British Debt Note Is Expected to be Transmitted Today

Cabinet Met This Morning and Passed Upon It; No Statement Given Out When Cabinet Adjourned—The Pound Sterling Records a Gain of Two Cents.

LONDON, Nov. 30—The British cabinet met today to approve the war debts note to Washington, which was expected to be despatched today.

There was no statement after the cabinet adjourned, except that there would be no further meeting today. It was believed that the British reply had been finally approved.

The pound sterling gained two cents above the opening, rising to \$3.18½ soon after the cabinet met. Gold again touched a new high at 130 shillings and eight pence an ounce.

GAME SEASON IN THE PROVINCE CLOSES TODAY

New Brunswick's big game season for moose and deer closed today. In a general way the 1932 season has been rather successful and certainly so from the standpoint of the amount of game taken by both resident and non-resident hunters.

While the number of non-resident hunters was not as large as in previous years practically all the parties who have come into this province have reported a most successful and enjoyable trip.

The late open fall weather made it possible for many hunters to spend a few days in pursuit of game while the entire absence of snow in the central and southern parts of New Brunswick created much difficulty during the still hunting period. So far as the records indicate the largest moose head taken out of the New Brunswick woods this fall was secured by August Schwab, of Middleton, Conn. The antlers had a spread of 57 1-2 inches and 22 points, this large bull being killed in the watershed between the Nepiguit and Tobique valley. Deer have been reported very plentiful throughout the province and it is expected that the kill will be up to normal figures. The reports of the game killed during the 1932 season are now being received at the office of Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, Minister of Lands and Mines and officials of the Game Department are compiling these statistics.

The partridge season in New Brunswick, which was from October 1st, to 15th, was not so successful from the hunter's standpoint, due to lack of early frost and the consequent heavy foliage. However, these two elements undoubtedly contributed to the protection of the birds which were reported plentiful in most sections of New Brunswick.

The hunting season on geese, ducks and brant remains open until December 31st, in the province proper, and until January 31st, on the Islands of the Grand Manan group. According to the Migratory Birds Convention Act, migratory game birds killed during the open season may be kept in possession from the open season in the province up to and including January 31st, next following, and in the Grand Manan Island group, up to and including the last day of February. No permits are required for this privilege and no permits can be issued beyond the above dates.

22 JOURNALISTS ARE ELECTED TO SWEDISH PAR.

Stockholm, Nov. 30—There is only one lawyer but twenty-two newspaper men in the new Swedish Parliament, which meets for the first time January 10.

Farmers are the most numerous with a membership of ninety-three out of 230, and five are farm workers. One of the newly elected Socialists is a policeman. Four deputies are women, one Conservative, the others Socialists. The trade unions are represented by nine of their officials, while only four are manufacturers. Eighteen are industrial workers and eleven either trolley or railroad employees. Nine are either college professors, school teachers or clergymen. Other categories with small representation are army officers, business men, office employees, craftsmen, public officials and engineers.

BLASE YOUNG BRITONS SCORN PARENTS' BOOKS

London, Nov. 30—English children today are more sophisticated in their reading than past generations, says a report by a children's book club.

"The Last of the Mohicans," "Treasure Island," and other thrill-producers of the 80's are scarcely wanted by sons and daughters of earlier readers.

SUCCESS SEEN FOR ROOSEVELT BY HOOSIER

Scientific Forecast Based On Father's Age Used In Forecast

FATHER 54 WHEN HE WAS BORN
W. L. Ballard Thinks This is a Good Omen

Sqracuse, Ind., Nov. 30—A successful and powerful administration for President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt is predicted by W. L. Ballard on the basis of "a scientific forecast—not fortune telling," centered on the fact that Roosevelt's father was 54 when Franklin was born.

Ballard called attention to the fact that many leaders in public life were born of middle-aged fathers and young mothers.

Jeff Davis

Jefferson Davis' father, he said, was 52 when the Confederate States' President was born; Robert E. Lee and Benjamin Harrison were born to fathers who were 51; William Pitt the younger's father was 64; President Taft's was 47, and Queen Victoria's 52.

Even the fact that Woodrow Wilson's father was only 37 when the World War President was born does not detract from his theory, Ballard said, because that age is considerably above the average of 30.

Many Qualities

Such off-spring as cited, Ballard said, apparently inherit certain qualities and characteristics. Roosevelt he said is no exception.

"This definitely warrants," Ballard explained "a scientific forecast of a possible, probable, new administration that will be well organized, well managed and powerful, because of the calm, deep personality at its head, who can quietly move the unmovable, without apparent effort, whether it be a New York mayor, sheriff or legislature, or mayhap our broader, deep-seated semi-chronic depression.

"True, 'brains' do not always imply 'goodness,' yet the knowledge is that this law (of heredity) engenders healthy humility that predisposes to right conduct."

NEW ENGLANDERS ARE COMING HERE FOR THE WEEK-END

Ald. T. V. Monohan, proprietor of the Queen Hotel, has been notified by W. F. U. S. Congress May Vote For Repeal On Monday Next

The 18th Amendment Likely To Be Voted Upon On Opening Day of Lame Duck Session--Speaker Garner Hard at Work.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 30 — Democratic leaders charged by Speaker Garner with conducting a canvass of the House to determine prohibition repeal sentiment have found indications in the survey thus far that a repeal resolution would pass if brought to a vote next Monday. Members conducted the poll told the United Press today that they believed 275 votes could be secured for outright repeal. It was anticipated there would be enough absentees to lower the two-thirds majority requirement of 287 votes, which would apply if the full House were present.

SPUD MARKET AT HARTLAND IS NOT SO BRISK

Hartland, Carleton County, Nov. 29—Today's potato market was quiet and easier. Wire enquiry and demand were only normal, from Upper Canada points, which appear to have plenty of stock on hand. Car-lot loadings at procuring points have fallen off, but this condition is expected to be only temporary. Haulings on the local market were light today, at prices of \$1 a barrel for Green Mountains, and 90 cents for Irish Cobbiers, Canada grade one. These prices were paid for stock purchased last week and are not the present market. Shippers advise that they are waiting for the market to settle before establishing a price.

CHATHAM BOY DROWNED IN THE MIRAMICHI

Chatham, Nov. 29—Frank O'Reilly, eighty-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack O'Reilly, Water street, lost his life this evening when he went down through broken ice of Walsh's boom here, a short distance from his home.

About 30 or 40 young people were skating and sliding on the ice sheet when the accident occurred, and help was summoned immediately. In a short time the body was taken from the water, and carried into the engine room at the town hall, where first aid was administered. Doctors worked over the lad but were unable to revive him.

He was a pupil in grade 3 at St. Michael's Academy. Besides his parents, there survive three brothers Jack, William and Arthur, and two sisters, Bernice and Gertrude.

MOVEMENT OF WHEAT INCREASED

Winnipeg, Nov. 30 — 60,275 cars of wheat were moved on Canadian National lines from August 1st to date as compared with 52,660 cars for the same period last year, according to T. P. White, Supt. of car service here. For the period November 17th to 24th inclusive there was an increase of 1,343,000 bushels marketed as compared with 1931, the total figure for that period this year being 4,594,000 bushels of this Alberta accounted for 2,027,000 bushels, Saskatchewan, 1,773,000 bushels, Manitoba 794,000 bushels.

THE PREMIER DELAYS HIS DEPARTURE

Ottawa, Nov. 29— Prime Minister R. B. Bennett has postponed his departure overseas for a few days. The Prime Minister was scheduled to sail from Quebec tomorrow afternoon on the Duchess of York; but postponement of his departure was intimated tonight.

The Prime Minister plans to visit England for a few weeks holiday during the Parliamentary recess. Mr. Bennett likely will make a short trip to Paris. It will be his first holiday in more than a year from his arduous application to his official duties.

PRODUCE LINES HAVE UPWARD TENDENCY

Montreal, Quebec, Nov. 28—Here is good news for the Canadian farmer. Cheese, butter, eggs and potato prices are soaring, according to Montreal exporters. Before the New York they may reach new high levels for the season.

"There is not any too great a supply on hand now," said one exporter of butter and cheese. "There will not likely be any more New Zealand butter this year. The supplies on hand are just about ample for the next 3 months. There is, therefore, every likelihood that prices will advance. Very little winter butter is being made.

80 Per cent Advance

The New Brunswick tubers from the Bathurst area were definitely a short crop this year and few shipments from that district had been made so far, Mr. Johnson said. He stated however, that he did not think the price would rise beyond \$1.10.

CANADIAN FINED THOUSAND FRANCS

Paris, Nov. 30—B. Alband, representative of a Canadian mercantile firm was fined 1,000 francs in a Seine court today, following his conviction on a charge of having sold, during 1928 and 1931, 151,037 shares of Standard Royalty for 4,300,000 francs without obtaining the authority of the Ministry of Finance.
