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A Plea for Economic Restoration of the World by the King

History Meeting at the White House This Afternoon—Will Discuss the Important Subject of War Debts—Great Interest Attaches to the Conference.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 22—President Hoover and President-elect Roosevelt will hold their war debt conference this afternoon in one of the first floor parlors of the White House, according to a final official announcement by Secretary Theodore Joslin.

Previous plans had called for the conference in the Lincoln study of the second floor. Mr. Hoover was still uncertain, it was said, whether to receive Mr. Roosevelt in the blue, red or green room. Each of these rooms is used for receiving distinguished visitors on purely formal and social calls. The blue room is used when receiving distinguished foreign visitors. It is also the room where the incoming president is received by the outgoing executive on inauguration day.

FISHING TACKLE FROM ENGLAND TO BE DUTY FREE

Under the New Trade Agreements the 20 P.C. Duty is Abolished—Is Popular With Salmon Anglers.

Anglers in this section of the province, particularly those who take delight in battling with the fighting Atlantic salmon, will be interesting in knowing that fishing tackle imported from England under the new trade agreement will enter Canada free of duty, as against a tariff of twenty per cent which formerly prevailed. It is scarcely necessary to state that English fishing tackle is the best in the world, and is largely used on the rivers of New Brunswick, by both resident and non-resident anglers. Of course the depreciated value of the pound sterling will affect the price, and there will be an excise tax of three per cent. The abolition of the duty, however, will mean a substantial cut in the retail price as compared with last season. The tariff item as agreed to by Parliament last week reads as follows:

"Customs tariff—440j. Trawls, trawling spoons, fly hooks, sinkers, swivels, sportsmen's fishing reels, bait and hooks, and fishing tackle, n.o.p.; British preferential tariff, free; intermediate tariff, 25 per cent, general tariff, 30 per cent."

Increased Imports

In the year 1925, when the Harb's Island salmon pool on the Saint John River, began to attract attention, New Brunswick imported directly from the Old Country fishing tackle, including rods to the value of \$3,042, while during the year ending March 31st, 1932, the total ran up to \$8,467, an increase of \$5,425. Quebec's importations of fishing tackle from England showed a somewhat greater increase, but it is known that of the tackle shipped into that province, including the celebrated Hardy brand, for which a Montreal firm has the Canadian agency, some found its way into New Brunswick. New Brunswick's importations from the United States, mostly trout fishing tackle, increased from \$3,322 in 1925 to \$4,873 in 1932. Nova Scotia imported fishing tackle and rods from England to the value of \$6,030 in 1925 and \$8,216 in 1932.

JAIL BREAKERS MAY BE HEADING TOWARDS N. B.

Portsmouth N. H., Nov. 21—Nine inmates of the Rockingham county jail, who, with Harry E. Whitten, 45, of Lynn, another inmate, escaped Sunday morning, were still at large to night, and were believed headed toward the Maritime Provinces of Canada. Whitten was captured in Lynn Sunday.

While police of New England kept an alert watch for any trace of the prisoners especially along the international border, the attorney-general investigated circumstances which led to the wholesale delivery.

Police were especially anxious to contact a former convict, identified as "Dick," who, a Portland, Me. woman said, visited one of the escaped men, Fred Peters, Portland, last Friday. The woman said she and "Dick" called on Peters and that the following day "Dick" left her Portland lodging house, saying he was going to New Hampshire. The authorities followed a theory that the jail break might have been arranged to release Peters and that the other nine men took advantage of the situation. Peters has served many years in prison and jails.

MOOSE AND DEER BEING SOLD IN BOSTON MARKET

Although the sale of game birds and moose and deer meat is prohibited in New Brunswick, there does not appear to be any restrictions so far as the Boston market is concerned. The Boston Post reports moose steak as selling in the market of that city at 65 cents a pound, which is a pretty high price. Venison "from the provinces" is quoted at the same figure, while Mallard ducks are selling at \$2 each. It is believed that New Brunswick is supplying the market with the bulk of its venison as a number of carcasses taken in this province by Massachusetts sportsmen have recently passed through the city en route to Boston. At sixty cents a pound a carcass of deer would yield more than sufficient to pay for the cost of a non-resident hunting license. One party of hunters, travelling by auto recently took home the carcasses of three deer under a permit.

THE SUPPORT OF CANADA WAS FOR DISARMAMENT

Sir George Perley, Who Headed Delegation to Geneva Reports to Parliament.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 21—Canada gave whole-hearted support to any and every constructive proposal for the limitation and reduction of armaments which was laid before the Geneva Disarmament Conference, Sir George Perley, who headed the Canadian delegation, informed the House of Commons today.

Sir George read to the House a letter which he wrote to Prime Minister R. B. Bennett, summarizing briefly the proceedings before the Geneva conference from its opening on Feb. 2, until the adjournment of the first session in July.

"The work of the first session cannot be considered an unqualified success, and yet it is not fair to say that nothing was accomplished," Sir George informed the Prime Minister.

"The ordinary complexities of disarmament, were complicated still further by several special events, which added to the difficulties of the delegates in reaching an agreement. The situation in the Far East, and the exigencies of politics in certain European countries were among these factors. As a result not as much was accomplished as was hoped for."

Sir George was accompanied to the conference by Hon. Maurice Dupre, solicitor general, and Miss Winnifred Kydd, president of the National Council of Women. To both of his colleagues he paid tribute on the floor of the House. "There were only two ladies who were full delegates to the conference," he wrote the Prime Minister, "and we are proud of the fact that one of them was a Canadian."

Subjects of great importance will be considered at the next session of the conference, Sir George informed the Prime Minister in his letter. "There is reason to believe that if the views of France and Germany can be reconciled, decisions for far-reaching importance may be taken at the forthcoming conference," he wrote.

CENTREVILLE MAN ACQUITTED

Houlton, Me., Nov. 21—Hugh Burpee of Centreville N. B., on trial here for the last two days on a charge of manslaughter, was found not guilty today. Burpee was the driver of a truck which ran over and killed a six-year-old girl in Bridgewater, Me. The defense produced 16 witnesses, who declared that to them the accident appeared to be unavoidable.

RICHIBUCTO HAS FIRE LOSS

Richibucto, N. B. Nov. 22—The Empress Hotel and garage adjoining were destroyed by fire early this morning, with damage of \$20,000. The hotel was owned by Phileas Cormier, John E. Leger, post office inspector, received injuries as he jumped from a second storey room to save his life. Arthur Bobin, another guest at the hotel, was burned about the face and head in making his way through the flames.

PING-PONG CRAZE HITS THE PARIS CAFES

French Desert Billiard Tables For the New Game

BIG DEMAND FOR TABLES

The Students Cut Their Classes to Play the Game

Paris, Nov. 22—France has gone ping-pong crazy. It has taken to the game with that same frenzy it played in the adoption of other American and British sports.

To your middle-aged boulevardier and cafe habitue, the invasion of the game is a tragic nuisance. Billiard tables have been removed in dozens of Paris cafes to make room for ping-pong tables.

Until recently, the Parisian so inclined could have a quiet, dignified game of billiards at his favorite haunt. Today he is lucky to find a table free in the larger cafes, since their number has been curtailed in ping-pong's favor.

To make matters worse, the tranquility he requires for his billiard finesse has necessarily fled. For billiard halls ring with the shout and stamping of young men and women, hinting white pellets across a miniature net.

Ping-pong is entrenched solidly here. There are hundreds of tables on the Left Bank, along the Boulevards, the Bourse, and in the Champs-Elysees district, where, as at the Golf Marbeuf, championship matches are played. The number of tables in the shadow of the Sorbonne is causing some concern among the faculties because of the number of students, notably Filipinos, who cut classes to spend an hour playing.

CAPITAL MAY BE ENTERED IN LOOP WITH ST. JOHN

There is revived interest in hockey with the announcement here today that Fredericton may enter a team in a Southern Sector comprising tentatively, Saint John, Sussex, and another team from Moncton. A meeting will be held tonight in the office of J. Bacon Dickson, and the executives of last year's Capitals have been invited to attend.

An executive of last year's team told the Mail today that the probable team might comprise several home brews, several of the disrupted Dalhousie Rangers club, and Norm Cook and Aubrey Webster, recently released by the Moncton Hawks. Negotiations have been going on for some time past, according to source near the executive. The meeting tonight will decide whether or not the capital will be represented in Maritime hockey this winter.

Saint John, according to report, is outside the pale of the larger Maritime circuit, and would have to have competition. Earlier reports were that Fredericton would not enter a senior team in hockey this winter.

WILL PAY INSTALLMENTS

President Hoover And Roosevelt In Conference

Imperial Parliament Opened Today by His Majesty—War Debts Not Directly Referred to in the Speech From the Throne—Royal Couple Were Cheered by Thousands.

LONDON, Nov. 22—King George made a plea for economic restoration of the world in opening the new session of Parliament today, although he did not mention war debts directly in the speech he read before a joint meeting of the Houses of Commons and Lords.

The King and Queen were driven to the House of Lords in their state coach, while thousands along the Mall and near the Parliament Buildings cheered their Majesties in the colorful procession. The King expressed the earnest hope that the world economic conference meeting soon "will be able to reach an agreement on measures required to deal with the causes which brought about the present economic and financial difficulties of the world."

ADOLF HITLER ASKED TO FORM NEW CABINET

Is Told by the President That He Must Not Tamper With the Reich

Berlin, Germany, Nov. 21—After nine years of striving, Adolf Hitler today received a mandate to form a cabinet, but it was under conditions which, immediately at least, he could not accept.

The Nazi leader had a 15-minute interview with President von Hindenburg in which a government communiqué said, he "declared himself most emphatically to the president of the Reich that his party could co-operate only in a government led by himself."

The president handed him a written memorandum setting forth that certain things in the Reich must not be tampered with if the Nazis took over the government, and late tonight Hitler replied with a letter in which it was understood, he emphasized the restrictions expressed by President von Hindenburg were too narrow.

The contents of the Hitler letter were not made public, but it was learned that the Nazi leader did not close the door.

The Nazi leader's advisers remain hopeful that President von Hindenburg would consider wholly reasonable their chieftain's demand, as the head of the largest party in Germany to be invested with the highest political power in the Reich.

One of the conditions set forth in the von Hindenburg memorandum was a declaration that there must be no tampering with the Reichswehr, the government's emergency decrees, the federal commissionership over Prussia, the foreign policy and article 48 of the constitution, which provides the government with drastic powers to deal with emergencies.

It was Hitler's belief that no statesman with his hands thus bound could assume responsibility. The question, therefore, reverted once again to President von Hindenburg, whose answer to the Hitler letter tomorrow is awaited with the greatest interest.

IS SOMETHING NEW IN THE WAY OF PUBLICITY

"United Advertisers" of This City Pledge Themselves to Serve the Public Free of Charge—Promoters Rake in the Cash.

A new and original advertising scheme, promoted by visitors from Toronto has been pulled off here. A number of garage proprietors, tonsorial artists and beauty shop proprietresses who describe themselves as the "United Advertisers of Fredericton," have issued a little book of printed tickets, which promises the holders a free haircut, a free adjustment of auto brakes, a suit of clothes pressed free of charge, a free dance and a free marcel wave, etc. In all five hundred books were issued and sold readily about the city at fifty cents each. The purchasers were given eleven tickets, which entitles him or her to services which ordinarily would cost around \$3.00. It is said that the "United Advertisers" each signed a contract, which pledges them to perform the services free of charge on presentation of the tickets and this is set forth on the back of the booklet.

How It Will Work

Just how the scheme will work out remains to be seen. It is said that at a dance held on Saturday evening more than one hundred free tickets were honored. As the tickets are transferable it means that in most cases the advertisers will be called upon to do a lot of work for nothing. One garage proprietor has played safe. He has pledged himself to tow cars a distance of five miles free of charge. Should he get the towing to do which is unlikely at this season, he hopes to be able to deliver most of the cars at his own garage and render a bill for repairing them. A clothes presser, however is in a somewhat different position as he may be called upon to clean and press five hundred suits of clothes free of charge. While the scheme has the merit of originality, it looks at this distance as if its patrons had purchased a large sized gold brick. Those who pulled off the scheme and the boys who sold the tickets are the only ones who will see any real money out of it.
