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Millions of People In Great Republic Will Vote Tomorrow

The Presidential Candidates Will Make Last Minute Appeals to the Electors—President Hoover on Way to California — Will Speak Tonight From Nevada Town.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 7—The Presidential candidates today whipped together last minute appeals for the millions of votes that will determine their potential fate tomorrow.

President Hoover' special train rumbled across the wastelands of Wyoming and Utah towards Salt Lake City, where he speaks this afternoon.

Tonight from Elko, Nevada, he will make the President's traditional appeal for all citizens to go to the polls. Mr. Hoover was imbued with a contention that a mighty tide had turned his way.

Governor Roosevelt, supremely confident, planned four talks this afternoon to home folks of the Hudson Valley and a last speech tonight at Poughkeepsie, N. Y.

IRISHMEN PROTEST VISIT OF THE PRINCE

Dublin, Germany, Nov. 6—A resolution of protest against the impending visit of the Prince of Wales to Belfast to open the new Parliament Buildings, was adopted today at a large meeting held on College Green and addressed by prominent Republicans.

The resolution characterized the Prince's trip as "a deliberate attempt to perpetuate the partition and to misrepresent the people as loyal to the Empire they hate."

Brian O'Higgins, president of the Sinn Fein Republicans, said the Prince was going to Belfast not as a private citizen but as the representative of the Crown in a city of the Irish Republic. Every Irish Nationalist, Mr. O'Higgins declared, should tell him he is not welcome.

A Rally Service

In connection with the centennial observation of the founding of St. Paul's United Church, a special rally service was held on Sunday afternoon in the Sunday school. Dr. W. H. Smith Vancouver, and Dr. Sutherland, of Halifax, and Rev. George Telford spoke. The above are past Sunday school superintendents. S. H. McFarlane, and H. S. Campbell, past superintendents, occupied seats on the platform. The junior choir sang a special number. W. M. Burns presided. There were classes, and a large number including visitors, attended the service.

May Drag River

Police officials will commence dragging operations on the river in the vicinity of the Municipal Home at Nashwaaksis in the event of the non-appearance soon of William Culligan, 86-year-old man, who disappeared from the home last week. Up until noon today the whereabouts of the man, known to be of feeble mind, was still unknown. He had been reported to have gone in the direction of the river, and the tongue of a shoe, thought to be his, was later found, near the river bank.

COCKTAILS ARE POISON, HE SAYS

Paris, Nov. 7—"Cocktailitis" will be a recognized disease in the pathology of the immediate future, according to Leon Daudet, French Royalist leader who was a physician before he took up literature and politics.

"I consider cocktails," Daudet says, "to be frightful poisons, equal if not superior in their harmful effect to morphine and cocaine. The medical world is turning its attention to this question. A new pathological type, cocktailitis, is on its way."

HITLER FORCES GIVE SETBACK IN GERMANY

Sunday's Election Has Apparently Resulted in a Stalemate — A New Reichstag Selected.

Berlin, Germany, Nov. 7 —Almost 35,500,000 of Germany's 44,500,000 qualified voters undauntedly went to the polls yesterday—the fifth time in 1932—and administered the first big defeat ever suffered by Adolf Hitler's Fascist National Socialists.

The result of the voting, in which the nation selected a new Reichstag, is problematic so far as Chancellor Franz von Papen is concerned; for Hitler it may be disastrous.

The most conspicuous gainers were the Communists, who will march into the next Reichstag with about 100 members.

Dr. Alfred Hugenberg's Nationalists and the remnants of the once powerful Populists, founded by the late Dr. Gustav Stresemann, also gained considerably, but they are in no position alone to form a strong Government bloc.

No party emerged to form a Government. Nevertheless spokesmen for von Papen cabinet said they were gratified with the result. They saw it as the breaking up of Hitler's power, and they were pleased also because the middle parties showed they were beginning to recover from the low ebb reached at the last election.

A preliminary computation of the complete vote showed the following party standing:—National Socialists, 11,714,000; Nationalists, 2,552,000; Populists, 660,000; Economic Party, 111,000; Christian Socialists, 405,000; Farmers, 165,000; Centrists, 4,238,000; Bavarians, 1,030,000; States Party, 326,000; Socialists, 7,234,000; Communists 5,973,000; Scattered, 565,000; Total, 35,541,000.

Estimated Distribution

The Wolff News Agency estimated that in the new chamber the Nazis would have 195 seats the Socialists 121, the Communists 100, the Centrists 70, the Nationalists 49, and the Bavarians 18, the Economic Party 2, the Populists 11, the States Party 2, the Christian Socialists five and miscellaneous seven, making a total of 580.

Convinced that the general opposition to the Government is purely negative, with nothing constructive enough for the forming of a new Ministry, Chancellor von Papen is reported to have determined to challenge the new Legislative to co-operate with him. Failing to obtain that co-operation, he probably would get President von Hindenburg to dissolve the Reichstag again.

Meanwhile it was said, he would attempt with the aid of the Reichstag to effect a change in the electoral laws which would move the voting age up to 25 years, thereby eliminating youthful radicals of both Right and Left and giving a fair hope that another election would result in a Reichstag capable of working constructively.

Nazi Comment

"Von Papen inflated the Communists", was the election comment given out at the Nazi headquarters in Munich. "Now let him show how he will get through the winter."

"It is up to him to take entire responsibility. With whom does he want to govern? The Hitler movement intends to remain in opposition."

WILL OF LATE ARCH. FRASER WAS PROBATED

**HAD \$318,000
LIFE INSURANCE**

**Personal Estate Was
Given a Nominal
Value of \$56,000**

Edmundston, N. B. Nov. 7—The will of the late Archibald Fraser, president of the Fraser Companies, Ltd., who died suddenly on Thanksgiving Day while hunting was admitted to probate here on Friday last. The will was executed on December 18th, 1930, and named Donald Fraser, Donald A. Fraser and R. B. Hanson, M.P. as executors and trustees. To the widow is bequeathed all of the household furniture, contents of the residence, motor cars, etc.

To Donald A. Fraser, eldest son of the testator, is bequeathed, the guns, rifles, sporting goods and fishing tackle, including a half interest in Nictan Lodge on the Tobique, jointly owned by Donald Fraser, Sr.

How Disposed Of

The residue of the estate has been devised to the executors and trustees to be liquidated within a period not exceeding ten years. After the debts, funeral and testamentary expenses shall have been paid, the residue is to be divided into four equal parts as follows: one part to go to the widow, another part to Anne R. Kennedy, daughter of the testator, and one part each to Donald A. Fraser and Archibald Fraser.

No Public Bequests

The will makes no provision for public bequests, the deceased having in his life time, in conjunction with his brother Donald Fraser, made philanthropic gifts to the extent of half a million dollars.

The estate consists of real property to the value of \$24,300, but the value of the personal estate not having been determined it was probated at a nominal value of \$56,000 and includes \$6,000 life insurance payable to the estate.

The real estate consists of the Nictan Lodge, the Fraser homestead, the Aberdeen mill site and the Children's Home, located in the city of Fredericton.

Heavy Life Insurance

There will also be available insurance on the life of the deceased, aggregating \$136,000 of which \$6,000 is payable to the estate as already mentioned. The major portion of the balance is payable to the family. Messrs Hanson, Doherty & West are proctors for the estate.

The service is an annual one put on by the Legion. The legion members assembled at their quarters in Queen Street at 10.30 and marched down Queen Street to the church. A pipe band headed the procession, followed in order by the color party, a bugler, and then the members of the Legion and Boy Scouts and cubs. "The Last Post" and "Reveille" were sounded during the church service by Bugler Fred Morris, of Marysville. Rev. Dean Holmes remarks were appropriate to the occasion.

R. B. Hanson, K. C., M. P. arrived on Saturday evening from Edmundston, where he was engaged in professional business and spent Sunday at his home here. He is returning to Ottawa today.

The Soviet Gives Great Display of Military Power

Impressive Demonstration Marks the Sixteenth Year of the Revolutionary Regime—Fifty Thousand Troops on Parade—War Minister Looks For Another War.

MOSCOW, Nov. 7—A great display of military power, one of the most impressive demonstrations in Soviet history, today celebrated the beginning of the sixteenth year of the Soviet Union's revolutionary regime. Fifty thousand picked troops marched through Red Square before Josef Stalin, Premier Molotov, Minister of War Voroshilov and other officials. Fifty bombing planes flew overhead. The show revealed an unprecedented mechanization and motorization of the Soviet military forces. The Minister of War, addressing the Red army from Lenin's Tomb, said another war was inevitable and that the army was ready to defend Russian frontiers. He emphasized the Soviet desire for peace, but said interventionists were active.

SOUTH ASKS FOR A COTTON XMAS

Columbia, S. C., Nov. 7—Something new in Christmases is proposed for the South this year—a "cotton Christmas."

The objective of the movement sponsored by the Association for the Increased Use of Cotton, is to have every present given during the holiday season made of cotton, or involve the use of cotton.

The association has listed large numbers of gifts for men, women and children, and merchants will be urged to feature cotton gifts. Cigar and candy manufacturers will be asked to wrap their packages in cotton.

TRAMPS HITTING FOOT LOTION

London, Nov. 7—Through experiments tried by some of Britain's "Weary Willies" an addition has been made to the list of alcoholic drinks here which will provide a speedy state of complete intoxication at bargain prices.

The officers explained their Quixotic conduct as based on disinclination to profit from acts aimed at the republic.

Greatly Improved

James McAllister, of Red Bank, Queens county, is resting quite comfortably in the Victoria Hospital today after walking six miles yesterday with a bullet lodged in his abdomen. Yesterday morning McAllister, a well-versed trapper, accidentally shot himself and was forced to walk the above distance to secure aid. Dr. B. H. Hay of Chipman, attended the man in a farmhouse at Chipman last night and he was at once removed to the hospital here. Dr. Hay explained the accident last night. McAllister had laid his rifle against a tree and had gone to get a mink and wildcat, caught in his traps. The rifle slipped down and discharged, the bullet passing through the man's abdomen. The wound bled freely and the injured man was very weak when he reached a farmhouse. The bullet just missed his hip. McAllister, a man 50 years of age, showed great powers of endurance.
