## DEATH AT MORRISON'S MILL.

Mrs. Lucy J. Estabrook, widow of the late B. H. Estabrook, passed away Monday afternoon at her home, Morrison's Mill, after a lingering illness. The deceased was eighty-eight years of age. Two daughters, Mrs. George Godsoe of Boston, and Mrs. Thomas Moore of Morrison's Mill, and one son, Judson Estabrook of Tuson, Arizona, survive. ## ASK FOR A PENSION FOR MRS. R. J. PHILLIPS

Husband Met His Death While Fighting in the Dorset Regiment.

A petition, addressed to Hon. J. D. Hazen, minister of marine and fisheries, is being circulated about the city in the interests of Mrs. R. J. Phillips.

Her husband, the late Robert J. Phillips, was fatally poisoned by gas while fighting in Flanders on May 1st last. As he had transferred from the 12th Canadian Battalion to an English regiment, his widow and infant son are now only eligible for the imperial pension allowance, which is only about half the amount payable to the widows and orphans of regular Canadian soldiers.

This petition requests that legislation be passed making Mrs. Phillips eligible for the Canadian pension.

Under the system upon which the patriotic moneys are being disbursed Mrs. Phillips will not be eligible for anything further from that fund, after she begins to receive her English pension, which should come very shortly now.

## STEAMER NOORDAM HAD ROUGH PASSAGE

St. Johns, Nfld., Jan. 25.—The stmr. Noordam, of the Holland-American line, with its fuel supply exhausted because of delays during stormy weather, arrived here today and will remain thirty-six hours to replenish her bunkers. A large number of the Ford peace delegates are on board. It is a four days' run from here to New York. The Noordam encountered bad weather off the coast of England shortly after leaving Rotterdam. The vessel made then 100 miles a day part of the time, and is now about four days behind her schedule. The Noordam left Rotterdam on January 11th and Falmouth, England, on Jan. 15th.

## WHEAT IS AGAIN SOARING IN PRICE

Chicago, Jan. 25.—Wheat rallied today after a weak start and went to the highest price yet this season. Opening prices, which ranged from 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 lower with May at 133 to 133 1/2 and July at 124 1/2 to 124 3/4, were followed by a further decline and then an upturn to well above yesterday's finish for May.

## QUEBEC MEMBER WANTS REFERENDUM

Quebec, Jan. 25.—Mr. Arthur Sauve, M. L. A. for the county of Two Mountains, will ask the Legislature this afternoon that a general referendum be held through the entire province to ascertain public sentiment on prohibition.

## SPECULATION NOT JUSTIFIED BY THE FACTS

Washington, Jan. 25.—Secretary of State Lansing's only comment today on the published description of Germany's latest proposal was that it was "speculation not justified by the facts." Mr. Lansing went early to the cabinet meeting and it was said he would have a separate conference with President Wilson on the latest turn in the negotiations.

## WILL INVESTIGATE THE LOSS OF THE PERSIA

London, Jan. 25.—The British Government has ordered that a formal investigation be made of the circumstances attending the sinking of the steamship Persia in the Mediterranean last month.

## GREEK NAVAL OFFICERS FOUGHT A DUEL

Athens, Jan. 25, via Paris.—A duel occurred today between two naval officers, M. Courmoullis and M. Melas. M. Courmoullis was wounded. The disagreement grew out of the forced retirement of M. Melas's brother as secretary to King Constantine, on account of his political opinions.

## NOTED AMERICAN TURFMAN, IS DEAD

Saranac Lake, N. Y., Jan. 25.—Herbert B. Duryea, for many years a prominent figure in American racing and yachting circles, died here today. In 1914 his Durbar II won the English Derby.

Mr. Duryea maintained stables in England, France and America, and was deputy steward of the American Jockey Club.

## RELIC FROM BELGIUM.

Mr. W. G. Birmingham, announcer at the Arctic Rink, is the possessor of an interesting relic from the Belgian trenches in Flanders, in the form of a gold watch of Belgian make, which bears on its case a representation of King Albert and the Belgian armies. The watch was brought to Canada by Mr. Birmingham's brother, who served in the 10th Battalion, C.E.F.
