STEAMER VICTORIA HAS BEEN SOLD

River Boat Will be Repaired and Sent to the United States

It is reported that the steamship Victoria, which has plied the St. John River for nearly twenty years, has made her last trip between St. John and Fredericton. At the recent meeting of the Victoria Steamship Company an offer was made to purchase the boat and The Mail learns that it has been since accepted. The steamer is now in winter quarters at St. John and will shortly undergo extensive repairs which will include the remodelling of the engine. She will then be turned over to an American concern and taken to the United States.

Mr. E. C. Atkinson, secretary-treasurer of the company, when seen yesterday in reference to the report, declined to either confirm or deny it. All that he would say was that he did not think the boat would be in evidence on the St. John River next summer. The Victoria was built at St. John twenty years ago by the Star Line Steamship Company, of which the late Mr. George F. Baird was then managing director. She was built especially for the river service and was a splendid boat, well equipped and very fast, having in her palmy days shown a speed of eighteen knots. As a business proposition, however, she did not come up to expectation, being considered too large and too costly to operate for the amount of business available. When the Star Line Company went out of business, the Victoria was sold at a bargain price to the St. John River Steamboat Company, of which the late Dr. L. A. Currey was the chief figure. Three years ago she passed into the hands of the Victoria Steamship Company, which concern has since operated her at a financial loss.

His Honor has remitted the amount of the cheque in a sterling draft for £30, 19s.

HAD BROUGHT DOWN EIGHT AEROPLANES

(Canadian Press.) London, Jan. 27.—The German Flight Lieutenant "Boseme," whose death was reported yesterday in German official messages, is identified here as Lieut. Boleke, who was mentioned in the Berlin official report of January 13 as having brought down his eighth aeroplane. This feat is said to have been revealed by his fellow aviator, Lieut. Emmetmann, both of whom received the highest of the German military decorations, the Order Pour Le Merite.

(Continued from page three.) PARLIAMENT—TWO previously for his country's good, having been found guilty of forgery and perjury.

Another man, Dr. Hayes, who had been the chief organizer of the Conservative party in Nova Scotia, and who had also been found guilty by the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, had also been given a military rank. These were the class of men who were being promoted over the heads of older and more experienced officers.

Mr. MacKenzie again pressed for a parliamentary investigation into the operations of the shell committee, noting that the charges made by Mr. Carvell yesterday were still unanswered.

Hon. Martin Burrell, who moved the adjournment of the debate, defended the Davidson commission as having been absolutely impartial and moved solely by the desire to get at the truth.

Speaking of the submarines purchased by Sir Richard McBride, Mr. Burrell declared that their acquisition had assured the safety of both Vancouver and Victoria.

Hon. Chas. Murphy interrupted with the assertion that at the time the German cruiser was reported off the coast of British Columbia there were actually no torpedoes on the submarines.

JUDGMENT TOMORROW.

Judgment will be given tomorrow afternoon in the Canada Temperance Act case against the Barker House. The evidence was completed in the police court yesterday afternoon. Two witnesses were examined. One from Keswick was arrested on a warrant. He swore that he had bought no liquor. The second, an employee of the hotel, gave no evidence in favor of the prosecution.
