German Servants Wanted by Police Have Been Located

Disappeared at Franklin Park on the Night the Lindbergh Baby Was Kidnapped—The Couple Now Being Questioned—Dream Study Undertaken at Harvard.

HOPEWELL, N. J., March 18—State police announced today they have located two German servants who disappeared from the home of Leandro Lightfoot at Franklin Park immediately after the kidnapping of Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr. The couple whose names were used as Mr. and Mrs. Engstenbergs, were being questioned today. It was not revealed where they had been located.

An Elaborate Dream Study

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., March 18—The Lindbergh baby kidnapping case may throw light on the mysteries of mental telepathy through an elaborate dream study undertaken by the Harvard psychological clinic.

From 44 States and Canada with the past four days have come reports of five hundred dreams, inspired by the sensational abduction, and Dr. Henry A. Murray, head of the clinic, told the British United Press today he believed an analysis of these contributions may reveal valuable new data.

THE N.B.P.P. TO BE ABSORBED BY THE MOUNTIES

Amalgamation Will Become Effective April 1; Will Mean a Saving of \$80,000 to the Province.

The announcement made in the Legislature by Premier Richards yesterday that plans have been consummated for the absorption of the Provincial Police by the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, has created widespread interest. It was known that negotiations have been going on for some time with this end in view and all were glad to learn that an agreement has been reached. A enabling bill introduced by the Premier, will permit the arrangement becoming effective on April 1st. According to the Premier, the amalgamation will mean a saving to the province of \$80,000 a year. The Customs Preventive squad of thirty-four men will also be absorbed by the Mounties.

Makes for Efficiency

"Just another step in police efficiency in the province," commented Captain E. C. P. Salt, commissioner of the provincial Police to the press last night in connection with the announcement made yesterday by Premier Richards in the Legislature, that the ranks of the provincial police would be absorbed by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, who will police the province, commencing April 1. Captain Salt, who will head the new division in New Brunswick as inspector, has been a member of the "Mounties" for several years. While stationed in Montreal a few years ago he did splendid work in rounding up counterfeiters and members of a dope ring.

TEACHERS OF CHICAGO HAD A TRYING TIME

14,000 of Them Had to Live a Year on Two and One-Half Months' Pay.

Chicago, March 18—A story of privation, despair and tragedy was told today. The story of how Chicago's 14,000 teachers have lived for nearly a year on two and a half months' pay. From questionnaires returned by 5,000 teachers was gleaned the picture of men and women carrying on to the breaking point.

The replies revealed a drop in the standard of living to the point where teachers no longer can buy food and are forced to go without medical or dental attention despite serious need. Amusements, new clothes, books and periodicals of their profession have been forgotten.

ST. JOHN BILLS CONSIDERED

Committee Room, March 18th, 1932
The Municipalities Committee met this morning and considered the bill to fix the assessment on the Saint John Dry Dock and Shipbuilding Company, Limited, which was agreed to without amendment. The bill to amend the Saint John Assessment Act was discussed at great length with representatives from Saint John as well as the bill to extend the valuation of the Admiral Beatty and Royal Hotels. Both the above bills were stood over for private session of the Committee on Tuesday next. Two bills relating to the town of Campbellton were also under discussion and stood over for consideration in private session.

CHARGES BY HON. G. N. GORDON UNFOUNDED

Committee Finds That Man Who Slandered Premier Bennett is Deserving of Censure by Parliament.

of Hon. G. N. Gordon, former Liberal Minister of Immigration for allegations made in January, at Hamilton and Lindsay, Ontario, concerning Prime Minister R. B. Bennett, is contained in a report of the special committee of the House of Commons appointed in the matter. The report was tabled in the House this afternoon. "In the opinion of your Committee," the reported states, "the conduct of Mr. Gordon in making the statements he did was reprehensible, and deserving of censure of the House of Commons, the more so as Mr. Gordon is a member of the King's Privy Council for the Dominion of Canada." The two Liberal members of the Committee dissented.

The full text of the report reads: "The Special Committee appointed to inquire into certain charges and allegations made by the Hon. George N. Gordon, K.C., beg leave to present as a third report.

"After hearing the evidence, your committee is agreed that the charges and allegations contained in the extracts from The Globe newspaper, as set out in the order of reference, were, in fact, made upon public occasions in Hamilton, Ont., on Jan. 6, 1932, and in Lindsay, Ont., on Jan. 8, 1932, by the Hon. George N. Gordon as reported in The Globe newspaper of Toronto, Ont., with the exception that the words 'Mrs. Herridge' appear in The Globe on January 6, whereas the words 'Mr. Herridge' were those used.

The Private Car

"As to the statement that a new private car was constructed for the use of the Prime Minister at a cost to the people of Canada of \$125,000, your committee feels that this charge is of a relatively minor character, it being a charge of extravagant expenditure, and not one of misappropriation. It finds, however, that the statements made in this respect gave an entirely erroneous impression of the transaction, and were not warranted by the facts as brought out in the evidence. Your committee points out that there has been no increase in the number of Government private cars since the present Government assumed office.

"As to the charges and allegations so made, other than that above dealt with, your committee is of the opinion that they were of a most serious nature, calculated to do injury to the reputation of Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister of Canada, a member of the House of Commons; and your committee finds that the charges and allegations so made were untrue.

"Your committee finds further that these charges and allegations were made with the intention of injuring the Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister of Canada, a member of the House of Commons, in his office as Prime Minister, and were made recklessly and without any adequate attempt to ascertain before making them whether they were true or untrue.

Deserves Censure

"In the opinion of your committee, the conduct of Mr. Gordon in making the statements he did was reprehensible and deserving of the censure of the House of Commons, the more so as Mr. Gordon is a member of the King's Privy Council for the Dominion of Canada."

Suffragettes in France will not Get Franchise

Chamber of Deputies In An All-Night Session

Adopted Electorate Reform Laws But Refused to Extend the Franchise to Women — Senate Amendments Adopted.

PARIS, March 18—French suffragettes who should be allowed to vote lost their fight today.

The Chamber of Deputies, after an all-night session, approved the electorate reform laws returned by the Senate without extending women the franchise.

The Senate also killed two other provisions of the bill, proposals for a second ballot and compulsory voting. The Senate amendments were incorporated in the law as approved by the Chamber 152 votes to 111.

Ballad Singer Dies

MONTE CARLO, March 18—Chauncey Olcott, famous ballad singer who introduced the song "Mother Machree" died early today from pernicious anemia. He was 71 years old.

THE PUBLIC ACCOUNTS ARE BEING PROBED

Mr. Colpitts Urges That Assistance Be Given to Fox Breeders Association — Information Is Sought.

The Public Accounts Committee of the Legislature, of which A. D. Taylor is chairman, continued its meeting this morning which was begun yesterday.

J. W. Niles (Opposition) asked for a detailed list of rentals for the Provincial Government Building in Saint John. These will be produced at the next meeting, it was promised. In Public Accounts it was shown that rentals of offices amounted to \$16,741.32 and expenses were \$15,488.55. Taxes paid to the city of Saint John were \$1,321.85.

F. M. Colpitts (Opposition) suggested that assistance in money to the fox breeders be given directly to the Fox Breeders' for them to carry on their own research. The fox breeders are wary of certain disease in foxes, emanating from Prince Edward Island and wish to carry on this research.

Mr. Colpitts charged that W. T. Chapman, Moncton, employed by the government to assist the fox breeders, was laid off at a time when he was most needed. He also asked to see accounts of Emerson C. Rice for \$543.40 and another of E. W. McMahon for \$969.25 for professional services in connection with court cases during the year.

Chairman Taylor asked about the definite duties of the Bureau of Information. He noticed that in the Agricultural Department the sum of \$1,815.10 had been spent; he felt that there must be lots of items charged to the Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel.
