Blame Laid at Door Of Bonus Army Head by President

Mr. Hoover Issues a Formal Statement on Yesterday's Sensational Military Display at Washington—State Policemen Are Keeping Army on the Move in Maryland.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 29—President Hoover blamed the bonus army commander for the bloodshed here yesterday when he called out the United States army troops to end rioting and defence of civil authority, he said in a formal statement.

The statement was issued in explanation of the most sensational military display in the capital since the civil war, a display that sent young soldiers against world war vets, that sent cavalry tanks, infantry, steel bayonets, gas bombs and machineguns into action against the jobless. Commander-in-Chief Walter Waters of the bonus expeditionary force, declared every drop of bloodshed can be laid directly upon the White House.

The Army in Retreat

LAUREL, Md., July 29—State policemen patrolled the highways of Maryland today under orders to keep the bonus army on the move as it retreated from Washington. About 150 fleeing veterans and their families went through Laurel, about midway between Washington and Baltimore during the night. They were headed toward Baltimore and the North.

JUDGMENT IS RESERVED IN MARTEL CASE

Halifax, July 28—Chief Justice J. A. Chisholm today reserved judgement at the conclusion of the investigation into the conduct of Judge L. H. Martell, of county court district No. 4.

He announced, however, that he would recommend investigation into the disappearance of the records in the case of the King vs. Wile. Wile, charged with a violence of the N.S. Liquor Control Act, had denied ownership of a quantity of liquor allegedly found in his possession. Later, Judge Martell ordered the liquor handed over to Wile.

At the enquiry into Judge Martell's conduct, H. P. Duchemin, K. C., representing the complainants, called on Percy Scott, clerk of the Crown at Windsor, to produce the evidence taken in the Wile case. Scott said the file containing the evidence had disappeared.

"It is quite evident that the evidence has been stolen from the records," remarked Mr. Duchemin today, in the course of a two-hour address before the chief justice.

G. H. Vernon, K.C., counsel for Judge Martell, spoke briefly, asking that a "finding of incapacity" be returned.

Autos Not Scarce

A local police officer was heard to remark yesterday that he had never seen so many cars parked in the one spot as happened on Thursday afternoon in the vicinity of the water sports. As a matter of fact it was probably the largest crowd ever to attend the events, and automobiles were parked together like the proverbial "sardines". However, no accidents or mishaps resulted during the entire day of any consequence. All of which speaks well for the efficiency of the policing.

CONFERENCE IS MAKING GOOD PROGRESS

Ottawa, July 27—The Empire Conference moves forward to its climax. The statement issued by Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, leader of the British delegation, while ostensibly a review of tariff advantages enjoyed by Empire goods in the British market, makes clear that the British delegation aims to secure:

(1) Reduction in the rates of duty now imposed by the Dominions on British goods.

(2) Curtailment of the power of customs authorities to impose arbitrary valuations for duty purposes.

Although not stated as such, they are Dominion concessions Great Britain evidently has in mind, if she is to maintain or extend the preferences she now grants to Empire goods under her new tariff system.

Around British headquarters there is keen conjecture how far the dominions will be prepared to advance along these lines. The dominions, on their part, are no less anxious to know how far Great Britain will be ready to reciprocate with preferences on natural products, what she will be prepared to do in regard to Russian dumping.

Died Yesterday

Fred Leek, aged 83 years, passed away at the home of his niece Mrs. A. McCarthy, springhill, yesterday afternoon after a lingering illness. The deceased is survived by several nephews and nieces. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon with prayers at the home at 2:10 p.m., and services at St. Peter's Church at 2:30. Rev. Mr. Buckland will conduct the services and interment will be made in the churchyard adjoining. Mr. Leek was a native of Kingsclear and one of the best known colored residents of the Parish.

A FOX CASE WAS SETTLED AT GAGETOWN

Suit Arose Over a Black Fox Which Escaped From Pen and Was Caught in a Trap.

Gagetown, N. B., July 28—The case of J. A. Hargreaves and his son, James, vs. Lee McCutcheon, The Narrows, who on Wednesday and Thursday in the Queens County Court here, Judge A. R. Slipp, Fredericton, presiding, contested the ownership of a black fox pelt, was settled today before court adjourned.

The case arose out of the finding of a black fox on November 28 last, in a skunk trap set by James Hargreaves. The fox had a broken leg and young Hargreaves and a companion, Henry Campbell, killed it, took it home and skinned it.

The defendant heard of this and claimed the pelt. He took R.C.M.P. constables R. M. Love and J. Jackson with him, secured a search warrant from R. H. Coes, justice of the peace, and seized the pelt.

The action was brought for damages and the defendant entered a counter claim to the extent of the value of the fox.

The warrant was declared to be invalid and Judge Slipp stated to the parties that in his opinion it was a case for settlement. After settlement was reached, Judge Slipp warned the constables and justice of the peace against hasty and wrongful action. He said none of the parties themselves had done anything wrong. The plaintiff had not committed any offence to justify the issuing of such a warrant and there was nothing against their honor or reputation. He congratulated the parties on reaching a settlement and remarked that it was very difficult to identify any particular fox when many were at large in this locality.

A. B. Gilbert, of Saint John, appeared for the plaintiffs, and H. N. Jonah, of Sussex, for the defendant.

Execution Will Be Delayed If He Files An Appeal

Paris, France, July 29—Paul Gorguloff, Russian assassin of President Doumer, would like to live a few months until a child is born to his wife, he said today. I am willing to sign an appeal if it will let me live until my son is born, the Russian told attorneys who asked if he would sign an appeal from the sentence to die on the guillotine. If Gorguloff appeals his death will be delayed only until September, as there is no chance of the appeal being upheld. Otherwise his head will be chopped off within three weeks.

NOTED FLIERS WEDDED TODAY IN LONDON

Would be Suicide Was in Love with Jack Dempsey

Lina Basquette, a Dancer, Swallowed a Dose of Poison at Los Angeles—May Recover—Left a Note Telling Dempsey She Could Not Live Without Him.

LOS ANGELES, Calif., July 29—Lina Basquette dancer, was removed to her home early today from a receiving hospital after receiving treatment for self-administered poison.

Although her condition was at first believed to be critical, physicians said prompt emergency measures had been effective and they believed she would recover. Only a few hours earlier Miss Basquette, whose name had been linked with that of Jack Dempsey, former heavyweight boxing champion, in a romance, announced her engagement to marry Teddy Hayes, former trainer of Dempsey.

A note found in the actress' apartment by police, said: "Jack—I love you—only you. I could not help it. I could not go on without you."

INQUEST AT MINTO TO BE HELD MONDAY

Minto, N.B., July 28—Inquests into the deaths of the three boys and two men whose lives were snuffed out here today in the old Taylor mine shaft, will be held in Minto Memorial Hall on Monday, at 7:30 p.m.

Coroner Alex. Burnett of Oromocto will conduct the investigation. W. Burton Wisley, Minto coroner, did not wish to act as he is an accountant of the Miramichi Lumber Company, owners of the mine.

Jurors empanelled tonight by Coroner Burnett, assisted by Provincial Constable Albert Petley, were H. B. Wright, Albert Smith, Daniel Lepper, William Gallagher, Thomas Swift, Gordon Lawson and James Crawford. A foreman will be chosen from among the seven.

R.C.M.P. Sergeant George H. James and Constable F. F. Hanson, both of Fredericton division, lent assistance.

MADE FUNERAL PLANS 5 YEARS BEFORE DEATH

Boulder, Colo., July 29—More than five years ago Matthew E. Drier, 75, selected his casket, paid for his funeral services, and ordered a simple ceremony.

He died recently and the funeral was carried out exactly as he wished. On January 7, 1927, Drier and a friend, who preceded him in death, called in Leslie Kelso at the Hall-Kelso mortuary and made the arrangements.

BEARS ANSWER DINNER BELL

Mount Baker National Park, July 29—Smart Mount Baker bears have learned a trick from the construction crew, and amble to camp when the dinner gong rings.

The bears soon associated the scene of food with the gong, and the men encouraged them by tossing offerings from the dinner table. Now upwards of a dozen bears are prompt arrivals at dinner time.

BONUS TROOPERS WERE ROUTED BY U. S. CAVALRY

Washington, D.C., July 28—Thrusting tear gas bombs and the torch, federal troops forced the sullen bonus army from three of its encampments today—after one of its members had been killed by police—and stood by tonight to force evacuation of the last and biggest camp.

More than fifty veterans, police, spectators and soldiers were injured, three seriously, in the series of clashes before and after President Hoover directed that Fort Myer cavalry and infantry take the situation over.

In the wake of an agreement to hold off from a forceful attack on the Anacostia camp for an hour, to allow the bonus expeditionary force to evacuate, plans to proceed tonight were abandoned.

General Miles announced the troops would await orders for further action tomorrow.

He said the decision to postpone action was not his own decision but resulted from orders from above.

He did not name the source of the orders, saying only that he himself had no plans and developments would depend upon the orders he received.

The main evacuation of the day was of the shady settlement and that in abandoned buildings in the shadow of the Capitol. That done, at the expense of much tear gas and cavalrymen riding into crowds and veterans and spectators to disperse them.

NEW RECORD FOR GLIDING
