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The Lindbergh Baby Has Not Been Found; The Search is Kept up

Criminal Hunting Agencies of the Entire Nation Being Mobilized at Trenton to Plan An Effective Search—Many False Clues Have Been Followed Up.

HOPEWELL, N. J., March 5—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh opened his telephone—free of police surveillance—today to callers who might have word of his kidnapped child, Charles Jr., but no word came.

The child has not been found "dead or alive," the State Police Troopers and press conference revealed shortly before 9 a.m. today.

Other developments included: A mobilization of criminal hunting agencies of the entire nation at Trenton today to plan an effective hunt for the kidnappers.

Further questioning of servants and former servants, including Betty Gow, the baby's nurse, and Marie Cummings, former nurse of Anne Morrow Lindbergh.

Investigation of hundreds of false clues, and letters and messages now totalling thousands.

ARREST MADE AT HARTFORD IN LINDBERGH CASE

Red Johnson a Friend of the Nurse Maid, Taken Into Custody on Suspicion.

Hartford, Connecticut, March 4—Henry (Red) Johnson, friend of the nursemaid to the kidnapped baby, was taken into custody here tonight coincident with the discovery of a letter and a postcard in the Hartford post office addressed to Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh.

Johnson, a sailor, and a friend of Miss Betty Gow, the baby's nurse, was taken into custody at 7 P. M., at the request of New Jersey officials. In front of the home of his brother, John Johnson, was found a green coupe, which authorities described as similar to the one seen near the Lindbergh home the night of the kidnapping, March 1.

"Important Clue"

County Detective Edward J. Hickey, who became nationally known for his investigation in the case of Gerald Chapman, hanged for murder, questioned Johnson while waiting for the New Jersey officers and announced he believed he had obtained "a very important clue."

The special delivery letter, mailed at a corner box, was addressed to Mrs. Lindbergh, and forwarded to Hopewell. The postcard, printed similarly to the first one received by the colonel earlier in the week, reads:

"Baby still safe, Get things quiet." The address: "Chas. Lindbergh, Princeton, N. J." The —J. was reversed, as it was on the first card. The word "quiet" was underlined.

Hickey and State's Attorney Hugh M. Alcorn refused to make public any further details of their examination of Johnson, who told newspapermen he had been out of work and had come here to visit his brother.

He said he had known Miss Gow for about three years and had been "going with her" off and on.

Meanwhile Alcorn notified John J. Tooley, secretary of Governor A. Harry Moore, of New Jersey:

"We've got the car, and we've got a milk bottle found in the car."

BETTY GOW'S MOTHER IS INTERVIEWED

Glasgow, March 5—Betty Gow's mother, Mrs. Taylor, refused to discuss the Lindbergh kidnapping today for fear of provoking "gang vengeance" on her daughter.

The mother of the Lindbergh's nurse was distracted because she had not heard from Betty since the kidnapping.

"Betty must be terribly upset," Mrs. Taylor said. "But I do not want to make any statement because I might endanger her."

CANARY TALKS ITSELF INTO A SINGING MOOD

Bellingham, Washington, March 4—A talking and singing canary bird is owned by Mrs. Sylvia D. Hopkins here. It is believed to be the only one in the United States.

PLAN TELESCOPE FOR PIKE'S PEAK

Colorado, Springs, March 5—Pike's Peak, guide post to the Rockies in the gold rush days, and a lure to tourists the world over, may be drafted as an aide to science. Dr. W. F. G. Swann of Philadelphia, scientist, has revealed tentative plans for the erection of a telescope on the summit of the massive peak, more than 14,000 feet above the sea-level, in an effort to discover the source and direction of the newly discovered cosmic ray.

SALARY CUT APPROVED BY PARLIAMENT

The Government Had a Record Majority in Favor of the Bill—Admiral Duff Speaks Out.

Ottawa, Ont., March 4—Reinforced by two Ontario Liberals and 11 members of the Independent groups, the Bennett Government rolled up a record majority today in adopting a resolution proposing ten per cent. reductions in civil servant salaries and parliamentary indemnities. A Government majority of 55 resulted when 83 united in support and 28 in opposition.

Although the resolution passed the House late in the afternoon by an impressive majority, it met stubborn opposition in committee stage. A bill, based on it, was introduced by Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Finance Minister, shortly before the 11 o'clock adjournment hour.

Mitchell F. Hepburn (Lib., West Elgin), and Thomas Cayley (Lib., South Oxford), cast their votes with the Conservatives. Hon. Robert Gardiner, leader of the United Farmers of Alberta and all his followers who were in the House, also supported the Government. James Woodsworth and Angus MacInnis, two Laborites, voted with 26 Liberal to oppose the salary cut. Many Liberals were absent from the chamber when division bells sounded.

Duff Speaks Out

William Duff, (Liberal, Antigonish-Guysboro), who has built up a reputation for plain talking, said he opposed the resolution for several reasons and "one is that I consider that as a member of Parliament, I shall, before the end of this session, have earned \$4,000 which I am supposed to get from the people of this country." He opposed reducing parliamentary indemnities and said "If we had the proper spirit in this parliament we would get up and say that we are entitled to \$4,000."

Judges, Lieutenant-Governors, officers of the army and navy and Royal Canadian Mounted Police will be exempt from the salary cut. This brought concerted opposition from many members. "Is it fair," asked Mr. Duff, "that stenographers and clerks in the Department of National Defence should have to pay 10 per cent. of their salaries into the coffers of this country to help us out of this mess while the brass hats, admirals and commodores and all the rest get away with their full salaries? I say it is not fair and not right."

PASTOR ENDS LONG GRIND

Chicago, March 5—The Rev. H. L. Cawthorne has ridden to success on a bicycle.

After 33 years of pedaling around his parish he announced his retirement Thursday night, saying he thought both he and his bicycle needed a rest.

When he became rector of St. Luke's Episcopal Church the sign on the parish door read "for sale." Now it reads "welcome." Five years after Mr. Cawthorne took the church over it was out of debt, but he had to do a lot of pedaling.

SAYS JAPAN IS AFTER BIG TERRITORY

Wants Whole Region Between Shanghai and Nanking

CHINA MAKES ACCUSATION

Still Pouring Reinforcements Into Yangtze District

Geneva, March 5—China accused Japan before the League of Nations today of planning to take the entire region between Shanghai and Nanking. The League announced at the same time that United States participation in an international commission of military officials at Shanghai to supervise cessation of hostilities was assured.

Dr. W. W. Yen, Chinese delegate, submitted official telegrams stating that the Japanese were pouring reinforcements into the region beyond Liuho on the Yangtze and that some 35,000 more with tanks and cavalry have landed to outflank our present positions near Kuanson.

PERCY THOMSON DOING WELL ON SOUTH. LINKS

A PREMIER PASSES

Movie Stars at Hollywood are to Take no Chances

Taken Every Precaution to Prevent Their Children From Being Kidnapped--Estates Being Patrolled by Private Guards and Watchmen.

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., March 5—Prominent motion picture stars took precautions today to prevent possible kidnapping of their children as an outgrowth of the Charles A. Lindbergh Jr. abduction.

Estates were patrolled by private guards and watchmen, under order to guard particularly against kidnapping attempts, although no police protection had been asked.

Jane Harding Bannister, daughter of Ann Harding and her husband, Harry Bannister, has one child carefully guarded in her Hollywood Hill Home. A threatening letter was received several weeks ago.

Barbar Bebe Lyon, four-months-old daughter of Bebe Daniels and Ben Lyon, and the two-year-old daughter of Bert Wheeler, comedian, and the children of Harold Lloyd were others given protection.

A LAZY MAN'S PARADISE RIGHT HERE ON EARTH

London, England, March 4—Brigadier General J. B. Wroughton says he is lazy—but he has gone to no end of hard work fixing up his home so he can take things easy.

When he drives up to the front of his home in his car the gates open automatically. As they open, a mechanism sets a sprinkling system going in his greenhouse. Secret knobs all over the house open distant doors before he comes to them, and a bed-switch light up the clock on the mantel when he wants to know the time.

If he desires early morning tea he has an arrangement whereby a switch causes electricity to heat the water kettle. When the water in the kettle boils, the team acts on a lever which tips the kettle so water is poured into a tea cup. In the interval between pushing the switch and the finishes his early morning doze.

PARENTIAL INTERFERENCE IS ATTACKED

Chicago, March 5—A "hands off" policy for parents in their attitude toward their children in their early formative years is advocated by Dr. George B. Lake, editor of Clinical Medicine and Surgery.

Such a policy, he said Wednesday in an address, would serve as a preventive of unstable emotional life in maturity.

Dr. Lake warned against curtailing the play of children.

"This is the child's business," he said, adding that every waking hour should be filled with constructive play that the child himself chooses "because he knows better than the adult what is good for him."

Stockholm, March 5—Now the Swedish Lapps may install telephones in their tents of reindeer skins. The nomads of the frozen Arctic have for some time enjoyed the radio, but have not been able to communicate with the outside world. The government has made arrangements to string a telephone line over northern Lapland.

WOMAN AND FIVE CHILDREN CREMATED

Shocking Tragedy Reported From Labrador—Home Burned While Husband Was Absent.

St. John's, Nfld., March 4—Trapped by flames that destroyed their home early this morning, Mrs. Robert Best and her five small children were burned to death at Northwest River, Labrador.

News of the tragedy reached here this afternoon by wireless in a message received by S. R. Oakley, manager of the Hudson's Bay Company at St. John's.

The father and the eldest son were away from home trapping at the time of the fire, the message stated.

Another son, aged 16, was awakened by his mother's calls. Rushing through the flames he made his way out of the house and sought help from neighbors, but when they arrived it was too late to render assistance. The wooden building was enveloped in flames which blocked Mrs. Best and her children from possible escape and the neighbors from entry.

The only other child of the family, a girl of eight years, happened to be spending the night at a neighbor's.

The cause of the first was not ascertained.

The scene of the tragedy is a town at the mouth of Northwest River, which runs into Lake Melville, Labrador.

The town, named Northwest River, has a Hospital and boarding school owned and operated by the International Grenfell Association. The United Church of Canada has a mission there.

RECORD SNOWFALL IN THE CASCADES

Seattle, Washington, March 6—The United States forest service reported more snow in the Cascades this year than any time since 1917.

Forest service figures show 119 inches at Dishpan Gap in Wenatchee, 74 inches at Blewett Pass, 56 inches at Stevens Pass and 73 inches at Snoqualmie Pass.
