NAVAL RECRUITS WILL BE ENLISTED IN FREDERICTON

Lieut. H. del. Wood Here Making Arrangements--Rates of Pay Same As for Canadian Expeditionary Force.

The first opportunity for men of this part of New Brunswick to enlist for service in the Royal Navy is now being given. Lieut. H. del. Wood, Naval Recruiting Officer for New Brunswick, arrived here Saturday night and registered at the Queen Hotel. He had to return to his headquarters at St. John this morning, but during his stay he made arrangements for the recruiting officer, Mr. J. J. McCaffrey, to take the names of all applicants.

Posters giving information concerning the requirements for recruits and the rates of pay have been placed about the city.

Lieut. Wood is a naval officer of 20 years' experience. Upon the outbreak of the war he took his first Canadian commission on H. M. C. S. Niobe, which was engaged in patrol duty off Halifax. Recently he was assigned to recruiting duty under Commander White, who has headquarters at Ottawa. Recruits are to join the Royal Naval Canadian Volunteer Reserve, and assemble at Halifax. After remaining there a short time they will be sent to England, where their training will be completed. It is expected that five thousand recruits will be obtained in the Dominion. The rates of pay and separation allowance are the same as for the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

DISTURBANCE AT STANLEY FAIR ENDS IN LEGAL ACTION

First of Three Cases Began Before Police Magistrate Limerick This Morning--Large Number of Witnesses From Stanley

The Stanley Fair, held at Stanley Village the first week of October, has produced three cases of creating disturbance, the first of which was before Police Magistrate Limerick in the police court here this morning. These cases were before Magistrate Peacock at Stanley, but were adjourned to come before the Fredericton police court.

Sandy Fraser, of Covered Bridge, is the defendant in the case heard this morning, which is on the information of Harvey Reid of Stanley, who with Thomas Buchanan as silent partner leased the Agricultural Hall at Stanley for the night of October 4th and held a public dance.

Mr. R. B. Hanson appeared as counsel on behalf of Fraser, who is contesting the case, and Mr. P. J. Hughes for the prosecution.

Mr. Hanson this morning, when the case began, applied for dismissal on the ground that the information was not sworn to before a justice of the peace. He was given time to cite authorities and evidence was taken subject to his objection.

Lieut. Wood will return to Fredericton in a short time and hold a public meeting.

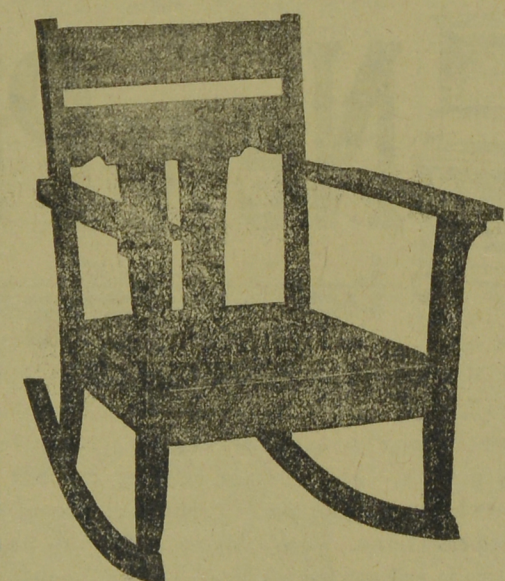
