PARLIAMENT

The Parliament of Canada began yesterday what is likely to be one of the most important sessions in a number of years. The speech from the Throne read by His Excellency the Governor-General, referred to the St. Lawrence waterway treaty entered into during recess, and stated that following its ratification by the United States Senate it would be laid before Parliament for approval.

The trade agreements entered into at the recent Imperial Economic Conference were the subject of a paragraph, and the opinion was expressed that they would "provide the means by which will be developed an enduring and mutually beneficial scheme of closer Empire economic association, and that their early approval is advisable in the national interest."

It was announced that the report of the Royal Commission on Railways would be laid before the House, and a bill based on it will be introduced, "to ensure more effective and economic operation of Canadian railways upon the basis of fair competition, secured in such manner as will eliminate extravagant and harmful duplication of services."

In accordance with the provisions of the British North America Act a redistribution bill, which must follow every decennial census, will be introduced during the present session. As the increase of population during the last ten years has been confined to the central and western provinces, a redistribution will mean the loss of two and perhaps three seats in the Maritimes.

The banking act is due for a revision this year, but the speech intimates that Parliament will be asked to extend bank charters for one year to await the result of the proposed world economic and financial conference.

That His Excellency's advisers believe that the economic depression is passing is shown by the concluding paragraphs of the speech which are as follows:—

"While the economic situation still weighs heavily upon all classes of the community, there are at last definite signs that the acuteness of the depression is passing. I rejoice that the wisdom of your steadfast policy of retrenchment and constructive development, which has ameliorated the hardships of Canadians and maintained the enviable financial position of this country, is still more fully manifest with approaching prosperity. The strength of our financial structure, the resourcefulness of agriculture, and the integrity of industry have enabled us to take quick and profitable advantage of improved conditions. The ratification of Empire trade agreements and your approval of the proposed economies and reforms in railway transportation are means by which Canada's favored position will be more fully secured among the nations of the world.

"The unity, fortitude and capacity of the Canadian people, without which all your labors would have been in vain, shall be now the foundation upon which, with co-operation and faith, we will build a Canada greater than we have yet known. I pray that Divine Providence may guide you in your exalted task."

Ratification of the trade agreements will follow the conclusion of the debate on the address and when disposed of the House will adjourn until early in January. The budget, of course, will not be brought down until some time after Parliament re-assembles.

The session will be a very important one and the proceedings will be closely followed by the people in all parts of the country. Undoubtedly under the able leadership of Premier R. B. Bennett Parliament will find a solution for the great problems with which it will be confronted.

Owners of radio receiving sets are complaining of a most villainous noise which breaks about seven o'clock in the evening and continues until a late hour. It commenced on Monday evening and last night was still strong. It is due to some kind of interference and extends to all parts of the city. An effort made by a number of experts to locate the cause of the trouble has been unsuccessful. In view of the fact that the license fee for radios was increased this year from \$1 to \$2, some effort should be made by the authorities to eliminate static and other nuisance noises which come in over the air.

It is scarcely likely that the world is to suffer from a beef shortage in the near future. President Hoover told his audience at Des Moines, Ia., that there were two million head of cattle on the southern side of the Mexican border which could be bought for \$2.50 per hundred pounds live-weight, while on the American side the price is \$4.50. "All that keeps them out of the United States," he said, "is the tariff wall." The President was, of course, appealing for the votes of the farmers.

The Supreme Court of the State of New York has decided that the election for the mayoralty of New York City vacated by the resignation of Jimmy Walker must be held on November 8th, the date of the presidential election. This means that Walker who is now on the ocean returning from a European trip, is out of the race. Yesterday he sent a wireless message from his ship, stating that he would not seek re-election and the Democrats in convention selected Judge O'Brien in his place.

Forest fires are still raging in the southern part of the state of Washington and in Northern Oregon, and the damage to property has been enormous. Several villages in Washington State have been wiped out and the inhabitants compelled to flee for their lives.

It now seems settled beyond a doubt that the three filers who set out from New York three weeks ago for Rome in the plane, American Nurse, have been lost at sea. A report has reached Williamsport, Pa., that a part of the wrecked plane has been picked up off the Azores.

While the Independent press displayed some enterprise in reporting the proceedings of the Liberal Convention in this city it failed to make public details of the vote in the selection of a party leader.

The rainfall of yesterday in Central Canada and in New York State was one of the heaviest experienced in many years. In Montreal the precipitation was 3.6 inches, the greatest since the year 1880.

POTATOES ARE NOW 70 CENTS AT HARTLAND

An Active Demand Features the Market and Farmers Are Much Encouraged.

(Hartland Observer)
Potatoes today are bringing 70 cents a barrel in Hartland. Even at that price shippers are not getting them fast enough to fill orders. Demand is brisk and all signs point to a price of at least \$1.00 per barrel by the time cold weather arrives.

Haulings all this week have been light, farmers holding back for the better price they feel sure to come around the end of the month. As a result competition between shippers is keen which is reacting to the benefit of the farmers.

As forecast, the yield in Carleton and Victoria counties is about forty per cent less than last year. Farmer after farmer who in previous years had fifteen or twenty acres of potatoes, this year has five or six. Yield per acre is varying to a considerable degree. Some few farmers are getting 100 barrels or more to the acre while the majority are getting but fifty or sixty.

Preparations are now being made to operate the potato starch factory here. Stock is now coming in, consisting of small, bruised and out of grade potatoes. It is not expected to operate any great length of time as the cull potatoes is limited, due to light crops and a fair price for table potatoes. Cord wood is being purchased locally for the factory's fuel. A price of 20 cents a barrel is being paid for the potatoes.

CYCLIST WAS STRUCK BY CAR AND KILLED

Rexton, Kent Co., Oct. 6—Injuries received when his bicycle collided with a car driven by Harry Baird, Richibucto, in the Galloway woods yesterday, proved fatal to John Richard, 28 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Damos Richard, Dells Mills, Kent County who died last evening in the hospital here.

Richard and Fred Gallant left Ste. Anne yesterday afternoon to go to their homes at Dells Mills. While riding their bicycles along the highway, they apparently did not see the auto approaching.

In explaining the accident to R. C. M. P. Constable Richard, Baird said that when a short distance away from the men he sounded his horn, as it seemed to him they did not see him approaching. Immediately after sounding the horn, Gallant ditched his wheel on the wrong side of the road and Richard attempted to cross to the opposite side, or his right side, and crashed into the oncoming auto, Baird claims.

The young man was rushed to the Rexton hospital by Constable Richard but his injuries were such that he died about an hour and a half after being admitted. His skull was fractured and he also received other head and body injuries.

An inquest will be held tomorrow afternoon at Richibucto with Dr. A. E. Forbes, coroner.

FARMER WAS ATTACKED BY ENRAGED OX

Yarmouth, N. S., Oct. 6—Attacked by an unfurried ox, Percy Wyman, aged 60, of Carleton, Yarmouth County, lies seriously injured in the hospital here.

Wyman was engaged in pruning apple trees, when, without warning, an ox which had been quietly grazing in the field attacked him. Having an armful of branches, Wyman was unable to escape its mad rush in time and was hurled into the air by the horns of the charging beast. For nearly half an hour Wyman fought a losing battle in an endeavor to get clear of the animal, and finally sank to the ground exhausted. Even then the bellowing beast pawed the earth alongside, ready to again resume the attack should its victim show any signs of life.

Mrs. Hulbert, a neighbor, rushed to the aid of the fallen man but her efforts were unsuccessful and additional assistance had to be secured from a woodworking factory, some distance away.
