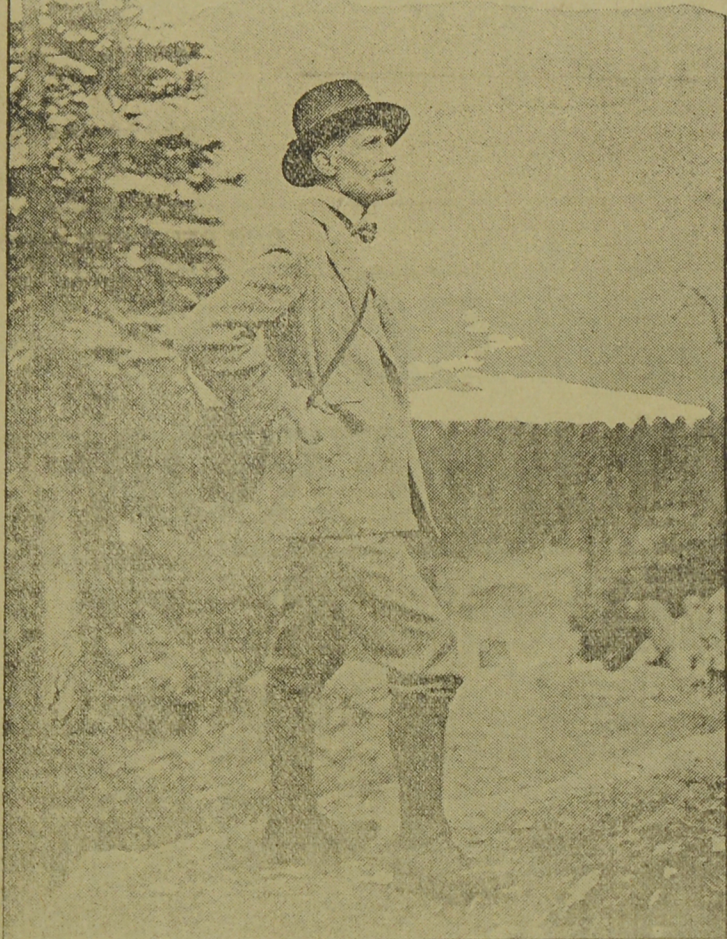


An Enthusiast on Canada

WILL CROOKS, M. P., FRIEND IN NEED

London's Poor Have Great Confidence in the Big Hearted Member of Parliament.

London, Oct. 31.—Walking through the grim, gray maze of human warrens which the world calls Whitechapel, in East London, I met a worn and weary little woman going to the same destination.

"Mr. Will Crooks is a friend in need," said she. "It is not always money the poor want, but advice or a little sympathy."

When she had spoken alone with the famous M. P., who is also a king's councillor, my turn came.

"Tell me," I asked, "why is it that the largest city of the poor on earth considers you a Friend in Need?"

"Well," explained the big-hearted member of Parliament, I hold a levee down at my home, from 8.45 to 10.15 every day. All sorts and conditions come to see me, burglars and what not, men and women who are wanting to get a foothold out of the mire.

"They have confidence in me; they know I take no shorthand notes against them. Their troubles are sometimes very trivial to outsiders, but tremendous enough, mind you, to them. I try to be patient with them all, and to smooth away the rough, hurtful circumstances."

"It's wonderful work. Call it practical Christianity, though it needn't be so labeled. The training necessary is secondary. It's the caring that counts."

The little woman who listened smiled her entire agreement.

"It sounds simple," said she, "but goodness knows you'd be a long time thinking with Will Crooks before you'd think of the associated charities."

BEAT OFF GERMAN SUBMARINE.

French Vessel Escapes Destruction After Sharp Fight.

Toulon, via London, Nov. 4.—The French liner Doukkala reports an attack upon her by a submarine which she beat off after a fight lasting three-quarters of an hour, conducted at a distance of 6,000 yards.

The submarine is said to have fired seven shells.

HELP THE FAMILIES OF OUR BRAVE SAILORS

To the Citizens of Fredericton and Vicinity:

In addition to the various calls for help which have come to you during the past two years, there's not one more deserving of your sympathy and practical, immediate support than the Fund which is designed to provide relief for the wives and children of the thousands of the men of the Navy, of our Merchant Marine and other departments of sea service, who during the war have lost their lives. Whilst it is true the British Government makes some provision for the dependents of the brave men who have made the supreme sacrifice in the service of their King and country, it is well known that this provision is entirely inadequate to meet the distress and need which exist. There has not been and there is not at present a Patriotic Fund to do for the men of the Navy what has been done for the soldiers in the Army. It should also be borne in mind that the pay for the men in the Navy and the sailors in the Merchant Marine is too small to allow of sufficient saving against the time of bereavement or disqualification of the bread-winners on account of the war.

The ground of this appeal for assistance is not only in the fact of the distress and privation which exists among the thousands of bereaved sailors' families, but in the greater and more moving fact that they lost their lives in seeking to save ours from the cruellest of foes. But for our Navy, with its splendid fleets and heroic men, in all probability by this time the German flag and German tyranny and brutality would have had all the provinces of Canada under their debasing and cruel power. Our personal safety, our uninterrupted business life, and the welfare and prosperity of our country, we owe largely, if not altogether, to the British Royal Navy and the British Mercantile Marine. There is a real danger that this fact may not be sufficiently recognized in this time of national trial and national need. It is the earnest desire of the Governor General of Canada, who is the chief promoter of this appeal, that it should reach the whole population of the Dominion as soon as possible. Already Montreal and other centres have responded in a splendid manner, and it is hoped that all to whom the appeal comes will make some contribution to this most deserving fund.

The Local Committee who have in charge the interests of this fund for Fredericton and vicinity, feel assured that the friends in this community who have responded so promptly and nobly to previous patriotic appeals, will see to it that this most urgent request is not denied their sympathy and generous assistance.

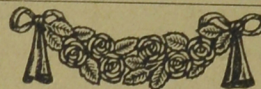
