London, Oct. 16.—British forces on the Struma front in Macedonia are active on the left flank of their line east of the river, and have pushed their outposts further northeast in the direction of Demir-Hissar, according to today's official announcement on the operations of the Saloniki army.

The village of Bursuk, eight miles southwest of Demir-Hissar, has been entered by British patrols, who drove back Bulgarian detachments.

attached company of the Special Service Battalion.

A and B companies will be located at the Exhibition Buildings and C and D companies at the Old Government House. Headquarters staff, details and the special company will occupy the Men's Barracks on Queen Street; Park Barracks will be used for quartermaster's stores and a military hospital, while the battalion officers and quarters of unmarried officers will be located in what is known as the Officers' Quarters, also in Queen Street.

When all the work is completed, it is believed that the Kilties will have quarters which are as good as those available for any battalion in Eastern Canada.

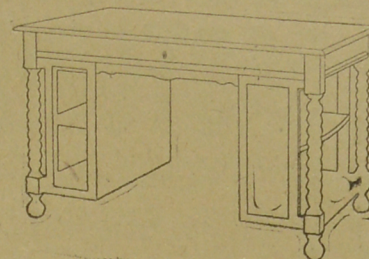

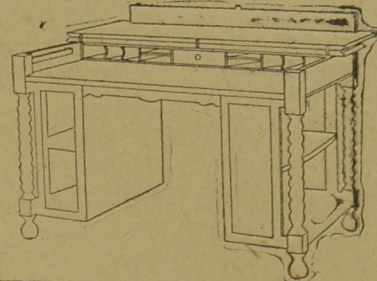

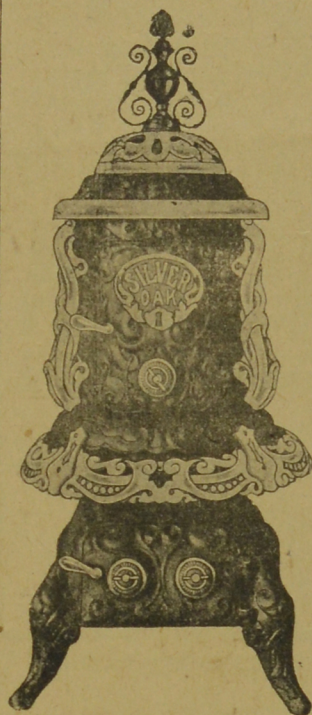
