HAD TO FORFEIT SCHOLARSHIP TO OBTAIN OTHER

Sackville, N. B., Oct. 4—It has been announced that Hector MacKinnon, who graduated first from Aberdeen High School, Moncton, and who placed second in the matriculation examination standing for New Brunswick, will not receive the Leonard Foundation fund money, which would have netted him a considerable amount annually. MacKinnon at first sent in his application to Mount Allison and it was accepted. In fact, he and his family had even arranged to move to Sackville. But, when word was received that Hector had won the Beaverbrook Scholarship, which means an income of \$325 a year for four years, it was necessary for them to change their plans, because in order to benefit from the Beaverbrook Scholarship, a student has to attend the University of New Brunswick.

For this reason, Hector MacKinnon is now a student in Fredericton, to which city his family has moved. But at the same time, he will be minus the money he would have received from the Leonard Foundation fund. The executors of this fund, when it was learned that he had switched his application from Mount Allison to the University of New Brunswick, refused to grant it to him, because the student who receives it must be a Mount Allisonian.
