Japanese Cabinet Has Resigned to Emperor Hirohito

Took This Step After Considering United States Secretary of State Stimson's Note on the Far Eastern Situation—Emperor May Not Accept It.—The League's Failure.

TOKIO, Jan. 8—The Cabinet of Premier Inukai, meeting to consider American Secretary Stimson's note on the Far Eastern situation submitted its resignation to Emperor Hirohito today.

It was expected that the Emperor, who escaped an assassination plot while the cabinet was in session, would refuse to accept it.

Why the League Failed

LONDON, Jan. 8—The fact that the United States is not a member of the League of Nations was partly responsible for the League's failure to settle the Manchurian dispute, Viscount Cecil, veteran British statesman, told the British United Press today.

Lord Cecil also attributed the results of the League negotiations failure partly to the claims of China and Japan that they were not at war, which prevented the League from ordering a blockade under Article 16 of the League covenant.

SAYS DOMINION SHOULD BEAR WHOLE COST

Hon. Dr. Taylor Discusses Old Age Pensions Before the New Brunswick Labor Federation.

Chatham, Jan. 7—In his opinion, the Dominion Government should bear the entire responsibility of old age pensions, Hon. Dr. H. L. Taylor, Minister of Health and Labor for New Brunswick, told the annual convention of the New Brunswick Federation of Labor today. The three-day meeting concluded early this afternoon, after re-electing by acclamation the entire executive board and naming Fredericton as the place of next year's convention.

Approximately \$2,000,000 would be necessary to carry out successfully in New Brunswick the true interpretation of the Old Age Pensions Act, said Hon. Dr. Taylor. He contended the Dominion Government should shoulder the entire burden of this Act. The truth of the matter is we have no money for such legislative acts, he said, referring to old age pensions and mothers' allowances, "and like all other administrative bodies of the day, we are practising, wherever possible, stringent policies of economy. There is nobody more sympathetic toward the labor movement than myself, and at all times you can rest assured of my sincere efforts on your behalf, but I feel I must be perfectly frank with you and tell you that I can hold out but little hope for the operation of the two acts mentioned, at the present time.

May Be Soon

The Minister intimated he expected an early proclamation and enactment of the Minimum Wage Act for Women and Girls, the subject of a resolution passed by the labor convention. He promised that the vacancy on the Workmen's Compensation Board would be filled from the ranks of provincial labor.

THE N. B. BOND ISSUE IS GOING OVER STRONG

Montreal, Jan. 7—Retail response to the New Brunswick bond issue has been "very satisfactory," it was reported here today by the syndicate managers in charge of the campaign. Investors in Quebec, Ontario and the Maritimes are buying briskly. The bonds are for the total of \$5,062,000 required by the New Brunswick Government, and bear 5½ per cent interest, maturing in 20 years.

As was the case in the recent Federal National Service Loan offering, the New Brunswick financing operation is being carried out entirely on a retail basis.

MUNICIPAL COUNCILLORS MADE VIGOROUS USE OF PRUNING KNIFE AT MORNING SESSION

Annual Grant to the U. N. B. Endowment Fund Dropped For This Year—No Grant Made to the Nurses Home, and Children's Air Grant is Eliminated—Assessment Cut by \$6,000.

The York Municipal Council imbued with the spirit of economy applied the axe with great vigor to the items of assessment for the coming year. Several applications for grants were turned down cold. Hon. C. D. Richards, Premier of the Province, who is also County Solicitor, watched the proceedings with great interest and no doubt appreciated the splendid object lesson in economy. It is doubtful if any other premier in the history of the province was ever given such a splendid object lesson. The grant to the university, which goes to the endowment fund, was eliminated, the children's grant of \$300, was cut out, nothing was voted towards the nurses' home, but the hospital grant of \$500 was continued. The County assessment for the ensuing year was slashed by \$6,000 which is nearly ten per cent of the total.

The council met at ten thirty o'clock with the warden in the chair, and all present except Coun. Everett. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The warden read a letter from the Trustees of the Victoria Public Hospital, explaining the method which had been adopted to finance the Nurses' Home. It stated that the city and hospital trustees would each obligate themselves to pay the sum of \$1673 per year for a period of twenty years. The board requested the council to assist to the extent of \$418.40 for a period of twenty years.

Assessment Cut Down

Vigorous use of the pruning knife was shown by the report of the committee on assessment submitted by Coun. Fisher. Practically all items in the list have been reduced, the total cut amounting to \$6,000. Items which have been left blank pending action of the council, included the grant to the University, the grant to the Children's Home and to the Victoria Hospital.

U. N. B. Grant Suspended

Coun. McMullin moved that the grant of \$775 to the University be discontinued for the present year only.

Coun. Seymour moved, seconded by Coun. Hinchey that the grant be continued.

BRIAND MAY RETIRE FROM POLITICAL LIFE

Special Post in Geneva May Be Created For Him

CABINET IS LIKELY TO QUIT

Parliament is Scheduled To Open Wednesday Night

Paris, Jan. 8—Retirement of Aristide Briand from active French politics and creation of a special post at Geneva for him were forecast today in quarters close to Premier Piere Laval. With the resignation of the Laval cabinet expected Tuesday, coincide with the reopening of parliament or the following day, it was understood that Laval would create for Briand the post of Minister of State, delegated to the League of Nations, which would permit the veteran statesman to be stationed permanently at Geneva.

Threaten to Kill Servants of the Gov't in India

Extremist Elements May Retaliate on the Government—Posters Showing Drawings of a Sword and Pistol Have Been Displayed—Demons of a Vanquishing Empire Warned.

BOMBAY, Jan. 8—The Bombay Government's threat to execute violators of recent ordinances was met today by the announcement that Extremist elements had resolved to assassinate certain government servants. A poster decorated with drawings of a sword and pistol was affixed to a wall on an important thoroughfare.

The poster said: "Beware ye demons of a vanishing empire. We warn officers of the British Government always to move about armed. At a signal we will kill marked officers. Congressmen (members of the National Congress) do not interfere with our solemn duties."

AUSTRALIA AND CANADA MAKE AGREEMENT

Canberra, Australia, Jan. 7—The special sub-committee appointed by the new Australian Cabinet today to consider suggestions for a reciprocal trade agreement between Canada and Australia, will explore the whole field of reciprocity in Empire trade as a preliminary to the Ottawa Imperial Economic Conference.

A Canadian-Australian trade agreement was negotiated only six months ago between the Dominion Government and the Labor Government defeated in the Commonwealth general elections of December 19 last by the United Party.

Prime Minister J. A. Lyons, whose Cabinet has just taken office, has repeatedly stressed the Government's desire for increasing intra-Empire trade.

The new Parliament meets in February 17 and one of the first matters taken up will be a new Australian tariff schedule.

VAPOR LOCK IS NEW AUTO TERM

Detroit, Michigan, Jan. 7—There will be much talk of "vapor lock" prevention at the auto shows in January. This relatively new word in automobile parlance simply means that the highly volatile fuels used for easy winter starting develop a pocket of vapor in the gas line during the warm weather, preventing a flow of fuel. Nearly all the new cars have devices to prevent this.

JAP PROSPERS BY TEACHING JIU JITSU

Paris, France, Jan. 8—Combining the diversified arts of painting, editing and giving lessons in jiu jitsu, M. Isigouro of Japan at large, is making a notable success in Paris, not among the 800 Japanese there, but in competition with both natives and foreigners of the French capital.

"The art of jiu jitsu is a delicate one," he said recently, "and it is handed down by our honorable ancestors." Despite the fact that the versatile Isigouro edits a Nipponese newspaper and shows a rare skill at painting, his real passion is jiu jitsu.

C. P. R. HOTEL MAN DIES ON A WORLD CRUISE

John W. Perkins, Former Manager of The Algonquin, Passes Away in Cairo, Egypt.

Montreal, Que., Jan. 8—Word was received at headquarters of the Canadian Pacific Railway here today of the death in Cairo, Egypt yesterday, of Jack Weldon Perkins, well known Canadian hotel manager, who was acting as one of the assistant directors on the world cruise of the Empress of Britain.

Mr. Perkins left the ship at Suez and while in Egypt contracted pneumonia resulting in his death.

He was born in Montreal on September 22, 1880, and was well known throughout Canada as a hotel man. He joined the service of the Canadian Pacific on June 1, 1924 as assistant manager of the Chateau Frontenac, Quebec, and in the same year served as assistant manager at the Algonquin hotel at St. Andrew's N. B. From 1926 until 1931 he managed the Algonquin Hotel during the summer months, and made Montreal his headquarters in the winter, managing the Place d'Armes hotel during the winter of 1930.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Fred Anderson and a daughter Beverly Carrington, both of whom are at present in Miami, Fla., and by one son.

LADY HAMILTON, NOTED FIGURE, PASSES AWAY
