SERG. J. LEADBETTER, ROYAL CANADIAN REGT. IS WOUNDED

Formerly Stationed Here With H. Company--Fredericton Man in This Morning's List--Other Local Men.

Another member of H Company, Royal Canadian Regiment, which was stationed in Fredericton prior to the outbreak of the war, has appeared in the casualty list. He is Sergt. John Leadbetter, whose wife and four children are residing at 15 Middle street, St. John. Sergt. Leadbetter was admitted to the hospital at Clatham, England, suffering from a gunshot wound in the arm.

The sergeant is well known in Fredericton and was one of the most popular N.C.O.'s of H Company, R. C.R. He had served in the latter corps for nine years and was a veteran of the South African war. He had been in the trenches since October last.

Douglas Boy Wounded.

Mr. Charles Hawkins of Douglas, who is staying at C. Emery Scott's, Legend street, received a telegram from Ottawa Sunday night informing him that his son, Private James Hawkins, had been severely wounded in the knee by shrapnel. Private Hawkins enlisted originally in the 64th Battalion, but afterward was transferred to the 55th Battalion, with which he went to England. From the 55th he was drafted to a

STEPHEN W. BISHOP KILLED IN GUNTER'S MILL THIS MORNING

Millwright Struck by Iron Bar--Was Attempting to Shift Pulley--Inquest to be Thursday Night.

Mr. Stephen W. Bishop, residing at 40 York street, in this city, was killed this morning in the Babbitt mill in St. Mary's, which is owned and operated by Mr. W. D. Gunter. The deceased was millwright at the Babbitt mill, having gone to work there yesterday morning. He died shortly after being struck in the forehead by an iron bar, with which he was trying to place a pulley in position. Dr. B. M. Mullin, coroner, was notified of the death and with the assistance of Constable James Roberts, empanelled a jury. The latter viewed the remains. The inquest will be held in Dr. Mullin's office, St. Mary's, Thursday night, beginning at seven o'clock. Dr. C. P. Holden is conducting an autopsy this afternoon.

Survived by Widow.

The deceased survived by a widow, formerly Miss Annie Phair of this city. He was fifty-seven years old. The late Mr. Bishop came here from Moncton about six years ago. He was employed by the Neil-McFarlane Manufacturing Company for several years and also by the Smith Foundry Company.

The Accident.

Shortly before eleven o'clock this morning a small pulley at the Babbitt mill was observed to be out of alignment with a large one from which a belt ran to the smaller.

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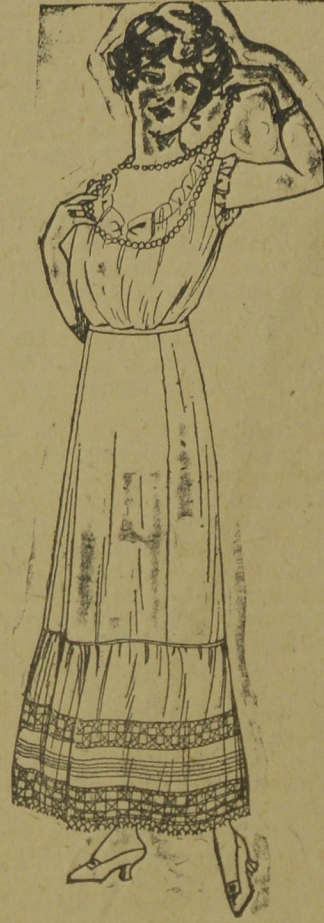
