## A LIGHT SENTENCE.

Six Months' Imprisonment in Amherst Military Stores Case.

Percy T. Smith, who pleaded guilty of receiving stores and provisions from soldiers, was sentenced at ten o'clock this morning by His Lordship Sir Wallace Graham. The sentence was that he be imprisoned in the county jail at Amherst for six months and pay \$500. In default of payment the sentence to be further extended by one year in the county jail.

His Lordship made very little comment on the case and Mr. Smith gave no statement. This case has aroused considerable interest in the county, and a petition signed by representative men of the town was sent to His Lordship asking clemency.

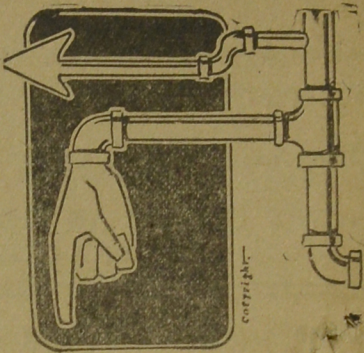

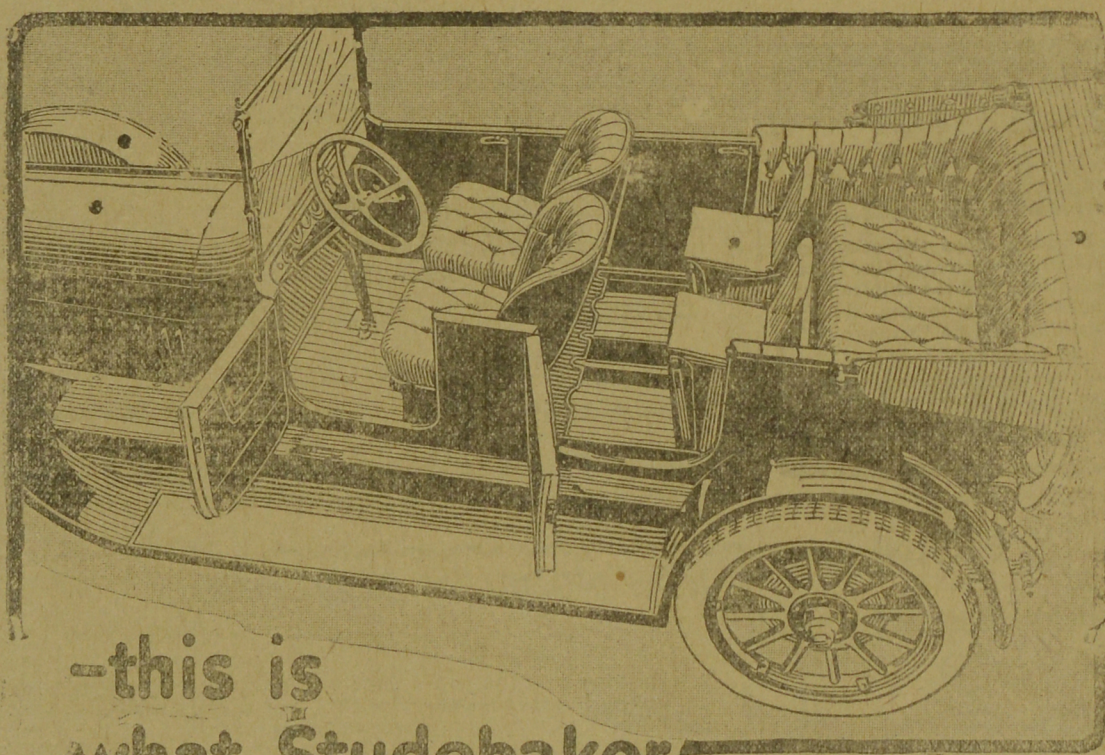

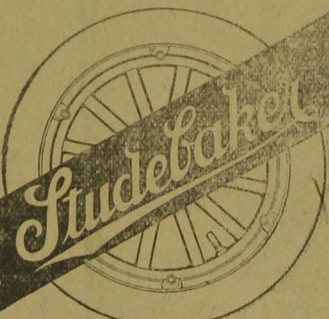
