## WOMAN'S COLUMN

PREPARED WITH PEACHES.

Peach Pie.

Peach pie can be made in a variety of ways. One calls for a baked under crust, cooled and filled with cut up ripe peaches, sweetened and piled high with whipped cream. For a cooked peach pie try this receipt; Line a pie plate with pastry and fill it with quartered peaches, stoned and peeled. Sweeten to taste and place cross bars of the crust on top. Bake slowly until done.

Peach Pancake.

Peach pancakes form a good luncheon dessert. To make them mix the yolks of three eggs, a quarter of a cupful of sifted flour, a tablespoonful of butter and the same amount of sugar, a pinch of salt and the whites of two eggs, with enough milk to make a thin batter. Add chopped peaches and cook in small pancakes.

EMPIRE EFFECTS POPULAR.

Quite and unusual and interesting development is that of the Empire style which appears in some of the dance gowns. No doubt the designer got her inspiration from the costumes of the sec- Empire, for they are almost exact in their appearance. One dance gown appears to have been copied from that worn by Empress Eugenie in her famous portrait. Then there is also the long full skirt which accentuates the youthfulness of the figure. The effect is charming. The gown mentioned was developed in apple green brocade taffeta. The pointed tunic was a distinctive and attractive feature. Silk hose and button satin slippers contributed to the charm of the outfit.

### BEAUTY HINTS.

Egg shampoo is good for light hair. Beat up the egg with an ounce of water. Don't have the water hot, or it will cook the egg. Rub this well into the scalp and rinse well afterwards, so that your hair will not have an eggy smell.

Rubbing olive oil into the scalp is especially good for dry hair, as it furnishes an oil in place of the natural oil, of which the hair is deprived, and which causes split ends. Olive oil is also an excellent nourishment to the skin.

Try this lotion to keep the hands soft and white. Use after washing and drying. One ounce of glycerine juice of two lemons, two ounces of rose water and enough soft water to fill, with the other ingredients, a half-pint bottle.

Pure glycerine is likely to make the skin smart, and to encourage the growth of hair. A mixture of equal parts of glycerine, rose water bay rum and camphor will keep the skin velvety without harmful results the other way.

### TWO SOLDIERS KILLED AT TORONTO BY EXPLOSION

Toronto, Sept. 12.—A terrific explosion occurring in the lake off the Exhibition grounds this morning cost the lives of two soldiers, Quartermaster Sergt. William James Griffiths, of 921 Offington avenue, and Sapper John Edwards, 43 Lavinia street, Swansea.

The men were in a small boat engaged in placing explosives in the lake for the camera of a moving picture man.

In their boat was a quantity of dynamite, which in some fashion was set off, and the resulting explosion tore men and boat to atoms.

The men belonged to the Canadian engineers and had been employed in providing the submarine explosions on the water front during the exhibition.

### AMERICANS SAY BRITISH SHIP VIOLATED NEUTRALITY

Washington, Sept. 12.—Violation of American neutrality by a British torpedo boat which held up and examined the Philippine steamer Cebu within the territorial waters of the Philippines, was reported to the War Department today by Governor General Harrison.

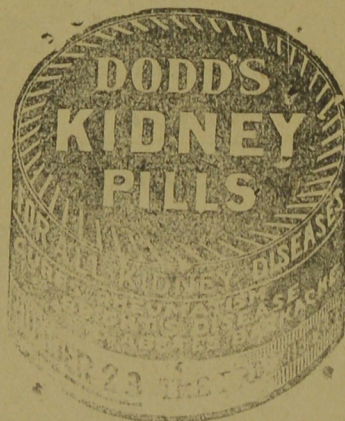
The despatch immediately was transmitted to the State Department and will be made the subject of a vigorous protest to Great Britain.

Henry Ford Gets It, But is Said to be "Indifferent" About It.

(St. Louis Post-Dispatch.) Henry Ford is estimated to be making a million a week—a million dollars, not automobiles. Not many of us are doing so well. Yet Mr. Ford's wealth excites no envy to speak of. He is an exceptional millionaire in that nobody begrudges him what he makes—the more the merrier. He seems to care very little for the money itself, which indifference has engendered a like public indifference to it.

Yet he is an exceptionally enviable multimillionaire, as multimillionaires go in this country. Most of our "big rich" men are ill paid at best for their trouble and worry consequent upon that state—while the little they have is begrudged them. The entailed annoyances of a million a week to the average poor multimillionaire, are as numerous and persistent as flies that buzz around a molasses barrel which cannot be swatted, while the grave and sober cares consequent upon tumultuous millions are greater than a King's. Nobody sympathizes with the poor multimillionaire even when his money-making processes wreck his health or grind the very life out of him.

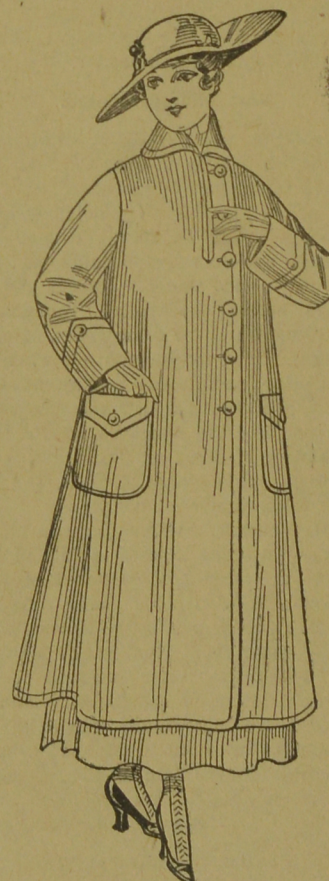
