British Delegates Embark for Canada To Attend Parley

Large Party Headed by Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin
Sailed from Southampton on the C. P. R. Liner
Empress of Britain—Six Cabinet Ministers
Coming—South African Delegates on Same
Ship.

LONDON, July 13—The British delegation to the Imperial Economic Conference at Ottawa left for Southampton today to sail for Canada aboard the liner Empress of Britain.

Right Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Lord President of the Council, headed the delegation, which included Chancellor Neville Chamberlain, Hon. J. S. Thomas Secretary for Dominions; Hon. Walter Runciman, president of the Board of Trade; Colonial Secretary, Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister and Sir John Gilmore, Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries. Industrial and commercial experts and secretaries brought the British delegation to 130 persons.

Will Use Telephones

The South African and Southern Rhodesian delegations also will sail on the Empress of Britain. Forty telephones aboard the ship will enable the cabinet members to keep in contact with Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald during the voyage.

The British Olympic team, led by Lord Burghley and the South African and Hungarian teams, were also on the boat train for Southampton.

CANUCK WON KOLAPAR CUP AT BISLEY MEET

Lieut. Desmond Burke of Ottawa, Was the High Scorer — Mother Country Lost by 21 Points.

Bisley Camp, Eng., July 12—Canada today scored her first major victory at the great National Rifle Association meeting, capturing the historic Kolapore Cup from the defenders, the Mother Country, by 21 points.

Canada lost this great team trophy to the Mother Country two years ago, and last year failed by four scant points to recover it. Today the picked Canadian team of eight marksmen, led by Lieut. Desmond Burke of Ottawa, went into the lead at the first distance and increased it on the second and third.

It was the greatest Canadian achievement at the National Rifle Association's big Empire meeting since 1930, when Canada won the MacKinnon Cup—which she will attack on Thursday. The last two years have been rather lean ones for Canadian marksmen at Bisley, but 1932 promises to be a Canadian triumph.

Tomorrow, bolstered by the magnificent win in the Kolapore, the Canadians go individually in the first stage of the King's Prize, the blue ribbon of marksmanship. There will be well over a thousand competitors, and the first stage will reduce the entry to the 300 highest scores.

Washington, D.C., July 13—Signature of a United States-Canadian treaty for development of the St. Lawrence lakes-to-ocean seaway within the next week or two was forecast here today by a source in close touch with the negotiators.

HIS AMATEUR STANDING IS CHALLENGED

Los Angeles, Calif., July 13—Paavo Nurmi, was scheduled to arrive here today and begin training for the 1932 Olympic games in which he may not be allowed to compete.

A hero of the 1924 games at Paris and the 1928 games at Amsterdam, his amateur standing has been challenged and not until July 28, two days before the opening of the tenth olympiad will his status be decided.

Too Many Strawberries

Strawberries are selling at the lowest price in years. They are being offered at 4c per box by the crate and 5c per single box. The heavy rains during the past week hastened the ripening processes and as a result the market has been crowded and the season shortened. As one farmer in the market said this morning, "The people are saturated with them," which just about tells the tale. The first berries to appear in the market this year sold at 30 cents per box, but at that time there was only one or two crates of early ones. Since then they have fallen steadily until today it is almost a hard job to give them away.

MANY PAY LAST SAD TRIBUTE TO HN. H. A. M'KEOWN

Saint John, July 13—With simple but deeply impressive ceremony the funeral of Hon. H. A. McKeown was held yesterday afternoon, attended by a large number of Saint John friends and several from other parts of the province, members of the Senate and House of Commons, representatives of the judiciary and business and fraternal circles. A private family service was held at the home of Fred T. Barbour, 123 Hazen street, where the body had been resting. Here Dr. Geo. A. Ross, pastor of the Westfield United Church, officiated, assisted by Rev. Dr. A. S. Rogers, pastor of Centenary Church, where a public service was conducted at 2.30 o'clock. Interment was in the family lot in Fernhill.

Pallbearers were Sir J. Douglas Hazen, Chief Justice of New Brunswick; Dr. A. P. Barnhill, former legal partner of Mr. McKeown; J. G. Harrison, T. H. Estabrooks, G. E. Barbour, W. A. Lockhart, R. G. Fulton and J. Verner McLellan.

The church service was conducted by Rev. Dr. A. S. Rogers, minister of Centenary church, of which Mr. McKeown had been a member and trustee. Assisting in the service were, Rev. Dr. Ross, pastor of Westfield, where Mr. McKeown was stricken with a heart attack Sunday, near his summer home, and Rev. L. J. Watson of Silver Falls. Rev. Robert Smart, of Moncton, a close friend of the deceased, missed railway connections and could not attend.

The chief mourners were, Mrs. McKeown (formerly Miss Agnes Grace Burpee of Saint John); Francis S. Burpee, Ottawa; Charles A. Burpee, Cleveland, O.; Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Burpee, Toronto; John Burpee, Moncton, and Mrs. Jean Pickard, a niece of Sackville, N. B. His Honor H. H. McLean, Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick, and Major A. C. Larter, aide-de-camp, were present, as well as Mayor James W. Brittain, and Commissioners R. W. Wignmore, LeB. Wilson and K. D. Spear.

NORWEGIANS OCCUPYING NEW TERRITORY

The Danes Are Trying to Prevent Whale Fishers From Landing

**MATTER FOR
WORLD COURT**
Scientific Expedition Is Being Sent to Disputed Territory

(Special to the Daily Mail)
Oslo, Norway, July 13—Danish expeditions to South Greenland holding police authority and Danish attempts to prevent whale fishers from landing in Greenland were given today as reasons for the Norwegian occupation of a strip of South Eastern Greenland.

Occupation was announced while Denmark was reported preparing to send a large scientific mapping expedition the disputed territory.

The world court at the Hague which is considering the dispute over the sovereignty of Greenland, but has taken no action. Denmark always has claimed full sovereignty. The dispute was submitted to the World Court last year after a small Norwegian expedition raised the Norwegian flag in Eastern Greenland.

COMMUNISTS AND POLICE IN BATTLE

Cologne, Germany, July 13—Twenty persons were wounded, including two policemen, in intermittent revolver battles between police and communists in the streets that lasted all night long. Seventy were arrested.

Soldiers?

Even though they are only members of the militia, the privates and NCO's of the York Regiment could make, and should make a better appearance on the streets in the evening. The general appearance of the majority of them (not including the officers) arouses anything but admiration in the hearts of the public. In several cases that have been noticed they are the exact antithesis of what a soldier should be with stooped shoulders, wrinkled uniforms, unshined buttons and, worst of all dirty shoes. It is certainly disheartening to the public to see money spent for training that does not begin with, or force, the fundamentals of army life. One can hardly blame the men themselves for their appearance since many of them are new to the game. It is just an example of the form of administration that prevails in some of the militia camps.

Production of U. S. Industries At Very Low Level

Experts Predict An Automatic Production to Meet the Demand for Necessities of the People; An Upward Turn in Business is Not Far Away.

NEW YORK, July 13—Production in many of America's leading industries has dropped to such a low level that experts predict an automatic production to meet the demands for necessities, the United Press learned today.

Production in some industries is far below the actual needs of the American people as computed on the basis of consumption over the past ten years. If Americans hold their recently acquired "necessities": the family automotive, the electrical refrigerator and the radio, economists insist that the upturn in business cannot be far away.

Sociologists are equally insistent that the people will maintain those articles that were once classified as luxuries.

DUTIES NOW LEVIED ON GOODS FROM FREE STATE

London, July 12—The British Government carried out its threat to levy fresh duties on goods from the Irish Free State. The revenues from the new duties will recoup the British treasury for the losses consequent on the Free State's default of the land annuities.

Coincidentally, the British Government announced considerable extensions of the general free list under the Import Duties Act. Affecting specialized products for the most part, the extensions nullify imperial preferences so far as these articles are concerned.

The duties on the Irish Free State imports affect all the principal imports, but they are of 20 per cent. ad valorem, while the government's special measure passed by parliament yesterday gave the government the power to levy up to 100 per cent. ad valorem.

The Irish Free State commodities on which the new duties apply are, principally, livestock, poultry and game; butter eggs and cream; bacon and pork.

The prices for these commodities had already dropped alarmingly for the Free State producer and farmer in anticipation of the British levies. At the same time there were reports that the Canadian livestock trade in particular, was already experiencing some benefit from the setback of the Irish exporters.

OLD DOMINION NOTES TURNED UP RECENTLY

It is quite evident that there are still a few people in this vicinity who are able to find a safe place to keep money for a long period without entrusting it to the care of a bank. At least this is the opinion of John S. Scott, secretary-treasurer of the Municipality of York. The Municipal authorities have been making a drive for back taxes and recently Mr. Scott was astonished to find in a cash remittance from collectors in the Parish of St. Marys two one dollar Dominion notes of ancient vintage. One of them was issued in 1898, and contained portraits of Lord Aberdeen, the then Governor-General, and Lady Aberdeen. The other which was issued in 1911 showed portraits of Earl and Countess Grey. Both bills are in good condition and had been handled but little. It is pleasing to know that there are some people in this vicinity who are able to hold on to money.

P. E. I. MAN PASSES AWAY IN THE SOUTH

Charlottetown, July 12—Hon. Chas. Dalton, Lieutenant-Governor of Prince Edward Island, received word of the death of his son, Joseph Gerald, in Winterhaven, Flo. He was 34 years old, a graduate of St. Dunstan's University, Charlottetown, and of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Boston, where he received his B.Sc. degree and took a course in aeronautics. He was also a graduate of Parks Air College, of St. Louis.

No particulars of the cause of his death have been received. The body will be brought to the island for burial.

BRITISH TEAM SAILED TODAY

Southampton, Eng., July 13—Headed by Lord David Burghley, star hurdler, the British Olympic team sailed for Quebec on the Empress of Britain enroute for Los Angeles and the International games today.

WELL KNOWN SHOE MAN ASSIGNED

Receiver Ernest A. McKay has received the assignment of Ralph Shepherd, well known shoe merchant, who has for the past several years conducted a shoe repair shop and shoe store in this city. The assignment was made yesterday and the Canadian Credit Men's Trust Association are the custodians.

Mr. Shepherd's liabilities are \$6,218.91 and his assets \$4,141.92. He conducted a shoe repair shop on York street. Later he removed his store to York Street adjacent to the repair shop. Mr. Shepherd is known as a conscientious and honest business man and his assignment will be learned with regret.
