# CLARKE AND BAXTER ARE KEEPING OUT OF CARLETON

**Premier and Attorney General Not Doing Their Bit on Behalf of B. Frank Smith--Letter From Col. McLeod Read at Meeting--No Denial From York's M. P. of Authorship of Letter Giving Source of Big Boogie Fund in 1912.**

Woodstock, Sept. 12.—The campaign of the by-election is increasing in interest. The government forces have been added to and decreased. Dr. Price and J. B. Hachey are the new recruits, while the deserters, for the time being at least, are Hon. Messrs. Murray and Landry. The protest that greeted them from their friends and from the press when they endorsed Flemming by appearing on the platform with him, has apparently alarmed them. Flemming also is not so much in evidence. His health has not been good in the excitement of the campaign, and his physician has told him to be careful.

Price and Hachey are not eloquent stalwarts, but they do as curtain raisers and are quite the equal of Hayward and Squires. The former achieved some distinction last session in the Legislature by taking part in the famous discussion in which B. Frank Smith butted in, and for which the ministry rebuked him through its official newspaper by stating that he had already "done the party harm enough."

Dr. Price could tell the Carleton electors how he and his fellow-whip secured the Colby affidavit, and how much Colby was paid for his trouble. Mr. Hachey could tell Carleton electors who was the partner of A. J. H. Stewart in the operation upon the crown lands of the province which Royal Commissioner Chandler investigated, and he could also explain how much work Frank Curren did counting ties along the I. C. R., how much he received for the work from the province, and through whom the money was paid.

Mr. Curren is also here, and could brighten up Hachey's memory if necessary. Curren was special detective on the Crown Lands last year. He is the brother-in-law of Dr. Bourque, the government organizer in the Acadian districts, and Curren was well paid for his services, which cause a smile at times on the North Shore.

G. F. Burt, assistant superintendent of scalars, is here and very active. He is the Hartland man for the government. For a time after Bery's disappearance he was very busy and he is still employed by the Crown Land Department.

Unlike Mr. Daggett, he is going to take a hand in the campaign. He is no talker, but he knows the game of politics as B. Frank Smith wants it known. The attempt of the Government speakers and press to show that there are defections from the Opposition ranks is amusing everyone here. The C. P. R. station agent at Florenceville, who rumor connects with the postmastership at Hartland, violated the rule of the service and appeared upon a political platform. He is clerk in the church where B. Frank Smith is deacon, and is religiously inclined to follow his church leader.

### Was Misrepresented.

Talking with J. H. R. Simms, of Bath, this afternoon over the long distance telephone, Organizer E. S. Carter asked him when he had become a Liberal, so as to make the political change the Standard boasted of. Mr. Simms replied that his politics had always been Conservative, though he had kept quiet for some years. He, of course, voted for his brother when he ran in 1915, and today was an independent Conservative. His remarks when introducing the speakers at the Government meeting at Bath had been distorted and enlarged upon, and did not fairly represent his views.

H. M. Blair, who has been in Maine since Saturday night, taking in the election sights and scenes there, returned to Woodstock today. At Debec Saturday evening he showed a recent letter from Hon. H. F. McLeod, in which the latter referred to the famous letter he had dictated, and he said there were many people in the audience who knew McLeod's handwriting. As he held up the letter one man jumped to his feet and said: "That's it; I know his handwriting."

### Political Rowdies at Work.

Political posters advertising meetings are never interfered with in ordinary campaigns. It is different here. Opposition posters are torn down in many sections and the two-colored posters, unless watched carefully, are destroyed. There is a viciousness in this sort of campaigning that the Opposition supporters do not follow. They

do not interfere with their opponents.

The voters' lists have not escaped. Many who have been on the lists for years are looking in vain for their names. Even the last Opposition candidate, Robert L. Simms, who was in the county all of 1915, and did not leave for the few months he was in Chipman teaching school, until after the lists were closed and signed, discovered that his political opponents had struck his name from the voters' list. There are many other things in this connection cropping up which will be closely investigated.

The friends of Hon. Mr. Flemming are wondering why Premier Clarke and Hon. Mr. Baxter have not appeared in the campaign. What a love feast when they do!

### Opposition Meetings.

Tonight the Opposition with some new speakers are holding meetings in important centres. Mr. Copp, F. E. Sharp and George H. Adair are on the list of speakers. Last night John M. Keefe, of Grand Falls, who was visiting in Wilnot, made a rattling good speech at the public meeting in Farmington, which George McLeod presided over very ably and which was addressed by E. S. Carter. The joint meeting cannot be arranged in the way the Government party wishes. Today Organizer Carter sent the following reply to William Balmains proposition:

Woodstock, Sept. 12, 1916.  
William Balmains, Esq.

Dear Sir,—I have been unable to reply earlier to your letter of Sept. 9, in which you propose a joint meeting of the Opposition and Government candidates on nomination day, because of my inability to see Mr. McCaig. Some time ago the Opposition party engaged the Hayden-Gibson Theatre for the afternoon and evening of nomination day, taking it for granted that since the Government party refused to join us in debate in the by-election of 1915, the same policy would obtain on this occasion. Our arrangements for the afternoon of nomination day included the presence of several prominent speakers from distant parts of the province, but in order that the Government speakers may be quite satisfied of our willingness to meet them, the Opposition party will be glad to change its arrangements and share the time of our afternoon meeting in the Hayden-Gibson Theatre, giving to Hon. Mr. Smith and any gentleman whom he may associate with him, one-half or three-quarters of an hour each, and the same time to two representatives of the Opposition party, one of the Government speakers to open the meeting, followed in turn by an Opposition speaker, then a Government speaker, and the same to be closed by the Opposition.

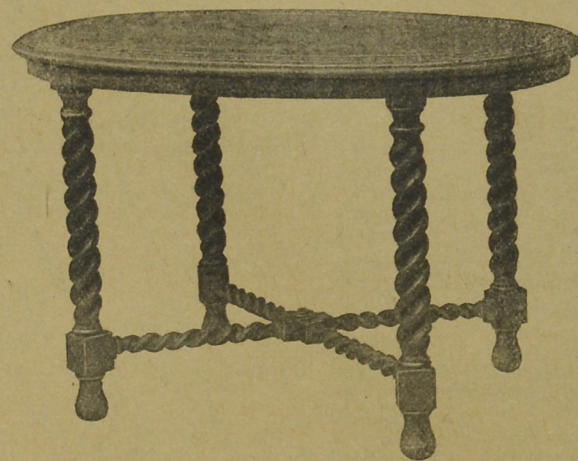

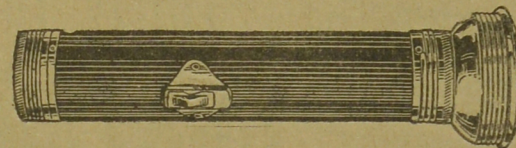
