TO BIG LINE

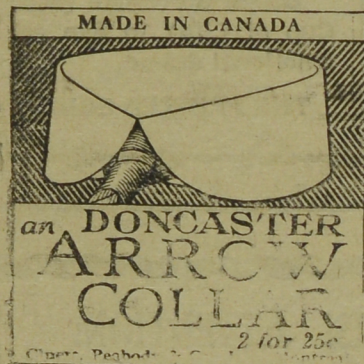
Robert M. Williams Still Hoping to Stage Another Grand Circuit Meeting.

Boston, Jan. 24—Robert M. Williams, who put on the Grand Circuit meeting at Empire City track last year, still has hopes of staging another this summer. In the lower court James Butler, owner of the property, gained a decision that annuls Williams' lease, but this verdict Williams expects to have reversed by the higher court.

Williams is now making Boston his home and should be unable to regain the New York track he will bend his efforts to having the dates transferred to Readville. The understanding at the circuit stewards' meeting was that in case Williams could not have the Empire City course James Tranter was to have the dates for a meeting either at Poughkeepsie or at Readville.

While Williams feels confident that he will win his appeal, he says he will take off his coat and work hard to help Tranter in the event that he loses. Owners and trainers who follow the Big Line would like to see Tranter and Williams team up on a meeting. Both men are hustlers and have won the admiration of the men who pay campaigning bills.

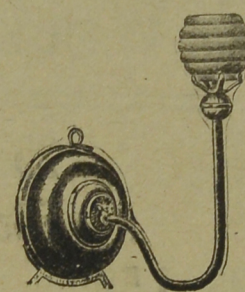

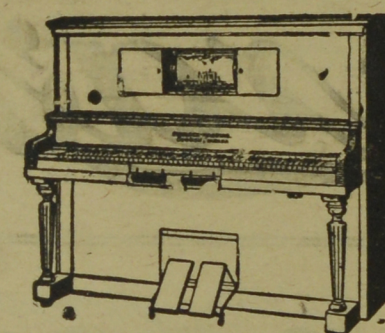
