THE UNIVERSITY.

The old institution on the hill has completed another successful year, and today graduated a class of twenty-three young men and women. The University, in common with other institutions of learning throughout Canada, has sent forth its quota of young men from its student body to fight for liberty and justice on the battlefields of Europe. Many of its graduates, too, are filling important appointments with the overseas troops, several of whom have had distinguished honors conferred upon them by their Sovereign. It might therefore very well be said that the University is doing its bit in this great world war, and it has every reason to be proud of the splendid showing being made by its loyal sons in the service of the Empire.

Because of the war the attendance at the U. N. B. during the past two years has not been up to standard, but this is not a matter over which it is necessary to offer any apology. The quality of the student body has been good, discipline has been excellent, and the graduation and honor lists give evidence of hard work and keen competition.

The Encaenial exercises this afternoon were of the usual interesting character. A report of the excellent addresses delivered will be found in another part of this issue, and will repay a careful perusal.

The Mail congratulates Chancellor Jones and the members of the faculty on the completion of another successful year, and it congratulates the young men and women who today took their degrees. Their sojourn in the Capital City has been an agreeable one, and they carry with them the best wishes of all for future success.

The fight for better government is on in the noble county of Westmorland. Yesterday the Opposition forces met in convention at Dorchester, and nominated Dr. E. A. Smith, of Shediac, as their candidate to oppose Hon. P. G. Mahoney, who is seeking re-election after having accepted the portfolio of Minister of Public Works. The Opposition candidate is a member of a family which has taken a very prominent part in public affairs. He is a nephew of the late Sir Albert J. Smith, who represented Westmorland in both the Provincial and Federal Parliaments, and was one of the greatest political gladiators of his day. His father, the late Mr. Edward Smith, was also a member of the Legislature for some years. Dr. Smith has always manifested a keen interest in public affairs. He is a forcible speaker and is well known and popular throughout the constituency. The campaign promises to be a lively one. The Opposition have placed an excellent candidate in the field, and it is up to the people of Westmorland to send him to the Legislature.

DR. E. A. SMITH THE CHOICE IN WESTMORLAND

Dorchester, N.B., May 17—At a well attended and representative convention held in Dorchester today, Dr. E. A. Smith of Shediac, was the unanimous choice as the candidate of the opposition party for the coming by-election. Dr. Smith will oppose P. G. Mahoney, M.P.P., who has been chosen as the successor of Hon. John Morrissey, minister of public works in the local government.

The choice of Dr. Smith is hailed with satisfaction by all elements in the opposition and will commend the unanimous support of the party. The names of Fred Magee of Port Elgin, and James Friel of Moncton, has been mentioned also in advance of the convention, but when the nomination committee presented the name of Dr. Smith, there was no hesitation in making the nomination unanimous and the new candidate was hailed with immense enthusiasm. The convention gave strong evidence of the depth of the feeling against the present administration and the determination of Westmorland county to do its part towards the defeat of the government. The opposition shows a united front for the campaign, and delegates to the convention claim that large numbers of former supporters of the government are flocking to the support of the good government party.

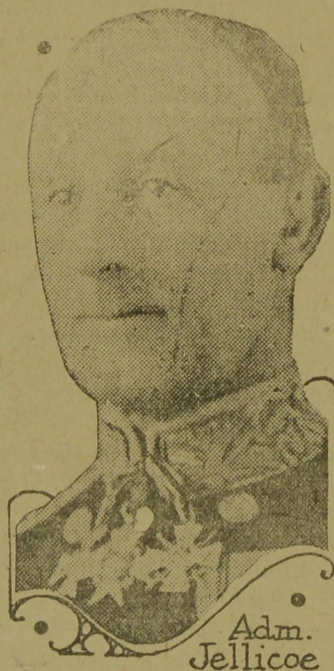

UNIVERSITY SENATE IN SESSION TODAY

The Senate of the University of New Brunswick met this morning. Those present were Chief Justice McLeod, Dr. B. C. Foster, A. S. McFarlane, Dr. W. S. Carter, Dr. W. W. White, Dr. W. D. Rankin, Havelock Coy, Dr. W. C. Crockett, and Dr. C. C. Jones.

It was decided that C. E. Malmann, of the graduating class, who has enlisted in the 58th Howitzer Battery, should receive his degree this afternoon. The matter of allowing the unfinished terms and year to undergraduates who had enlisted was referred to the faculty of the University.

A special committee composed of Dr. W. S. Carter, chairman, Dr. C. C. Jones, Chief Justice McLeod and Dr. W. W. White, was appointed to consider and act upon all nominations for honorary degrees.

Dr. B. C. Foster was elected to the Finance Committee in place of Dr. W. C. Crockett.

It was decided that the honorary degree of Doctor of Science should be conferred on Prof. R. M. Raymond, of Columbia University, and Mr. Wallace Broad, of St. Andrews.

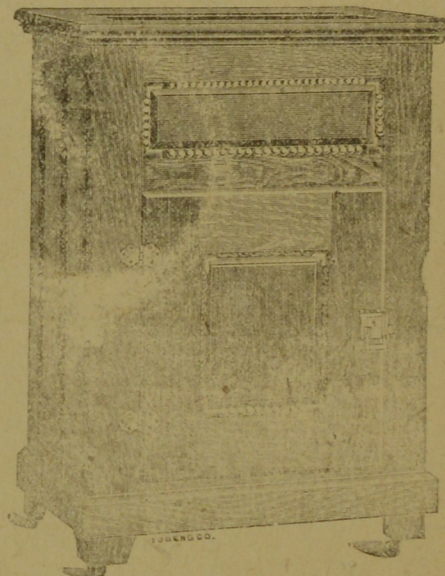
