FUR COAT STYLES

Both the long fitted coat and the three-quarter length fur coat are the two outstanding fur coat styles this fall. The three quarter length coat may be either fitted on in swagge, styling, for general daytime wear, and because of its lessened weight and general youthful appearance stylists see in it a coat which is destined to have a long and popular run.

The new fur coats have a trim line, and are not at all exaggerated in cut, although there is a tendency toward a fuller cut and more ample-ness through shoulders and sleeves. Collars are either very large, or trim and tiny. There are small upstand- ing ones, and little flat scarf arrange- ments in all of the flat furs.

The best talking point for this type of coat is that it can be worn for general informal daytime wear, and with the addition of a silver-fox sable or some other neckpiece, takes on a dressier and more formal air. Other fur coats come, very practically, with a detachable capelet that can be worn also with a woolen frock or suit or a cloth coat. For most women such ideas as these are a godsend.

For the sports and general daytime types there are often matching muffs and berets or turbans. As for the kind of furs used—well, everything seems to be good. Beautiful moire pony of Russian origin and Hudson seal are back in the best circles, and so is seal- skin, while black caracul is still one of the smartest types for general town wear.

YOUTHFUL MODELS

Gray kidskin, the leopard family, squirrel and muskrat are popular for youthful models. Brown kidskin, too, is a good choice. And mink of course is always with us, but has the grace this year to come in much more youthful styles than formerly, often in three-quarter lengths. A moderate degree of hemline fullness characterizes the swagge types. Self-trimmed models predominate. All of them, whether full-length or three quarter, have a thought for slenderness, even though they are wrapped over amply for protection and warmth.

The plaid top for the evening gown is another novel note in fashions, suggesting grandmothers' day. It's rather dashing, however, in the modern version.

SPICED PLUMS

4 quarts plums
2 cups vinegar
6 cups sugar
1 tablespoon cloves
1 tablespoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon allspice

Wash and dry plums. Place them in a stone jar or bowl. Boil vinegar, sugar and spices together for ten minutes and pour over plums. Cover and let stand over night. Drain off the liquid and bring to boil, add to plums and cook until plums are clear, but not broken. Pack in clean, hot jars, fill with pickling syrup and seal immediately.

The plums should retain their color and should be firm and plump in appearance.

EUCHERED PLUMS

These are delicious with roast pork for winter dinners. Choose large, dark blue plums for the most delectable results.

9 pounds plums
6 pounds sugar
2 quarts vinegar
2 tablespoon cinnamon

Wash and dry plums. Boil vinegar, sugar and cinnamon for five minutes. Pour over plums and let stand 24 hours. Drain off liquid and heat to the boiling point. Pour over fruit and allow to stand for another 24 hours. Do this for three more mornings. The last morning simmer fruit and juice for twenty minutes and seal in hot sterilized jars. It takes five successive mornings to make this sweet pickle.

PLUM CHUTNEY

Plum chutney is a piquant sauce at its best when made with blue plums.

2 quarts plums
1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1-4 teaspoon each mace, allspice, and cloves
1½ teaspoon salt
1 lemon
1 1-2 cups vinegar
1 cup water

Washfruit and cook in vinegar and water until soft. Rub through a colander and add sugar, salt, spices, grated rind and juice of lemon. Cook until as thick as catsup. Seal in hot sterilized jars or keep in a covered stone crock.

TRAVELS 16,000 MILES TO BAG MOOSE—GETS IT

The story of the "Mouny" who travelled thousands of miles to get his old man is old. But Sidney Low travelled over 16,000 miles, from Victoria, Australia, to the Canadian Rockies, to get a moose head,—and got it.

He also got a deer, an elk and a few other trophies. "And of course I got an awful lot of fun," he added. In fact the fun of getting the trophies was more important than the trophies themselves.

He is now on his way back to Australia. The closest comparison to Canada that he had met in his travels, he said, in regard to hunting was New Zealand. But it was difficult to compare different countries. One met entirely different conditions in every new country where one hunted. "That is really what you go for, you know. You don't know what you are going to meet with until you meet it."

THE ST. LAWRENCE WATERWAY SCHEME IS BEING MADE CAMPAIGN ISSUE IN UNITED STATES

Washington, D. C., Oct. 5.—One oftages', declares Senator Lewis of Illinois, 'the opportunity that would most appeal to the masses would be reduced electricity rates.' (The latter phrasing in italics).

"Under this treaty," the campaign book continues, "the St. Lawrence international rapids section can function only under a joint commission of 10 members, not subject to executive legislative or judicial control, except as otherwise provided, and shall have complete power over all construction and disposition of power." Neither Governor Roosevelt nor his power authority have ever before raised this objection to the treaty. They have merely objected to completion of negotiations without arriving first at a settlement between New York State and the Federal Government, primarily on the division of costs.

"The St. Lawrence power projected and waterways might as well be a Muscle Shoals and a Panama Canal" the campaign book goes on, "as far as state rights are concerned, should this treaty go into effect without change. It represents a presumption and assumption of Federal power that should be opposed by every state and its people, concerned with preserving the inherent rights in water power within its sole jurisdiction for the sole benefit of the people of a state and the public at large.

"It is another example of Government by Federal Commission, repulsive to the fundamentals of democracy. It is an example of an attempt of federal control on the part of the Republican administration alleged by its partisans to be abhorrent democratic doctrine. The insistence of Governor Roosevelt on the power rights of the people of New York in no way interferes with navigation possibilities of the St. Lawrence."
