A SMART NONAGENARIAN.

It was a graceful and well deserved tribute of respect and admiration which friends paid to Mr. John Anderson, ex-M. P. P., of The Barony, on Monday evening. Here is a man who has passed his ninety-fifth milestone and is still in the enjoyment of full mental and bodily vigor. Born in New Maryland of Scottish parentage, he has spent the whole of his long life in the county of York. Following the occupation of a farmer and lumberman, he has done much towards the development of the natural resources of the province, and in the face of adverse conditions and disadvantages which are not met with in present day life. A man of sterling character, wonderfully endowed with mental gifts, and possessing to a marked degree the happy faculty of making and keeping friends, the name of John Anderson is one which commands respect in all sections of central New Brunswick where he is known. Men of his splendid type are a valuable asset to any country, and it is often a cause for regret that they do not always receive the credit for their achievements which they so well deserve.

Mr. Anderson has raised a family of eight sons and daughters, all of whom are filling positions of usefulness in the communities in which they live. While many of New Brunswick's sons and daughters have in the past been attracted to the great republic to the south, Mr. Anderson is able to point with pride to the fact that all members of his family found Canada good enough for them, and have remained here.

Mr. Anderson has always manifested a keen interest in public affairs, and for three years gave the county of York honorable service in the Legislature. Although always a strong party man, he never allows politics to interfere with his personal relations with opponents, and when he told a gathering of friends recently that he had not an enemy in the world, he merely stated what everybody knows to be a fact.

Mr. Anderson's numerous friends rejoice that so worthy a man has been spared to reach the ripe old age of 95 years, and all earnestly hope that he has still many years of usefulness and happiness before him.

The Conservatives of Westmorland in convention on Monday nominated Dr. O. B. Price as their candidate for the House of Commons. There were rival aspirants for the honor in the person of Lieut. Col. F. B. Black, Mr. W. F. Humphrey and Mr. Medley Sidal, but the Moncton dentist was able by some hook or crook to land the nomination. Dr. Price has been a member of the Legislature for five years, and is noted for the frequency with which he becomes "inebriated with the exuberance of his own verbosity." He also knows how to get "stuck on his

own shape," and if these accomplishments, along with a colossal nerve and an abnormally developed bump of self-esteem are factors in winning votes in these trying times, Dr. Price should have no difficulty in getting himself elected to Ottawa.

Vancouver News-Advertiser: The Germans are sometimes astonishingly stupid. They are now sending out to the world carefully prepared stories that the British army authorities are saving the men from the British Isles and sending Canadians, Australians, South Africans and New Zealanders into the dangerous places. This is evidently a foolish attempt to make the "colonials" feel that they are sacrificed to British prudence and cowardice. Germany has already tried this device with the Irish. As if the British casualty lists did not speak for themselves! As if Ireland, Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa did not know better than Germany what is happening in their own armies!

The Liberals of the County of Westmorland have shown their confidence in Mr. A. B. Copp, M. P., by again nominating him as their candidate for the Federal Parliament. Mr. Copp has been in public life for a number of years, and is known as a forceful and eloquent speaker as well as a close student of political problems. As an Opposition member of the Federal House he has rendered valuable service in exposing the many shortcomings of the Borden administration, and there is evidence that his work is heartily appreciated by his constituency. Mr. Copp stands high in the councils of the Liberal party, and well deserves the honor which has been conferred upon him by the party in Westmorland.

Victoria Times: If we desire irrefutable evidence of Germany's rapid exhaustion of man-power, we need not look further than the military situation on the western front. Only once since the great offensive on the Somme began has a counter attack in force been launched by the enemy to recapture the important positions he has lost, and this failed. The brilliant success which attended the recent French stroke in the Verdun region is another piece of evidence. Yet it is on the west front that Germany's greatest menace lies. It is nearest the Rhine, the backbone of her military power. She may overrun Roumania, but nothing can save her once she suffers military disaster along the line between the sea and Switzerland.

The Right Hon. Herbert Asquith, Prime Minister of Great Britain, and the greatest statesman of his time, has resigned, and will be succeeded by the Right Hon. Andrew Bonar Law, who will undertake the task of forming a new government. The change has been made with the object of speeding up the war. Premier Law is a native of Kent county, New Brunswick, being the son of a Presbyterian clergyman. He remained in New Brunswick until he was thirteen years of age.

Montreal News: "Good food is daily being thrown into the river," said an official today, "simply because it has been rendered unfit for consumption by being kept too long in storage. I know for a certainty that only recently 500 barrels of oysters were dumped into the river, and not only oysters go this way, but bananas, celery, and in all probability potatoes. The price of potatoes today is nothing more or less than highway robbery."

Toronto Globe: There has been no attempt to refute the charge that the Deutschland's cargo was Canadian nickel. There has been vociferous denial, but no evidence to back it up. To sneer at the men who are determined to stop the leak by calling them "nickel-plated patriots" will not help to settle the question at issue.
