ANOTHER JOB FOR A ROYAL COMMISSION

Government Considers Serious Charges Preferred by Mr. J. K. Pinder Against Mr. H. M. Blair.

The provincial government at its meeting in St. John last night had under consideration charges preferred by Mr. J. K. Pinder, M.P.P., against Mr. Harry M. Blair, secretary of the provincial public works department. It is charged by Mr. Pinder that Mr. Blair was a stockholder in the Concrete Constructions, Limited, an Ottawa concern, which had a contract to clean and paint bridges in the province a few years ago on a thirty per cent. basis. It is said that Mr. Pinder's charges are supported by affidavits which he secured from Mr. Colby, former manager of the company, while on a recent trip to Ottawa. The affidavits were handed over to Premier Clarke, who, after perusing them and giving them several weeks' consideration, asked Mr. Blair for his resignation. Mr. Blair, so it is said, refused to resign and demanded that the matter be investigated. It was to consider this phase of the question that the government held a meeting in St. John last evening. Hon. Mr. Murray, the acting premier and Hon. Messrs. Morrissy, Baxter and Landry were present. Mr. Blair was also on hand and presented his side of the case to the members of the executive. As a result the government had decided to adopt its usual course and name a royal commissioner to investigate the charges. It will be remembered that W.B. Chandler of Moncton, was appointed a royal commissioner a year ago to investigate all the departments of the government. Becoming tired of the job, he pitched it some weeks ago and it is scarcely likely now he will be put on a war footing again. Mr. Blair says that he does not fear an investigation and has invited his enemies to go ahead and do their worst.

CHARLOTTE CO. MAN FROZEN TO DEATH

St. Stephen, Feb. 21—A death from exposure to the intense cold of Saturday night and Sunday morning occurred this evening at the Chipman Memorial Hospital. Saturday evening, Ernest McGaw with two companions, left St. Stephen to drive to his home at Oak Hill, fourteen miles from here. He separated from the others at a crossroad at about ten o'clock that night, but never reached his home. In the morning his parents made enquiries concerning him and on learning that he had reached the village the night before, commenced a search for him. It was near eleven o'clock when he was found, lying beside the road in an unconscious condition. He was brought to the hospital, where it was found that both hands and both feet were badly frozen and would have to be amputated if he survived, but he never regained sufficient strength for an operation and passed away this evening. He was about twenty-five years of age and unmarried and was a son of Alexander McGaw. He was troubled with asthma and subject to fainting spells and it is believed that he was overtaken by one of these when he fell at the side of the road. He had tried to enlist sometime ago but had failed to pass the medical examination.

EMMY OF STORK'S NEST.

ZEPPELIN BROUGHT DOWN BY FRENCH GUNS.

Paris, Feb. 22.—The entire crew of the Zeppelin airship brought down by French guns near Bradant LeRoi yesterday, 22 in number, perished, according to a Havas despatch from Bar-Leduc. The Zeppelin was brought to earth by the first shot from an automobile-mounted cannon at Ravigny, the despatch adds.

Paris, Feb. 22 (via London).—German forces yesterday evening delivered a strong attack against the French positions at the forest of Givency (east of Suochez), according to official announcement made by the French War Office this afternoon, and were successful in penetrating the first lines of the French trench and for a distance of 800 metres. They then occupied some of the French communicating trenches, but a French counter attack resulted in driving the Germans from all but a few of these positions.

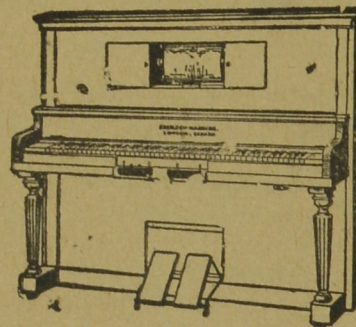
