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Adolph Hitler May Be Entrusted With The Chancellorship

The Nazis Leader Held a Conference With President Von Hindenburg--Is Told That If Appointed He Must Continue the Policies of the Von Papen Cabinet.

BERLIN, Nov. 19—President Von Hindenburg is willing to appoint Adolf Hitler as Chancellor on condition that he continue the general policies of the Von Papen cabinet and leave the composition of the cabinet in the President's hands, the United Press was informed in reliable quarters. The President told Hitler in their conversations today that he had no objection in principle to entrusting the government to the Nazis but would not appoint Hitler unconditionally.

Hitler told the President he wanted several days to think over the proposition and Von Hindenburg agreed to see him again next week.

COL. ROBINS HAS BEEN FOUND IN THE SOUTH

Dry Leader Suspected of Having Been Victim of Foul Play Turns Up Safely.

Asheville, N. C., Nov. 18—Col. Raymond Robins, United States dry leader, and close friend of President Herbert Hoover, who disappeared on Sept. 3, was discovered yesterday in an obscure mountain village of western North Carolina, a victim of amnesia, it was announced here tonight.

Colonel Robins was identified today by his nephew, John Dreier, of New York.

He was brought to an undisclosed place near Asheville tonight for treatment, Dreier said.

"Colonel Robins is in sound physical condition and is in perfect control of his ordinary mental faculties," a statement issued by the nephew said. He did not clarify this apparent discrepancy with the statement that his uncle suffers amnesia.

The Associated Press learned that for the past two months the philanthropist had been living in the village of Whittier, deep in the mountains, at a boarding house, under the name of "Rogers."

His finding, after a nation-wide search, resulted from the work of two agents of the federal prohibition department, who were in the vicinity of Whittier on other business.

The agents noticed a picture of Robins in a newspaper and suspected that "Rogers" was Robins. The identification was completed today by Dreier.

The finding of Col. Robins exploded widespread reports that he was the victim of bootleggers or Russian Imperialists.

"THE WEB OF EVIDENCE"

Chicago, Nov. 18—A spider spun a web of evidence that resulted on Joseph Wolek's arrest for purse snatching. Police responding to a radio report of the theft, accosted Wolek standing on a corner.

"That fellow has some spider webs on his shoulders," said one of the officials. "He must have been hiding under a porch."

So Wolek was taken to a police station where he was identified by his victim, confessed the theft and gave up the loot—\$10.60.

EX-GOVERNOR OF QUEBEC HAS PASSED AWAY

Montreal, 12—A man whose many-sided career was reflected widely throughout the life of the Province of Quebec and the Dominion of Canada, Hon. Narcisse Perroteau, former lieutenant-governor, died here today, aged 81. He had been in ill-health for two years.

From 1876, when he graduated in law from McGill University, until a year before his death Mr. Perroteau lived an active life. A professorship for 26 years; membership of the Legislative Council, Quebec's "House of Lords" from 1897 until the present except for a break of five years; holding of cabinet rank as a member without portfolio since 1910, and the representation of His Majesty in Quebec from January, 1924, to February, 1929, were among his attainments.

In addition, he built up an outstanding notarial firm in Montreal and accumulated great wealth. He was a director of several companies.

COMPTROLLER-GENERAL LOUDOUN HAS HELD OFFICE FOR THIRTY YEARS

Is the Second to Hold the Office Since Confederation—Has Served Under Twelve Premiers

The Moncton Times reproduces the following item from its files of thirty years ago:

"Mr. W. A. Loudoun of Chatham, has been appointed assistant Auditor-General of New Brunswick, in succession to the late T. Otty Crookshank, whose duties he had been discharging for some time."

Mr. Loudoun a few years later was appointed Auditor General in succession to the late James S. Beck, who had held the office since Confederation. The Audit Act was amended in 1918, and Mr. Loudoun's title was changed to that of Comptroller-General.

He is the only official of the provincial government who receives his appointment direct from the Legislature and he can only be removed from office by a two-thirds vote of that body. Mr. Loudoun during his term of office has seen the provincial revenue grow from \$700,000 to nearly \$7,000,000. He has held office under eight lieutenant-governors and twelve premiers.

MISS JOHNSON TIRED OUT AFTER LONG FLIGHT

Woman Flier Warmly Welcomed by People of Capetown—Made Fast Time.

Capetown, South Africa, Nov. 18—Amy Johnson, 23-year-old British aviatrix, slept tonight after establishing a record for the flight between England and the Cape of Good Hope in four days, six hours and 55 minutes, clipping 10 hours and 24 minutes from the mark established last spring by her husband, Capt. J. A. Mollison.

Amy was dead tired when she brought her little plane "Desert Cloud" down on the airport early this afternoon. She did not look too worn out, however, as she took time out on the way over Table Mountain to powder her nose and "fix up a bit." She had flown for nearly 103 hours with only five hours rest.

One of her first acts was to struggle through a cheering crowd of 2,000 persons to the airport office and telephone her husband, who was waiting in London for news of her arrival.

She seemed almost incredulous when she was told she had broken Mollison's record by more than 10 hours. "As much as that?" she asked. "I thought it was only about an hour. I'm sorry in a way that I beat him, and it was awfully sporting of him to inspire me to undertake the attempt."

Five Hours' Sleep

"I had just five hours' sleep coming down," she said before she was whisked away in a friend's automobile. "It was in naps of two hours, two hours and one hour. I may not show it. Because when I was coming over the mountain I powdered my face and fixed up a bit. But, believe me, I'm tired."

The identity of the friend was withheld, so that Amy might sleep undisturbed for as long as she wished. Late in the evening, however, the friend informed newspapermen by telephone that the aviatrix was sleeping soundly. Meanwhile city and government officials planned a ceremony of welcome for the famous flier when she awakes.

THE NICKEL CO. HAD OPERATING LOSS OF \$199,097

Toronto, Nov. 18—Report of International nickel for the third quarter reveals an operating loss of \$199,097, as compared with an operating loss of \$629,327 for the second quarter.

Dividends paid on the preferred amounting to \$483,474 in the third quarter brought the total call on surplus to \$681,570. As a result of the last two quarter calls, surplus has been reduced from \$16,810,400 at the end of March to \$15,015,026 at the end of September.

For the first nine months of 1932, the company shows a net loss of \$292,352.26, as compared with a net profit of \$4,005,856.71 for the corresponding period of last year. Earnings for the first three quarters of 1932 were \$277,955.98 in excess of preferred dividend requirements before deductions for depreciation and depletion.

BIBLE STILL THE WORLD'S BEST SELLER

Word of God Printed Is Now in Nine Hundred Languages

GROWING IN POPULARITY
The Sale Last Year Established a New Record

London, Nov. 19—The Bible is still the world's best seller.

The Bible Society—only one of many agencies for distributing the Scriptures—sent out during the 12 months ended March 31—1,065,662 complete Bibles, 968,864 New Testaments, and 8,517,785 integral books of the Bible, making a total of 10,552,284 volumes.

Last year the society sold 533,041 English Bibles—a larger number than in any previous year of its history. Volumes in Welsh, Gaelic, Irish, and in embossed types for the blind, brought the total number of home sales to 1,523,835.

When the society was formed in 1804, the Bible, or some part of it, had been translated in to 72 languages.

The number has now grown to more than 900. Eleven translations were added to the list in the last 12 months.

THE WORLD'S "BIGGEST BANG" KILLS FOUR

Karachi, Nov. 19—The world's "biggest bang" was planned by a Hindu shopkeeper named Relumal at Halia, Sind, for the Hindu New Year celebrations in the form of a monster cracker.

When the cracker was ignited its explosion was so terrific that Relumal and two nephews who were with him were killed instantly and a Moslem by-stander was so severely injured that he died shortly afterward.

Mollison, did not become "too exhausted" on her flight to Capetown in congratulations cabled to the aviatrix through the Governor-General of South Africa, the Earl of Carendon. The King's message said: "Please convey to Mrs. Mollison my hearty congratulations on her splendid achievement. I trust she is not too exhausted." (Sgd.) George R.I.

The King and Queen returned to London by rail today from Sandringham, where they have been sojourning for some time.

Miss Johnson's wonderful achievement has occasioned great joy throughout England.

IRISH M. P. IS OPTIMISTIC OVER TRADE PACT

Montreal, Nov. 18—Like seed planted in the Fall of the year, which sprouts and bears fruit the following summer, the beneficial results of the Ottawa Conference are not yet tangible and definite, but will inevitably become so, according to John Johnston, M.P., chairman of Johnston & Allen, Ltd., linen manufacturers, of Lurgan, Belfast, Northern Ireland, who sailed today in the Canadian Pacific liner Duchess of Atholl after a business trip to this country. Increased exports of both high and cheap grades of linen to Canada are confidently expected by Mr. Johnston, who also expects that reciprocal benefits will be felt by Canada in increased exports to Northern Ireland.

There was no real danger to the Prince of Wales during his visit to Belfast to open the new Parliament Buildings and, according to Mr. Johnston, precautions taken to ensure his safety were largely a matter of formality as Northern Ireland is sincerely loyal to the British Crown. This was proved in 1921 when the King visited Belfast to open the first session of the Parliament, which until now has met in temporary buildings. The precautions taken were only such as are taken whenever royalty visits abroad on an official mission.

SHEDIAC BOY KILLED BY CAR

Shediac, Nov. 18—Camille Gallant, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Gallant, East Shediac, was struck by a Massachusetts automobile, driven by R. LeBlanc of Dupius Corner, parish of Shediac, late this afternoon.

The lad, six years old, died twenty-five minutes later.

He was crossing the street at the time he was struck by the front of the car, concussion of the brain causing his death.

R.C.M.P. Constable Alfred D. Pelletier and Chief of Police William E. Gunn, summoned to the scene of the accident, detained LeBlanc.

A coroner's jury at the inquest conducted by Dr. A. E. Forbes, Moncton, freed LeBlanc from blame.

The child was the youngest son of Mr. Galant, who is a well-known war veteran, having lost an arm in France. General sympathy is extended to the family in their bereavement.

ECONOMY TO BE PRACTICED IN THE MILITIA

Ottawa Paper Hears That There is to be a Drastic Cut in Overhead Expenses.

Ottawa, Nov. 19—Drastic curtailment of the non-permanent active militia organization of Canada is under contemplation by the Government, according to a news story published in the Ottawa Journal today. The step is to be taken both for reasons of economy and as a move toward general disarmament, it was stated.

"Although none in high authority can be found to confirm the story," says the Journal, "it is understood the Militia Council composed of high ranking officers of the Department of National Defence, with the minister, Hon. D. M. Sutherland, as chairman, have discussed and recommended a reduction of the 11 military districts to six, with a corresponding reduction in the number of units and establishments of the non-permanent forces. This would include not only the army but the navy and air units.

"Hundreds of thousands of dollars would be saved by the reduction, it is estimated, but it would mean the abolition of many high officers and staff, and elimination of the cost of administration in districts which now are believed to be unnecessary.

"There is a suggestion that both the Toronto and London military districts be abandoned, also at Saint John, Quebec and Regina. The present districts of Kingston, Montreal, Halifax and Winnipeg, Calgary and Victoria be maintained.

LEPERS WENT TO TOWN TO ENTER PROTEST

Vienna, November 19—A second invasion of 46 lepers from the leper colony on the Danube Delta at Titilesti has caused panic among the inhabitants of the Roumanian town of Isaceca, at the head of the delta. The lepers came to town to protest the food that was sent to them.

Eventually gifts and promises of better rations, made from a safe distance induced the lepers to return to their colony. Once before the lepers had emerged to protest certain "give-ances."
