ST. JOHN HIGH BLEW UP
IN THE THIRD PERIOD

Fredericton High Won Its First Match in Interscholastic Hockey League--Score 11 to 2--On Soft Ice Local School Team Outclassed Visitors.

The St. John High School hockey team, which was considered to be in the running for the championship of the Interscholastic League of New Brunswick, blew up with a loud noise at the Arctic Rink last night. The accident occurred in the third period of the game with Fredericton High. When the smoke blew away, the local team had the game, 11 to 2. The period began with the locals leading, 4 to 2. They scored seven more goals inside of fourteen minutes.

The St. John team came here with one victory over Rothesay Collegiate School to its credit. On the face of things, Fredericton High should do something awful to Rothesay here.

"Bill" Donnelly was the most prominent man on the St. John High team. This was partly on account of his hard checking and also because much attention was devoted to him by the Yellow and Black players. His prominence in former interschool athletic struggles made him well known to the crowd and he worked hard all through the game, but without much result. What few scraps took place he was mixed up in.

ICE WAS SOFT.

The ice was soft but Fredericton High finished the game faster than when they started. The visiting forwards were generally outplayed and when they did get through the local defence usually attended to them. Of the two lonely shots that got by Barbour, Gorman shot the first and Agar the other. In the St. John net Kane made some good stops but in the last period the Yellow and Black forwards rushed close in on the net and beat him out.

Colwell did the bulk of the scoring for Fredericton, caging the puck six times. He had a side shot that Goal Keeper Kane could not fathom at all and also was handy when it was possible to get the puck in on a rebound. Robinson scored three goals and Clark and Kierstead one each. All the Fredericton forwards played good hockey. On the defence Jewett used his weight well, his checking being noticeable. McAdam also did good work, taking the puck

to the other end repeatedly.

Jack Dewar began the game as referee but on account of a broken skate had to retire in favor of Sears. Both Wilson and Gregory were used as substitutes by St. John High.

SAYS 5,000 GIRLS
GO WRONG YEARLY

(New York Herald.)

Five thousand innocent girls in New York city are lured each year from the path of rectitude and become women of the street, said Magistrate J. Marsh in addressing the seventh annual conference of the New York State Association of Magistrates at the Astor Hotel yesterday.

"From where is coming the supply for this and future years?" he asked. "From whose homes will come this new army of young and innocent girls each. Do not think this thing can go on indefinitely without touching each of us."

The conference spent the day in discussing the social evil and traffic in women, and Magistrate Marsh advocated total suppression, although he added it could not be effected soon.

One police justice expressed the opinion that women may be kept from the streets only through religion. He said all other theories on reform had failed, "notably the correctional institutions, where girls usually learn more vice than they ever knew in the streets."

The eradication of dance halls was advocated by the police justice of Albany. He said his experience was that these halls were the downward stepping stones that lured most girls to evil ways.

Burdette G. Lewis, Commissioner of Correction, assured the magistrates that the new parole law took none of their powers from them, but gave girls a better chance to reform. The sending of street women to the workhouse time after time, for terms of a week, he held to be pernicious.

The new system of paroling first offenders and aiding them to do better, and the sending of old offenders to the Workhouse for long terms, he believed to be the proper system for correcting the evil. Through long terms the old offenders could be studied and time given to provide for them properly when released.

BULGARIANS DEFEATED BY
FORCES OF ESSAD PASHA

London, Jan. 26.—Bulgarian forces are said to have advanced into Central Albania and come in contact with Albanian troops under Essad Pasha, provisional president of Albania, who is co-operating with the Entente Allies. Despatches from Tirana, Albania, to Brindisi, Italy, as forwarded by the Exchange Telegraph Co., say that an advance guard of the Bulgarians has been defeated near Elbassan by Essad Pasha's forces.

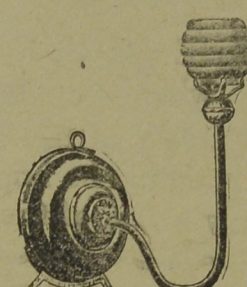
OMINOUS.

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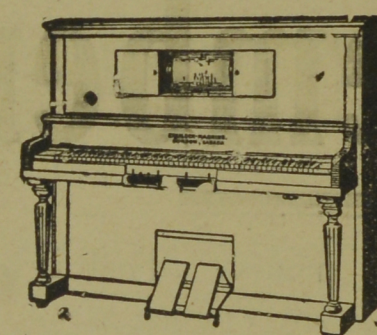
