COAL WILL BE HIGHER.

So far as can be learned, very few American schooners have been char tered to carry coal to this port dur ing the spring months. This is due to the keen demand for tonnage in the coasting trade and the high freight rates. Last year the rate on hard coal from New Jersey points to Fredericton was \$2.50 per ton. This year the chances are that it will be \$4.50 per ton and perhaps \$5. Manv tern schooners are being used in the deal trade and are getting charters at rates never heard of before.
