MAJOR W. J. OSBORNE
REPORTED WOUNDED
ON WESTERN FRONT

Now in London Hospital—Left With 55th Battalion—Sergt. Albert T. Finmore Reported Among Casualties.

Mrs. W. J. Osborne this morning received a cable from her husband, Major W. J. Osborne, stating that he was wounded and in hospital in London. Major Osborne left Canada with the 55th Battalion. After remaining in England for some months, he was drafted to a New Brunswick battalion in France, and has seen some hard fighting.

Major Osborne was an officer in the 71st York Regiment, and at the time of his appointment to the 55th Battalion represented Queens ward as an alderman of the Fredericton City Council. He was also well known as principal of the Fredericton Business College.

In the last provincial general election Major Osborne was one of the members of the Opposition ticket.

Sergt. A. T. Finmore.

A former Fredericton man in the person of Sergt. Albert T. Finmore has been reported wounded. He enlisted at St. John in the 64th Battalion and was drafted to a New Brunswick battalion in France.

Sergt. Finmore was a printer by trade, and had followed his trade in various places in the Maritime Provinces, including Fredericton, St. John, Sydney and Glace Bay. He was a veteran of the South African war.

Arthur Breaux, of Upper Blackville, serving with an infantry unit, is reported wounded.

NATHANIEL JONES
REAPPOINTED TO
LOCAL POLICE FORCE

Charles Pace, Temporarily Appointed, Retires—Policeman Marshall Appointed Sergeant—Reduction in Force May be Made.

Nathaniel Jones has been reappointed to the Fredericton police force, and will go on duty as patrolman tonight. The appointment was made this week by the Police Commission. Mr. Jones was on the force for a short time during the summer, but resigned to take a position as manager of the York Hotel when the proprietor, Mr. Harold M. Young, retired on account of ill-health. Later Mr. Young disposed of the hotel to Coun. G. Howard Young, of Taymouth, and Mr. Jones accepted an offer to rejoin the police force.

Charles Pace, who has been temporarily a member of the force for several months, retires on the appointment of Policeman Jones.

A Sergeant Appointed.

Mr. William McKay, chairman of the Police Commission, announced this morning that Policeman Charles Marshall had been appointed sergeant, the appointment to date from October 1st. This appointment has been expected for some time. Sergeant Marshall had been acting sergeant for some time, and in the interim between the periods of office of ex-Chief McCollom and Chief Finley, was in charge of the force.

Chairman McKay stated this morning that there was a prospect of a reduction of the police force by one.

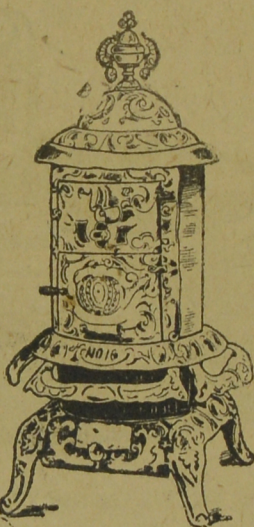
The city now has six police officers, which has been the maximum for some time.

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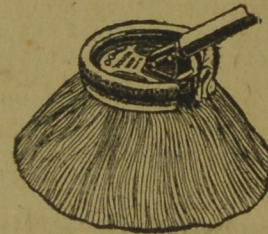
