\$40,000 WORTH
OF TURNIPS SHIPPED
WITHIN THREE WEEKS

The United States Market Has Taken 50,000 Barrels From This Section-- Market Has Slackened Recently -- Price Was High.

Within the past three weeks turnips for which \$40,000 was paid at the cars in Fredericton by the shippers, have been sent from this city to the United States. The quantity is estimated at about 50,000 barrels. The price has been 80 cents per barrel to the farmers who have sold them in this city. To those who loaded their produce on cars at points outside the city the price has been seventy-five cents. At the present time there is a lull in the turnip market, buyers in American cities evidently having been fully supplied.

Ex-Ald. W. W. Boyce shipped 10,781 barrels of turnips last week and 11,800 the week before. During the shipping season he has sent away some 30,000 barrels. Ex-Ald. A. H. Vanwart and Messrs. Clements & Peabody have shipped the balance.

The demand for turnips in such quantities this autumn is not fully explained. It is said by some that jam manufacturers in the United States are pulping the turnips for use as a substitute in the making of their goods. The general demand, however, is for a small turnip, which would indicate that the vegetables are for table use. In this section turnips are grown chiefly as food for cattle. The demand from the United States will hardly have an appreciable effect on the quantity. The average yield is 450 barrels to the acre and the cost of production about eighteen cents per barrel. WORK AT OLD
GOVERNMENT HOUSE
WAS BEGUN TODAY

Authorization of Expenditures on Quarters for 236th Battalion Has Been Given -- Battalion Allotted To Quarters.

Authority to prepare quarters for the 236th Highlanders here arrived from Ottawa last night. Up to the present time all work at the Exhibition Buildings and various barracks has been unauthorized. With the instructions from Ottawa, however, work on the Old Government House will go on as planned.

The City Council has placed the sum of \$3,500 at the disposal of the battalion to prepare quarters in this building, the understanding being that on the departure of the troops the place will be available for use as a Convalescent Home for New Brunswick.

The 236th is to supply all the labor possible for the preparation of the building.

A working party this afternoon began to remove the old paper from the walls and clean the rooms. Sewerage and water are to be extended to the building and sleeping accommodations for 125 men prepared. Sanitary appliances are to be sent from quarters in other cities which have been dismantled.

Ample Accommodations.

With all the buildings now available there will be ample accommodations for the full battalion of kilites and the
