BRITISH ROADS EXTEND POOLING OF OPERATIONS

DOWNPOUR OF RAIN MARRED THE BRILLIANCE OF OPENING OF PARLIAMENTARY SESSION

Ottawa, Oct. 6.—A steady downpour from leaden skies marred today's spectacle on Parliament Hill. The Capital City, drenched with over 24 hours of almost continuous rains, presented a depressing setting for the opening of Parliament. Only a few hundred people braved the elements to watch the ceremonies within and without the Senate Chamber, striking contrast to the eager, jostling throngs which ordinarily mill around Parliament Hill on the day of the opening.

Muffled in their heavy greatcoats, the soldiers of the Governor-General's Footguards which furnished the Guard of Honor, looked forlorn as the rain beat down upon them. Prompted by the troops had to stand in alignment on the square outside the Parliament Buildings for over an hour, while the opening ceremonies were enacted inside.

Carried First Time

For the first time, the Footguards carried their King's Color on which are embroidered the battle honors of this distinguished regiment, honors which the Guards inherited from the 2nd Canadian Infantry Battalion in whose perpetuation they share.

Accompanying Their Excellencies from Rideau Hall was a detachment of the Princess Louise's Dragoon Guards, also muffled in capes, while the rain pelted down on their brass helmets.

The salute to His Excellency was quickly executed and, entering the Parliament Buildings, the Governor-General proceeded to the Senate Chamber.

The warning bells of the Commons sounded their strident summons at 3 o'clock, and it was a well-filled House which responded ten minutes later to the request of the Governor-General conveyed by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, for their "immediate presence in the Chamber of the Honorable the Senate."

Few Present

As a rule the vestibule of the Red Chamber is thronged with gorgeously-gowned ladies, hours ahead of time they take their places on the chairs provided for them, and wait patiently until the ceremonies begin. Today less than a dozen were present, the crowds obviously deterred by the torrential rain.

Inside the Senate, however, the spectacle that has become familiar by years of repetition was no different from that of previous openings. The galleries were crowded and on the floors of the Senate the usual assembly of notables was present. Foreign ministers, consuls, representatives of Church and high officers of the State, garbed in the formal raiment of their various offices crowded the place. In front of the Throne, the Judges of the Supreme Court of Canada, in their scarlet and ermine, sat on the wool-sack, while to the right and left of His Excellency were arrayed his aides-de-camp.

The Prime Minister and Right Hon. Arthur Meighan, wearing heavily gold-braided uniforms of the Imperial Privy Counsellors, stood on the right and left of the Throne, respectively.

With the arrival of the Commons at the bar of the Senate, His Excellency read the Speech from the Throne, in both English and French. This concluded, the members of the Lower House returned to their own Chamber to begin the session.

A spirit of camaraderie was noted in the Commons Chamber. Members renewed friendships, shook hands and indulged in cross-chamber banter. But the buttons will be off the foils Monday when the debate opens in reply to the Speech from the Throne. The House will sit briefly tomorrow. The Senate adjourned until Wednesday.

The only surprise of the Speech from the Throne was announcement of the Government's decision to postpone for a year the decennial revision of the Bank Act, the reason being that the Ministry desires to await the outcome of the proposed international economic conference called by Premier Ramsay MacDonald. The last revision was in 1923 but it should have been held in 1921. The date of the opening of the international parley depends almost entirely upon the outcome of the presidential election in the United States, for that nation will

be an important party to the conference.

Two Senators Named

Ottawa, Oct. 6.—Two of the five vacancies in the Senate were filled today when the appointment of J. H. Rainville and A. J. Brown, K.C., both of Montreal, to the Upper Chamber was announced. The new Senators will likely take their seats next week.

Senator Rainville for the past few years has been chairman of the Montreal Harbor Commission and succeeds the late Senator J. H. Legris, who died early in the summer. Senator Brown replaces Hon. W. L. McDougald who resigned from the Upper House following the criticism directed against him by a special committee which investigated the granting of the rights to the Beauharnois Power Corporation.

The vacancy on the Montreal Harbor Commission caused by Senator Rainville's resignation was filled by making J. C. Newman, a member of the Commission the chairman, and appointing Alphonse Raymond to the board.

The new appointments give the Government a majority of five in the Senate. There are now 49 Conservatives and 44 Liberals. Three seats are still vacant, one each in Saskatchewan, Ontario and Nova Scotia.

The three vacancies were caused by the deaths of N. A. Belcourt (Ottawa); W. B. Willoughby (Saskatoon) and E. L. Giroir (Antigonish).

GEORGIA DR. SEES RUSSIAN PUT TO DEATH

Slipped Through Police Lines for Guillotining At Paris

Paris, Oct. 5.—Dr. Henry Bayon, of Columbus, Ga., connected with the American Hospital at Neuilly, suburb of Paris, was the only American, besides a United Press woman correspondent, who unofficially witnessed the guillotining of the Russian Gorgouloff, Sept. 15, before the Sante Prison in the Boulevard Arago.

Dr. Bayon accompanied the young women, clad for the occasion in men's clothing, to the scene of the execution. They arrived at midnight to look around for a hiding place in the event their police cards proved useless.

"We contemplated climbing a tree," said Dr. Bayon, "but it would have been impossible, for they were too conspicuous and well guarded. A solid convent wall ran the entire length of the street opposite the Sante Prison in the Boulevard Arago, making it impossible to locate anywhere in the block. The ends of the Boulevard were well guarded and closed to everyone not in possession of a special card for the guillotining as well as a personal police card bearing the name of the organization with which the individual was employed.

"We tried all the concierges on the Rue Mechain, but they had been warned by the police not to permit their roof-tops to be used as points of observation. We finally found a corner near the Rue de la Sante and the Boulevard Arago where we stayed for hours waiting for dawn to come and hoping that some chance might let us slip through the line of policemen stationed to hold back the crowds. It was a tense moment when a disturbance opposite us drew the attention of the police to that side of the street.

an opening and into a shadow from which we crawled along the convent wall until we could crouch down almost opposite the death machine. We arrived just in time to see the victim's head placed in the groove of the guillotine, the knife descend as the street lights went out.

"We dared not move for fear of being detected, and it seemed a long time before we actually drew a full breath," the doctor said. When the crowds began moving about we were able to make our exit with those who had been permitted to enter the official circle around the guillotine."
