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THE U. S. LANDSLIDE

Belated returns from the United States election show that President Hoover and his administration got the worst walloping administered to any political party in the great Republic since the Civil War. Governor Roosevelt's total vote is in excess of twenty million and his majority over President Hoover will, when complete returns are in, be close to seven million. The only large state state carried by President Hoover was the Quaker Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and even in that state he did not get the normal republican majority. The six states carried by the Republicans include Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont which have only a small vote in the electoral college. Although President Hoover during the campaign made a strong bid for the votes of the farmers and tried to scare them by pointing out that a victory for the Democrats would mean the lowering of the duty on farm products, his appeal failed to strike a responsive cord. The states which include the corn belt, the wheat growing belt and the hog raising belt, all rolled up decisive majorities for Governor Roosevelt. They also turned out Republican state governors, as well as congressmen, senators and state legislators. As a result of the avalanche of ballots the Democrats will have nearly two thirds of the senate and a majority of one hundred in the House of Representatives. This would indicate that they made a thorough job of ousting the Republican administration.

The campaign of the Democrats was well handled from the outset. The Chicago convention adopted a snappy platform which made clear the attitude of the party on the great questions of the day. There was no hedging on the question of prohibition, but a plank in the platform, drafted by Al Smith, promised immediate modification of the Volstead Act and the ultimate repeal of the 18th amendment. The Republican attitude on prohibition on the other hand was not so decisive and evidently failed to hold the wets of the party. While the Volstead Act landed many votes into the Democratic column, the nation-wide business depression and its attendant unemployment were the most potent factors in winning the election for the Democrats.

It is pretty well known that Democrats as the opposition party had no sources on which to draw for heavy subscriptions to their campaign fund. The unsuccessful campaign of four years ago left the party with debit balance of over a million dollars. It is presumed that the money was raised in some way and the party obligations discharged. At the beginning of the late campaign Governor Roosevelt made a personal appeal for campaign subscriptions, and stressed the point that the party was fighting the battle of the people and that the people must provide the wherewithal. He expressed a willingness to accept subscriptions ranging from one dollar upward. The response must have been a generous one, because a few days before the election, it was announced that a million dollars had been subscribed and that a further half million would be needed. Having won the fight no doubt the deficit will now be promptly wiped out.

Whatever sympathy is felt for President Hoover and his administration seems to be largely confined to the United States. The president proved himself a hard worker, honest and conscientious, but judging by some of his administrative acts he must have labored under the belief that he was impregnable and the Republicans had held office so long that they appeared to be under the impression that the United States belonged to the saints and that the saints were all enrolled in the Repub-

lican party. The attitude of the Republican administration towards European nations was not of such a nature as to arouse much sympathy for the party in its hour of defeat from the other side of the Atlantic. The American people have declared overwhelmingly for a new deal, and having provided President-elect Roosevelt with a friendly senate and Congress, there is no reason why they should not get it.

Our neighboring state of Maine, or as the stent song says, "Dear Old Maine", elected a Democratic governor and two democratic congressmen in September, but in the presidential election last Tuesday it fell back into line and gave a substantial majority for Hoover. Still it played fairly safe as the two Democratic congressmen will wield a greater influence with the administration than will President Hoover. It is surprising that such a great horse racing state should have not made a better job of picking the winner of the big event.

Al Smith during his Boston speech took a fall out of Senator W. H. Moses, of New Hampshire, one of the Republican leaders, whom he accused of going about and trying to arouse sympathy for Smith on account of his failure to secure the party nomination. The returns from New Hampshire show that the senator was among the slain.

Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania, who took no part in the recent political campaign in the United States, broke his silence on election night to express the opinion that the Republican party of which he is a member got just what it deserved.
