A Rich Market for Danish Products Is Now Threatened

Reports From Ottawa Have Created a Sensation In the Land of the Midnight Sun—Alleged Fanaticism of Lord Beaverbrook on Empire Free Trade is Roundly Condemned.

COPENHAGEN, July 26—Reports from Ottawa that the Imperial Economic Conference intended to bar Danish bacon, butter and dairy products from Great Britain through high British tariffs and open the market to Dominion products created a sensation in the markets here and produced immediate editorial protest.

Newspapers attacked the alleged "fanaticism" of Lord Beaverbrook, publisher of the London Daily Express, who has carried on an Empire free trade campaign for several years. Editors hoped that Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin and Premier Ramsay MacDonald would oppose Beaverbrook's ideas—which would mean the loss of the rich British market for Danish producers.

SUICIDES ARE ON THE INCREASE ACROSS BORDER

The Number Doubled During the Last Year of the Economic Depression.

(Special to the DAILY MAIL by the British United Press)

New York, July 26—Ten to fifteen men and women will enter a busy midtown office today and announce that they are thinking of committing suicide and would like to talk it over.

The number has almost doubled in the last year of the depression. Two thousand would-be suicides applied for aid at the offices of the National Save-a-Life League here in 1931. In the seven months of 1932 to date, that number already has been equalled and the list grows daily.

Last week eight persons, all men, committed suicide in New York city, three by hanging, two by gas, two by leaping from bridges and one by poison. Forty-five more attempted suicide unsuccessfully, most of them boys and girls in their twenties.

\$100,000 FARM BRINGS \$1,900

Cape Town, July 26—An extreme decrease of farm values was graphically illustrated in the Philippolis district of the Orange Free State. A sheep and cattle farm bought there a few years ago for over \$100,000 was given to a local church by the owner because he found himself unable to make it pay. The lease was first up to auction, but the highest bid was \$1,900.

RED JOURNALS IN ARGENTINA

Buenos Aires, July 26—The newspaper La Prensa says that it found 621 publications in Argentina printed in every language, from Spanish to Arabic and Esperanto, inciting the masses to violence and inciting the coming of communism.

SENATOR BORAH HOPES THE U.S. WILL TAKE LEAD

Washington, D. C., July 25—Hope that the United States will take the initiative in calling a world economic conference was expressed today by Senator William B. Borah, of Idaho, as the Administration kept its silence on his proposal.

This studied silence by the Government and the imminence of necessary new war debt negotiations at the close of the moratorium year in December were coupled by some observers as a basis for speculation.

In other words, the European nations are expected to make representations for debt revision when the December 15 payments become due, pointing out that the Lausanne agreement virtually cancelling reparations leaves them less able to pay than when the moratorium was put into effect.

Senator Borah's proposition to trade war debts for disarmament and reparations cancellation in the interests of world recovery is regarded at the Capital as the opening overture.

KILL 20,000 SHEEP TO MAKE BOOK SET

Paris, July 26—Ten thousand Normandy sheep have been butchered to go into the most expensive sets of books ever printed, 100 sets of Homer's Odyssey in four volumes entirely printed and bound in velum.

Ten thousand more sheep to go into volumes three and four are still grazing, for the printing is only half finished. To make sure that the velum is of the same color and thickness, sheep of the same great flock are being used and killed at the same age. Next spring the 100,000 needed for the next two volumes will be slaughtered.

River Lower

PROMINENT U.S. BANKER ON THE MIRAMICHI

L. B. Curtis, of Bridgeport, Conn., a Traveller in Many Lands, is Enjoying His Sojourn in the Province.

An outstanding figure among the numerous American anglers on the Miramichi at the present time is L. B. Curtis of Bridgeport, Conn., who is connected with a large manufacturing concern in that city and is president of the People's Saving Bank of Bridgeport. Mr. Curtis, who is accompanied by his young friend, Walter Stapledon, is past the three score and ten mark, but is husky and well preserved, and is a most enthusiastic devotee of Izaak Walton. He has fished in Maine and Nova Scotia and last year made a brief visit to Hartt's Island pool, but finding conditions unfavorable for sport, this time was taken with his young companion to the Miramichi by Guide Currie and have since made their headquarters at Alex Price's camps, near Ludlow. On Saturday Mr. Curtis landed two grilse and hooked two more which made a get-away. "I have never caught a salmon," he told Mr. Currie, "and if I get one this year you can count on a visit from me every year as long as I live." Mr. Curtis and his friend plan to return to the city later in the week and have another try at the Hartt's pool. It is needless to say that both gentlemen are delighted with New Brunswick.

A World Traveller

Mr. Curtis, besides being a very keen angler is fond of travel and has spent much of his time abroad during recent years. He has visited every European country with one or two exceptions, and is an encyclopedia of information. He is also blessed with an excellent memory and can converse fluently on almost every subject. Bridgeport is the home city of late P. T. Barnum of "greatest show on earth" fame, and he had the winter quarters of his circus in that city. Mr. Curtis enjoyed the personal friendship of Mr. Barnum, and looks upon him as one of the greatest publicity artists that ever lived.

The bank of which Mr. Curtis is the head is a mutual institution and has no capital stock, but its assets total the substantial sum of forty million dollars. Its principal source of revenue is derived from loans on real estate which are made at a maximum of fifty per cent valuation. The bank, having no stockholders, pays no dividends, but makes a distribution to its depositors in the form of interest payments. The size of these payments of course depend on the amount of net earnings during the year. The bank, while a large institution has no branches.

Host at Dinner

Mr. Curtis was the host at a small dinner party at Mr. Price's camps on Sunday evening when he had as guests, Guide Currie and two Fredericton anglers whose acquaintance he had made. A broiled grilse which he caught himself was the chief item on the menu, and Chef Gilks came in for much praise for his skill in the culinary art. Mr. Curtis proved himself an ideal host.

MARTIAL LAW HAS BEEN LIFTED IN GERMANY

The Civil Authorities Once More Have Executive Power

HINDENEURG TOOK ACTION

Ban on Newspapers for Demanding a Strike Remains

Berlin, July 26—Modified martial law was lifted in Berlin and Brandenburg today as politicians saw in a government deal the possibility that General Kurt Von Schleicher, two-fisted militarist and the dapper Adolf Hitler, Nazi chief, might share power over Germany.

The absence of armed resistance to Von Papen's seizure of power in Prussia, upholding of the legality of the "Putsch" in the Supreme Court and a sudden decline in political disorders explained President Von Hindenburg's removal of military control.

Civil authorities were in full possession of executive power and police control. The ban on newspapers inflicted for demanding a general strike and criticising the military was not removed.

Free State High Tariff Barriers Now Effective

The First of the New Duties Expected to Effect Ten Million Pounds Worth of British Imports; Irish Emissary Off to London on Important Mission.

DUBLIN, July 26—The Irish Free State erected high tariff barriers against products today in the economic war with Great Britain resulting from the Irish refusal to pay land annuities to the British Crown.

The first of the new duties were estimated to effect £10,000,000 pounds worth of British imports.

As the new emergency duties became effective, it was learned that the government had sent Hugo Flinn, parliamentary secretary to the Ministry of Finance, to London on "a most important mission," it was believed that President Eamon De Valera regarded the tariffs as a bargaining weapon and was prepared to resume negotiations on the land annuities question.

WOODSTOCK MAN HIT BY AUTO AND BADLY HURT

Woodstock, N. B., July 25—Robert Hemphill, terribly injured about the head in a car accident at Upper Woodstock this morning, was still alive at the Fisher Memorial here late tonight, but practically no hope was held for his recovery. Coroner W. A. Kennedy said that in the event of his death an inquest would be held. Henry Saunders, of Juniper who was driving the car which struck Hemphill, was not held.

Hemphill, an employee on the Teed & Page farm at Jacksonville, left shortly after 4 A. M., to walk to work. A short distance from his home he was struck and knocked down by a car driven by Henry Saunders, of Juniper. Saunders stopped the car and telephoned the police. Constable Jones of the R. C. M. P. and Officer Barry Schriver, of the town force, hurried to the scene of the accident and found Hemphill bleeding profusely from a bad head wound. They rushed him to the Hospital where treatment was given by Dr. Frank Woolverton. The skull was found to be fractured and there were other injuries about the head.

Decision Withheld

Decision was withheld by Magistrate Walter Limerick in the case of the King, on the information of Nathaniel Jones, vs. Douglas Timms, heard in the police court yesterday afternoon. The defendant is charged with wilfully damaging public property to the extent of \$20 on the night of July 6th. He pleaded not guilty. According to the evidence, the defendant ran over and broke a silent policeman at the corner of Westmorland and Charlotte streets. When questioned, the defendant said that he could not make the turn around the sign with the large truck that he was driving unless he stopped, backed up and manoeuvred in other ways. He said that the silent policeman was often moved from the centre of the street intersection making it more difficult to make the turn and that he was unaware of knocking it down until he was notified of the charge laid against him. Witnesses heard for the prosecution were, B. R. Colter, Wilfred Wade, Officer Kenneth Foster. The defense was conducted by F. H. Peters and witnesses heard were the defendant and Ralph Boyce.

TWO BROTHERS DROWNED AT ANNAPOLIS

Annapolis Royal, N.S., July 25—Locked in each other's arms, two brothers sank to their deaths tonight in the water off the Village of Mochelle, near here. Leo Byrne, aged 18, was bringing a boat toward the shore to pick up Frank Byrne, aged 15, about 8 o'clock. Believing he had reached the shallow water he stepped off the boat to wad. The water was deep, however, and he was unable to swim.

Frank swam out. Frantic, after futile efforts to reach the boat, Leo clutched his brother in such a manner that Frank was unable to keep afloat. They sank together. Darkness shut down a half hour later, and at midnight, searchers were unable to recover the bodies.

The boys were sons of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Byrne, who came to Mochelle from Belfast Ireland, about a year ago.

ORDERS FOR N.S. COAL PLACED BY ONTARIO

Toronto, July 25—The Ontario Government and private industrial interests have given a number of substantial orders for Nova Scotia coal, said A. M. Irvine, vice-president of the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation, here tonight.

The Provincial Department of Works has ordered the coal for use at Belleville, Bowmanville, Galt, Brantford and Toronto.

The Provincial Health Department has also lent its support, said Mr. Irvine, and prospects are good for obtaining further orders from government departments.

Leading industrial concerns have followed the Government's lead in buying Nova Scotia coal, he said, instancing the case of a large automobile corporation after a trial shipment, placed an order through the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation for its entire requirements up to the opening of navigation in 1933. The shipment will be delivered to the corporation in Oshawa by water during the next few weeks.
