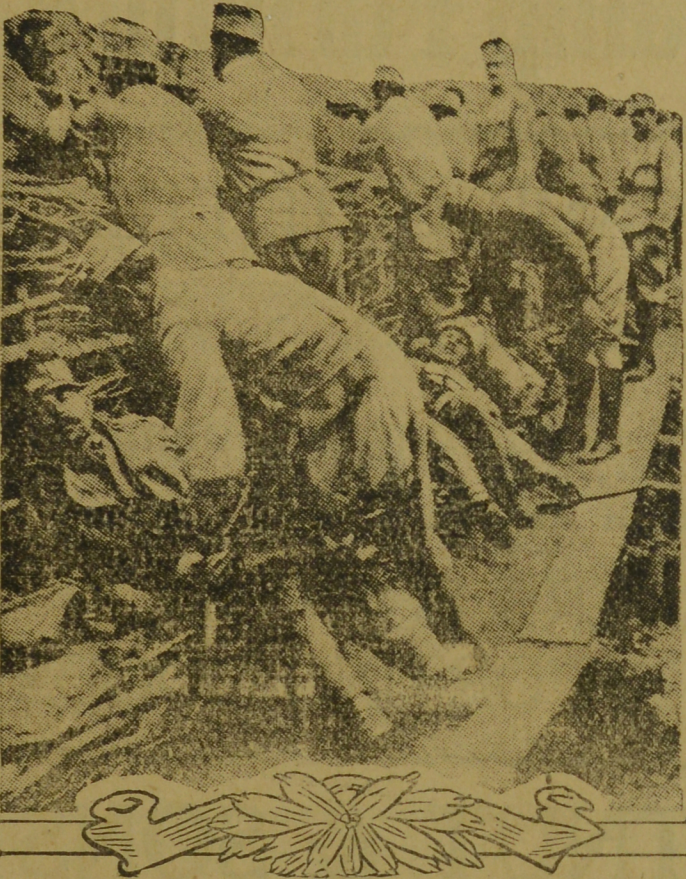

## NEGRO MURDERS HIS WIFE AT DIGBY, N. S.

Fireman on Steamer Prince George Shot His Wife Dead and Then Gave Himself Up--Says Wife Fooled Him and Broke Up His Home.

Digby, N. S., Aug. 13.—Digby has another murder case. There is, however, but little excitement, as no mystery surrounds the guilty one. From the evidence brought out at the coroner's inquest, it appears that Charles Robart, colored, a fireman on the steamer Prince George, running between Boston and Yarmouth, came up on yesterday's Bluenose, hired an automobile and was driven to the home of Luke Francis, at Westville, a village near Digby, where his wife, also colored, had been staying since Wednesday. Without any special warning he drew a 38 calibre revolver and shot her through the shoulder, killing her almost instantly. He then came out to the road and returned to Digby in the same automobile. At the post office he gave himself up to Chief of Police Peck, at the same time handing him

the revolver.

He said: "She has fooled me long enough; she broke up my home, sold my stuff, and I made up my mind she would never do it again. I have fixed her, I think, and I am willing to take the consequences."

The affair took place at about 11.30. An inquest was held in the afternoon, at which the following verdict was returned:

"We, the jury empanelled to enquire into the death of Kitty Robart, after viewing the body and hearing the evidence, conclude she came to her death as the result of wounds from a revolver fired by the hand of her husband, Charles Robart, on this 12th day of August, 1916, in Westville, Digby county."

Robart is now locked up in the Digby jail awaiting his preliminary examination. Charles Robart and Kitty Keelan were married in Arcadia, Yarmouth county, Oct. 26, 1910, by the Rev. Ben. Hill, a Methodist clergyman now stationed in Bermuda. Both are natives of Yarmouth county, one of Lower Salmon River and the other of Hardscrabble. At the time of the shooting there was only one woman in the house besides the victim of the tragedy, and that was Kate Frances, wife of Luke Francis. The house is a little distance from the road which probably accounts for the automobile driver not knowing that a murder had been committed. This, of course, will be brought out in the preliminary examination.
