TWO MEMBERS
OF POLICE FORCE
NOTIFIED TO QUIT

Police Sergt. Duncan and Policeman Saunders Not Wanted After End of Month—Charges Against Others Will be Made.

Police Sergt. William Duncan and Policeman William Saunders were formally notified by Chief of Police McCollom on Saturday that their services would not be required by the Fredericton Police Department after April 30. The notice was given on instructions to the Chief by the Police Commission and was the result of the sessions of the Commission held last week. At those sessions the decision to dispense with the services of Sergt. Duncan and Policeman Saunders on the ground that they were not performing police duty in an efficient and satisfactory manner and had conducted themselves in a way which the Police Commission deemed improper.

The information upon which the Commission came to this conclusion was furnished by Mr. M. E. Arscoff of Toronto, a detective, who spent some weeks here during the winter in connection with Canada Temperance Act cases. His information was secured while he was working on those cases and it is understood to be to the effect that the police officers mentioned were not doing what they should toward the enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act as well as misconducting themselves in other particulars.

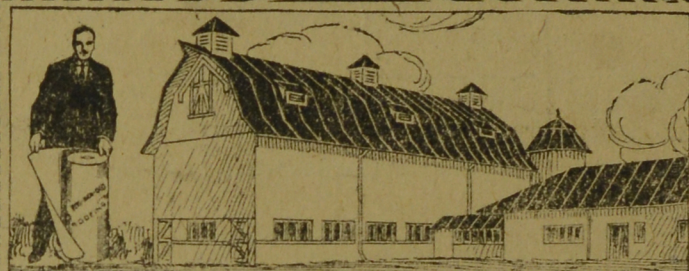
