. Taylor was among the first of the officers of that unit qualified to go to the front. Mr. Jeremy Taylor was stationed in the B. N. A. branch in Fredericton some years ago. He married Miss Minnie Elder, eldest daughter of the late Hon. William Elder.

FIVE GERMAN AEROPLANES BROUGHT DOWN IN THE SOMME

The War Office today announced that five German aeroplanes were brought down and others were badly damaged.

AT ROCHESTER RACES.


In the 2:19 trot at Rochester, N. H., on Friday, James W. McKinney, a Fredericton horse, was outside the money. The best time was 2:16½.
