Has Recovered from cold

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 22—Jess Willard, heavyweight champion, expects to be in New York by the end of the week to start training for the ten-round bout with Frank Moran March 25. He has recovered from the cold that kept him indoors for more than a week and his manager announced today that the champion would be prepared to resume light training at the Chicago Athletic Club on Thursday.

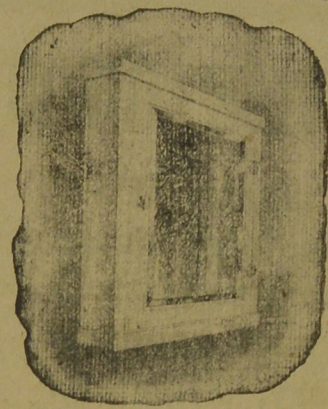
