

FLEMMING STILL BOSS IN CARLETON COUNTY

**B. Smith Will Have to Eat His Words
Spoken in Westmorland.**

Woodstock, N. B., Aug. 31.—The Flemming wing of the government party has triumphed again. The ex-premier is to take part in the Smith campaign, and the new Minister of Public Works will have to eat the words he used in Westmorland, that Flemming had done very wrong, but that the government had cleaned house.

Smith and his friends, when they found that Borden classed Flemming with the Fosters and the Garlands, grabbed the federal patronage and deprived the ex-premier of the fruit of his nomination as federal candidate.

But now, when Smith wants re-election, it is all important that all party fights shall be headed off. Flemming's friends demanded his return to the Premiership of New Brunswick on his acceptance by Borden as a federal candidate, and the prospects of winning the election for Smith depended upon accepting his terms.

B. Frank Smith and his party conspiracy to become the party chief have been defeated, and J. K. Flemming, with Treasurer Teed and other supporters, win. Flemming, it is announced, will support Smith. Public plunder is a great cement for party differences. It is said that W. S. Sutton, one of Flemming's warmest supporters will be the colleague of Smith.

The reception of Andrew McCain and George Upham as opposition candidates has been most enthusiastic. Everywhere the telephone took the good news and all over the county the personal and political friends of the candidates and the supporters of better government are preparing to give them a bumper vote.

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NAVAL LOSSES COMPARED.

Germany's Ocean Trade is Confined to Submarines.

According to the German Admiralty's statement, the losses of the British and French navies in line of battleships and cruisers to August 1 comprised 72 vessels, with a total displacement of 495,050 tons, while German losses in the same classes during the same period were 25 warships, with a total displacement of 62,667 tons. But Germany's ocean trade is still confined to merchant submarines.

A CURSE AND AN ASSET.

A Striking Contrast in the Case of Two People.

In 1740, according to the records of the eugenists, a woman was born named Ada Take. True to her name, she took everything there was to be had in the way of liberties and licenses. She died a confirmed drunkard and altogether she had 700 descendants. Among them were 100 children born out of wedlock, 181 women of the street, 142 beggars, 46 workhouse inmates and 76 criminals. It has been estimated that this woman cost the country \$1,200,000.

By way of contrast the Ladies' Home Journal tells of an Englishman, born in Queen Elizabeth's time—a clergyman with a good wife. In the year 1900 there had been 1,394 descendants of this family traced and identified. Of them 295 were college graduates, 13 college presidents, 65 professors, 60 physicians, 108 clergymen, 101 lawyers, 30 judges (one a vice-president of the United States), 75 army and navy officers, 60 prominent authors and 16 railroad and steamship presidents.



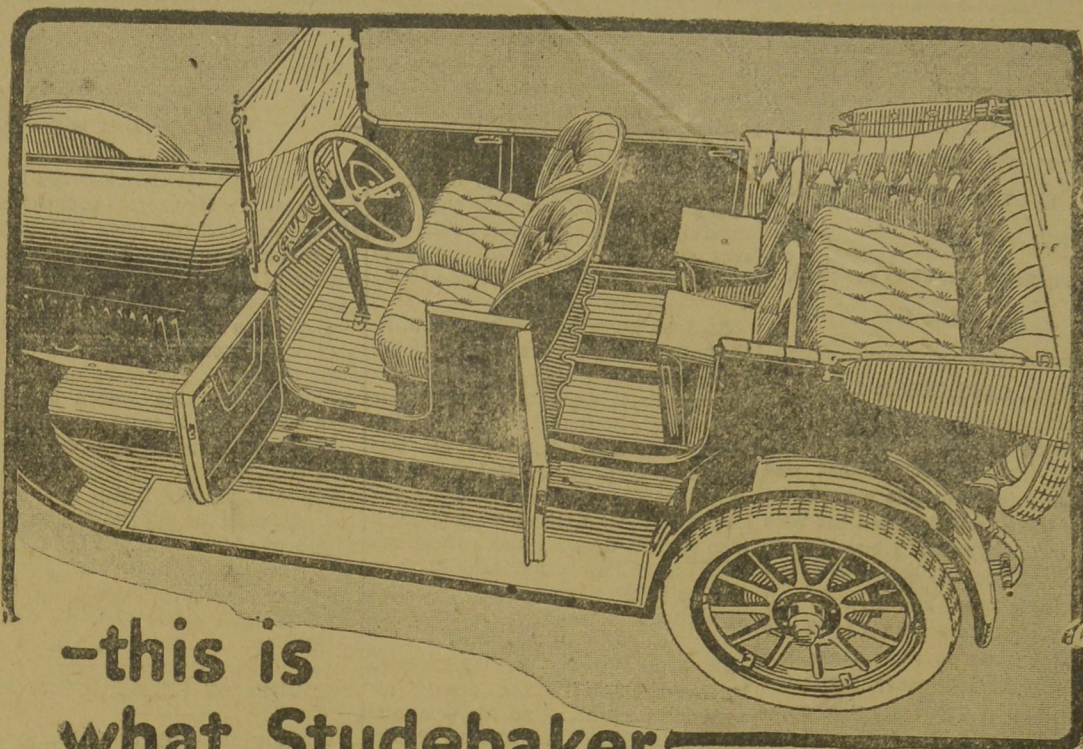
