Big Crop of Hay.

Bridge Damaged by Fire.

A hole was burned through the flooring of the Fredericton-St. Marys highway bridge Sunday afternoon at about 5.30 o'clock. A lighted cigarette is thought to have been the cause. A still alarm called the Fredericton fire department out and the blaze was extinguished. A hole several feet square was burned through the flooring.

Prisoners Tried to Escape.

The discovery was made a few days ago at the Citadel, Halifax, that the German prisoners there had again attempted to escape. A trench had been dug by them, already eight feet in length, of which was to lead to freedom. Three of the prisoners were discovered digging the trench, and these three are now in solitary confinement. SUBALTERNs FROM NEW BRUNSWICK FOR IMPERIAL SERVICE

List Prepared on Lt. Col. P. A. Guthrie's Recommendation--Nineteen Recruits Enlisted Here Last Week--More Today.

DR. W. J. WEAVER TO GO OVERSEAS IN NEAR FUTURE

Probably Will be Appointed to Royal Army Medical Corps--Capt. F. W. Barbour, C. A. D. C., Leaving Tonight for Aldershot, N. S.

In accordance with instructions recently issued from Ottawa, a list of names of militia officers willing to serve in the Imperial Army as subalterns has been forwarded to Halifax by Lieut. Col. P. A. Guthrie.

The list is of eighteen officers of New Brunswick who have been recommended by the Colonel for appointment to Imperial corps. It includes the names of a number of Fredericton men who have not yet secured appointments to Canadian units.

These appointments are possible because of the heavy losses of subaltern officers in Imperial battalions in Flanders and France.

Nineteen Recruits.

Nineteen recruits were enlisted here last week. Of these thirteen were for the 236th Highlanders, three for home service at St. John and Halifax, two for No. 8 Field Ambulance and one for No. 2 Construction Corps.

Gunner George Briggs, of the 58th Howitzer Battery, who is taking his discharge as medically unfit, is wanted at the recruiting office to sign some papers.
