NEW YORK GIANTS
NOT AS STRONG AS
IN 1904 SEASON

"Iron Man" McGinnity
Has not been Replaced
--Present Pitching staff
Weaker than it was.

The Giants of 1904, who won eight consecutive baseball games, were stronger than the present Giants, who won seven straight, in one particular. They were better off for pitchers. Otherwise the present Giants are a better equipped team than their predecessors of twelve years ago.

The 1904 pitching staff comprises Mathewson, McGinnity, Ames, Wiltse, Elliott and Taylor.

There were not as many good pitchers in that list as McGraw has now in Mathewson, Tesreau, Anderson, Perritt, Benton, Stroud, Schauer and Schupp, but the smaller array possessed the immense advantage of having two such moundsmen as Mathewson and McGinnity simultaneously.

The present one has no such two pitchers of the superlative quality that Matty and the Iron Man were that year.

One pitcher of the worth of Matty is no mean asset and two—for McGinnity was a fitting mate for Matty, though not quite his equal—are a gift of the gods.

"If I had those two now!" McGraw said last week, "it would be ten to one that we won the pennant."

Bowerman and Warner were two good everyday workmen behind the bat for McGraw in 1904 and capable of as good service as his present staff, but the infield—McGinnity, Gilbert, Dahlen and Devlin—didn't represent quite as much comprehensive skill.

Nevertheless, it was a rattling good cordon and stronger on the left hand side than the present one defensively.

In combined fielding, batting and base running ability Burns, Kauf, Robertson, with Roush in reserve, outpoint Mertes, Eversman, Browne and Donlin.

Yet the latter crowd could hit and run bases and the whole 1904 outfit was considerable outfit.

GEERS STRING OF
HORSES NOW ARE
AT NORTH RANDALL

Fourteen Head are Being
Campaigned by Master
Reinsman --- Bonington
and Guide going good.

The Geers stable is now at Cleveland's mile track, North Randall, having been shipped from Memphis Saturday night. The master reinsman has fourteen head, as follows: Bonington, 2.04%; St. Frisco, 2.07%; Guy Nella, 2.07%; Deroche, 2.07%; The Guide, 2.07%; Judge Jones, 2.12%; Harvest Glow, Ida DeForest, Axson M. and Lightsome Watts, trotters; Napoleon Direct, 2.00%; Halplex E., 2.09%; Sir Anthony Carter, 2.17%, and Jack Sutherland, pacers.

Bob Neill, nephew of Geers, and his secretary, writes the Horse Review the following interesting bit of news concerning the string:

"Bonington and The Guide have each worked in 2.09. The former pleases his trainer much, as he seems to be sound, shows no disposition to be unsteady, and a half in 1.03 seemed easy for him. Guy Nella has been in 2.09%, Deroche in 2.10% and St. Frisco in the same notch. The stable in the last four named looks to hold a strong hand for the 2.08 classes.

"Harvest Glow, the young stallion by The Harvester, 2.01, bred and owned by May Overton, of Nashville, Tenn. is a grand trotter. He has worked in 2.10%, and Mr. Geers has great hopes of him if he can keep him sound—he has a leg that is under suspicion, having gone amiss because of it last season. So far he is doing finely.

"Judge Jones, now 5 years old, has been in 2.12. Ida DeForest, bred and owned at Forest Park Farm, Terra Haute, Ind., is 3, has been in 2.19, half in 1.07, and looks like futurity timber. Lightsome Watts, also 3, has been in 2.20%.

"While Axson M., the 2-year-old son of Manricho, 2.07%, has not been faster than a quarter in .38, he is expected to have a chance in the 2-year-old futurities.

"Napoleon Direct has shown 2.08 among the pacers, with some dizzy fractions. The two-minute mark looks sure for him before the season is old. Halplex E., who was unlucky last year, is working excellently, and has been in 2.09%. Sir Anthony Carter, who will be a new face on the Grand Circuit, has been in 2.09%, half in 1.03%, and Mr. Geers likes him. Jack Sutherland is credited with 2.12. The stable looks good, but not sensational."

LEWIS AND GLOVER
MEET TONIGHT FOR
WELTERWEIGHT TITLE

Glover won from English-
man in Last Bout---
Lewis clever Boxer, may
Show come-back form.

Boston, June 12—The two local clubs present strong bills this week, and a glance over the list indicates that the fans are going to see the kind of battling they like. At the Armory A.A. tomorrow night the feature bout, which will be between Ted Lewis, the clever English welterweight, and Mike Glover of this city, is really a championship affair.

Though Jack Britton claims the title in that class, he is not entitled to the crown, according to the way he figures. He says that he won it by defeating Ted Lewis at New Orleans a few months ago. Glover scored a victory over Lewis here last November, which gives him a prior claim to the title.

When Glover fought Lewis here in November, it proved one of the biggest upsets the talent received. A few months previous to that battle, Lewis won from Glover by a shade, and when they met again the talent expected that Lewis would repeat, especially as he was going better than when he met Glover the first time.

The Boston boxer on the last occasion put up one of the best battles he ever did in this section. He had the English scrapper so puzzled by his style that there was no doubt about him being entitled to the verdict when the twelve rounds were ended.

Of course Lewis had his alibi for the defeat and declared that when he met Glover again he would win over him in a decisive manner. Since the battle, Lewis has done a lot of boxing while Lewis has been rising most of the time on his farm in North Reading. As the winner of this contest is to have a battle with Jack Britton here, the question as to who is really the champion in that class is going to be settled here.

The work Lewis has been doing in his boxing bouts has got him in fine shape for the coming bout with Glover. The latter has been working at his farm with several clever and husky boxers and he shows the form he displayed when he defeated Lewis before.

Glover knows Lewis' style perfectly and he feels fully as confident as Lewis that he is going to be the winner again. The bout promises to be a fast and rugged one, for Lewis is going to try for a K.O. from the start, and a great many of the fans believe that he will do so.

Glover's admirers do not look to see him win in that manner, but have enough confidence in his ability to see him gain the referee's award.



NOTICE TO CITIZENS

ALL citizens of Fredericton will take notice that on WEDNESDAY MORNING, June 14, enumerators will start the taking of a Military Census of the city, and at the same time take a School Census. Heads of families are asked to be ready with the required information, and save the time of the enumerators. In the Military Census the names and occupations of all men between the ages of 18 and 45 (inclusive) are required. For the School Census the names of all children between the ages of 5 and 15, with date of birthday, is sought, with the names of parents and street address. This Census is being taken under Legislative authority, and it is compulsory upon all citizens to furnish the desired information. It is most undesirable that any harsh measures should have to be resorted to, and it is hoped that all citizens will readily comply with the provisions of the law.
