CARDINAL MERCIER THE BELGIAN PRIMATE IS WELCOMED TO ROME

In Reply to An Address of Welcome He Declares He Has Simply Done His Duty—American Generosity in Helping the Stricken Belgians is Warmly Appreciated.

Rome, Jan. 14.—Cardinal Mercier, Primate of Belgium, arrived in Rome today and was received at the station by the Belgian ministers accredited to the Vatican, by Sir Henry Howard, the British minister to the Vatican, Mgr. Desanpre, Papal Master of the Chamber, and a large number of residents of the Belgian colony. A large crowd of Italians also greeted the Cardinal, crying "Viva Mercier! Viva Belgium!" accompanying him along streets to the Belgian college, where he is stopping.

In the municipal council, Prince Colonna, Mayor of Rome, and several members of the council, welcomed the arrival of Cardinal Mercier in Rome, and greeted him as "The man representing the tragic and heroic history of civic virtue, of unshaken faith."

The speaker also expressed sympathy with Belgium, "momentarily crushed," and admiration for the Belgian army, the Belgian people and for King Albert and his queen.

"What I have done was simply my duty," Cardinal Mercier told a representative of the Associated Press tonight, while the people of Rome com-

prising all classes, received him in a triumphant manner such as no Cardinal of any nationality has enjoyed on entering Rome since the fall of the temporal power. The Cardinal intends to remain in Rome for a fortnight, but does not wish to be interviewed or make statements or communications of any kind to the press, because he feels that he is bound by honor to keep silent.

He spoke in high praise of the American generosity in helping the destitute Belgians and of the immense debt of gratitude felt by his people towards America, adding: "The Belgians feel very much their humiliating position, that they need to accept charity." The situation of the unfortunate nation was not so terrible now as immediately after its occupation by the enemy. Some Belgians were gradually returning to their homes and resuming work. One of the most striking features in the belligerent countries is the scarcity of coal and its high cost, while Belgium now has more coal than ever before, because practically no factories or railroads are now running.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT CONSIDERING THE QUESTION OF POLISH RELIEF

Premier Asquith Sends Encouraging Telegram to the Polish National Alliance of America—Importation of Supplies From Overseas Would Only Benefit Germany at Present.

Chicago, Jan. 15.—Replying to a telegram from the Polish National Alliance of America, that supplies be allowed to reach the starving people in the war zone of Poland by way of Danzig, Premier Asquith of England said in a message today:

"His Majesty's Government is earnestly considering the question of Polish relief in consultation with the French government. They are faced with accumulating evidence that not only is the present shortage of the necessities of life in Poland due to the systematic confiscation and export of native stock by the occupying armies, but also, notwithstanding the deplorable condition of the country today, this process of spoliation still continues.

"It is impossible to avoid the conclusion that the stoppage of such exports and the replacement by Germany and Austria of the stocks seized

would remove the danger of starvation and that little if any importation from overseas is necessary.

"The first step to be taken in the interest of Poland is the establishment of an organization on the spot to control all remaining stocks and to obtain from the German and Austrian governments the guarantee of a daily ration to the population equivalent to the food stuffs seized in the past.

"In view of what has happened in Belgium, where the Germans have exerted every effort to remove all the resources of the country not governed by specific guarantees, it is certain that any persuasion to import from overseas before these steps have been taken would only stimulate the requisitions of the enemy by giving him the assurance of supplies to replace what he takes.

"Please accept my assurance of the deep sympathy of His Majesty's government."

ARMAND LAVERGNE WILL SUE LA PRESSE

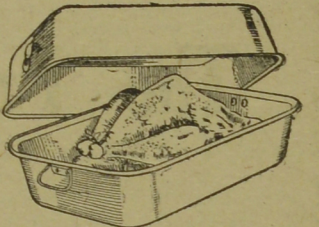
