HIS MAJESTY KING GEORGE PAYS VISIT TO FIRING LINE

Saw all Sections of the Army at Work in
the Field--Was Accompanied by the
Prince of Wales--Prouder Than Ever
of His Gallant Troops.

With the British Army in France, Aug. 15.—King George has been at the front for a week. He left today for England, and his departure was the first information that the majority of the troops had of his presence. As a matter of precaution, the visit was kept a secret and there was no display or big review as on the occasion of his visit last fall.

The King simply went about seeing all sections of the army at work and the fields they had won. The flutter of a bit of bunting bearing the royal coat of arms as a motor car sped along the road in clouds of dust, and motor truck drivers and passing battalions started and looked around exclaiming "the King."

The Prince of Wales, was with the King all of the time. The monarch was dressed in khaki, with the crossed batons of a field marshal on his shoulders, and the prince wore the uniform of a lieutenant in Grenadier Guards. Neither wore any decorations, and but for their features, which were recognized everywhere, they might have been taken for two of a party of officers making a round of inspection.

At the front, King George today issued a general order to the army in France expressing his appreciation of the splendid condition and cheerful confidence of all ranks, and, through personal visits to the scenes of later desperate struggles, his understanding of the demands made upon the courage of the men and the physical endurance required to assail and capture positions prepared during the past two years, which were stoutly defended to the last.

"I realize not only the splendid work done in immediate touch with the enemy," says the general order, "but also the vast organizations behind the fighting line. Everywhere there is proof that all men and women are playing their part, and I rejoice to think that their noble efforts are being heartily seconded by all classes at home."

King George concluded his message as follows:

"Do not think that I and your fellow-countrymen forget the heavy sacrifices the armies have made and the bravery and endurance they have displayed during the two years of bitter

At one point on the line the King's conflict. These sacrifices have not met General Sir Henry Rawlinson, the cause has triumphed. I return home in vain. The arms of the Allies will never be laid down until our more than ever proud of you. May God guide you to victory."

The above is the first intimation that King George had been to the front in France.

When the King went to call on General Birdwood he met a battalion of Australians, who were just coming out of the trenches after taking Pozieres ridge. With their steel helmets back on their heads, their shirts open at the neck, their skins tanned as Indians, their clothes rent and streaked with earth stains, they lined the road and gave him an Australian cheer.

MR. THOMAS P. TAYLOR DEAD AT SHEFFIELD

Well Known Sunbvy Man Had Inter-
esting Career--Was Interested
In River Steamers

The death occurred at his home at Sheffield last night at the advanced age of 83 years of ex-Councillor Thos. P. Taylor, one of the best known and most highly esteemed residents of Sunbvy county. He had been in failing health for some months and news of his death did not come as a surprise.

The deceased gentleman was a native of Sheffield and had a most interesting career. In the early 'fifties, when a young man, he joined a party of young men organized in his own district and proceeded to far off Australia on a gold seeking expedition. He was absent several years and upon his return became interested in shipping ventures on the Great Lakes. He afterwards became associated with the late Mr. George F. Baird of St. John in the coasting trade. He became interested in river steamboating at the time the business of the old

Union Line was taken over by the Star Line Steamship Co., and became a director and vice-president of the latter company. He continued his connection with the Star Line Co. until it went out of business a few years ago.

For many years the late Mr. Taylor conducted a general store in connection with his farm at Sheffield. He took an active interest in public affairs and for thirty-three years represented the parish of Sheffield in the Sunbvy Municipal Council, being several times honored by election to the office of warden.

The deceased was twice married, first to Sarah L., daughter of the late Mr. Benjamin Barker, and secondly to Annie L., daughter of the late Mr. Wm. Harrison.

One son, Capt. Charles C. Taylor, of Sheffield, and one daughter, Mrs. Jas. Gilchrist, of St. John, survive.

The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at 2.30, with services at the house.

Public Schools Notice.

FOR the special benefit of pupils who have reached Grade VI and who are unable to continue the common school course, the Trustees will open a pre-vocational department in the York Street School building. Applicants for admission to this department will file their names with the Secretary and obtain an admission certificate.

In accordance with the Compulsory Schools Act, all children from six to fourteen years of age must be in attendance at school. In every case the reason for non-attendance must be given to the Board of School Trustees by the parent or guardian of the child.

In pursuance of Sec. 73 of the Schools Act, the Secretary is required in every case to demand a physicians' certificate or other evidence of recent successful vaccination before a permit may be issued.

All the schools will be re-opened on Monday, 28th inst., at 9 o'clock, a.m., and permits may be obtained at the office on York street during the previous week. Applicants for admission to the Model School, whose names have been registered, will apply for permits on Friday, 25th inst.
