R.C.M.P. HEAD
CONFERS WITH
OFFICIALS HERE

Maj. Gen. J. H. McBrien
Here Relative to Taking
Over by R. C. M. P.
of the New Brunswick
Preventive Service.

Conferences here last night between a prominent member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, and the Provincial Government, was authoritatively reported this morning as having to do with the taking over of the Provincial Customs Preventive Service by the R. C. M. P. as was forecast from Ottawa some time ago.

Major General J. H. MacBrien, head of the R. C. M. P., with headquarters at Ottawa, arrived in the city last night, and held consultation with the government. This morning, Maj. General MacBrien was in conference with Commissioner E. C. P. Salt, of the New Brunswick Provincial Police. It is expected that the conferences have to do with preliminary plans for this new venture. There is already a R. C. M. P. headquarters situated in Saint John, and another in Halifax, N. S.

Though nothing of a definite nature has yet been revealed, the process of reorganization of the New Brunswick Preventive Service under the R. C. M. P. is now being discussed. Whether the present personnel of the Service will be altered any, remains for decision. The likelihood is that the present Preventive Service of New Brunswick will be absorbed into the new command, and will remain as formerly, but with the Mounted Police in charge of activities.

Legislation was introduced in the Ottawa House a while ago for this taking over of the Customs Preventive Service by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. It is felt at Ottawa that the absorption of the Preventive Service by the R. C. M. P. will augur for more effectiveness by the police in dealing with smuggling, illicit liquor traffic and other violations than the Service administered by the Department of National Revenue.

Visiting Preacher Continues Addresses at the George St. Baptist Church—Large Audience.

Rev. A. K. Herman, visiting preacher from the Highfield Street Baptist Church in Moncton, continued last night his challenging addresses at the George Street Baptist Church. "We would see Jesus" was the text, John 12:21. Questioners desired to see the real Jesus, not merely to know about him. This is the desire that makes the Christian church effective, the wish to have Jesus made real.

"We are going to have a big fight here each night," said Mr. Herman at the opening of his address, a fight against evil-doing, false leads of life, etc. Illustrating later the nature of the Christian life, he said: "It's something in the life that makes the grocer and the neighbor sense something different." "A little talk with Jesus" every day is often the difference between a miserable and a happy glowing life.

In very telling language and in such form as to be easily grasped, Mr. Herman described how Jesus may become the living Christ in human hearts. By sensing the knowledge of Jesus, knowledge concerning human hearts, their struggles, temptations, spiritual needs, we discover the real Jesus in our own day. His undertaking of the needs of his age was good for every age. His interpretation of life is essential life. He himself becomes real and full of meaning to us.

The love of Jesus, too, when understood by man makes Jesus a real and living force today. With striking illustrations from war experiences, the speaker revealed how truly the spirit of Jesus on the cross permeates all life, and how hearts are awakened, by contacts with that loving spirit wherever manifested, to sense the ability and reality of Jesus.

In the concluding portion of the address, the speaker declared that Jesus becomes the greatest reality when His Way of Life is accepted and followed. He becomes then a Saviour to man, not merely overcoming some bad habit or tyrannical temptation, but putting a new dynamic into the soul.

Mrs. J. McMinniman rendered an effective and appealing Gospel solo. Rev. Harold Westrup, minister at the Keswick Baptist Church was present and assisted in prayer during the service. In spite of bad walking a splendid gathering was present showing considerable increase in interest. A number of new decisions for the Christian life were made at three meetings.

MUNICIPALITIES
COMMITTEE

Delegations Here From Many Points in the Province—All Private Legislation—Bills Under Consideration.

The first meeting of the Municipalities Committee of the Legislature was held this morning in the Corporation's room. Many delegations were present from various points in the province promoting private legislation. E. C. Atkinson, chairman of the committee, presided over the long session. Fifteen bills were brought in many of them considerably amended. Two are left standing, the rest are being considered.

The following of the bills were under consideration:

An act to authorize the town of Edmundston to issue debentures; an act relating to the valuation of property and income in the town of Edmundston for county purposes—postponed until Friday morning when a delegation will be heard. An act to regulate the assessment of the taxes in the Town of St. Andrews—amended. An act to authorize the sale and conveyance of certain lands by the Town of St. Andrews—amended. An act to authorize the Town of Newcastle to issue debentures. An act to amend an act to authorize the municipality of Kent to effect temporary loans. An act to further amend the act authorizing the municipality of Northumberland to effect temporary loans. An act for fixing the assessment valuation of certain industries in Moncton. An act to authorize the municipality of Gloucester to issue debentures—for consideration in private session. An act to authorize Bathurst to issue debentures.
